2008 ACHIEVEMENTS

DOWNTOWN TOMAH – Began an ongoing involvement with this group to assist in their goals to revitalize the downtown area.

FIRING RANGE – With the assistance of Public Works, the firing range has been vastly improved. Fill and burms have been increased. A building to house targets and miscellaneous equipment has been placed on site and is being utilized. Further improvements will take place in 2009.

NEW FACILITY COMPLETION – The new building is complete and the move and transition into the facility are complete. The Open House that was held was very well attended and received by the public.

IMPOUND – With the assistance of Public Works, the area used for impounded vehicles has been graded, filled and fencing repaired and reinforced. This has created a secure and sound area for impounded vehicles to be stored and has eliminated the need to have vehicles stored in areas not owned and controlled by the City.

TACTICAL VEHICLE – With the assistance of the Ambulance Service, the Department was able to secure and outfit an ambulance for use by the CTU and the Department as a Command Post. This will provide a safe and efficient staging area for training purposes and during “live” tactical events.

ANDRES DONATIONS - DARE \$5,000.00 – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant for the DARE Program from the Andres Foundation. These monies will be used to continue the instruction of this program in our school district. Our program is the only DARE Program currently being instructed in Monroe County and provides valuable information to students regarding drug and alcohol use.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER – The 2008-2009 school year marks the first full year that the School Resource Officer Program has been in place. The placement of an officer in the school setting has created a more positive interaction between students and law enforcement and a more efficient response to calls for service.

FOCUS ON DRUG ENFORCEMENT – We will continue placing a high priority of the development of cases related to the sale and distribution of narcotics to include pharmaceuticals. Those that chose to profit from the sale and distribution of illegal substances need to be held accountable.

BULLETPROOF VEST PURCHASE REIMBURSEMENT – Once again our Department has been awarded federal grant monies to partially reimburse the purchase price of the bulletproof vests worn by Department personnel.

DONATION FROM WALMART – The Department received a \$1,500.00 donation from Walmart. These monies will be used towards the expenses associated with the replacement of our K-9 Unit in 2009.

SARA PROJECT – The Department commenced the SARA Project in the downtown area in the spring. This program was devised to address growing concerns in the bar district relating to liquor license violations, fights and public nuisance violations. Through this concentrated patrol approach, improvements have been realized in all areas of concern. This Project has also increased the communication between bar owners, bartenders and our Department in a positive manner. Support that the Department receives from the Common Council is a valuable part in reducing the concerns that we have in the downtown.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – National Night Out was once again held in August in Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens could participate in the Bike/Blading Rodeo, as well as view demonstrations from many different groups addressing various safety-related issues and community concerns.

TraCS - TraCS is fully operational in all squad cars. This electronic citation program allows officers to issue citations from their squad cars, which in turn allows for the information to be electronically transferred to the Department of Transportation. This assists in creating a more efficient use of their time and streamlines the paperwork process.

HOCKEY TEAM AND GAME – Some of the members of the Department play on the Tomah Police Department Hockey team. The Department indirectly benefits from the officers involvement with members of the community in activities outside of their day-to-day policing responsibilities. Simply stated, this interaction and relationship building provides the basis of future cooperation.

DELIVERY OF INFORMATION ELECTRONICALLY – The Department has implemented a process in which reports that are required to be sent to the District Attorney, Probation and Parole, Monroe County Department of Human Services, Corporation Counsel and other law enforcement agencies are now scanned and e-mailed to these agencies. In the past, reports were copied and delivered by an officer, generally on a daily basis, to the above referenced agencies. This change has resulted in a time and financial savings for the Department.

DEPARTMENT WEBSITE – The Department website is up and running! This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is www.tomahpolice.com.

TELEPHONE TREE – Since the migration to Central Dispatch, the Department has used a Telephone Tree. After our move into our new building, this was discontinued. During regular business hours, citizens will speak with department personnel. This change was implemented to provide better customer service to our community. In addition, with the installation of our new phone system, each officer has voicemail so citizens may leave a message directly with the officer working with them. After hours, a revised Telephone Tree is in place.

2009 GOALS

CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY - Due to budgetary constraints, this program had been placed on hold. In 2009, we hope to again conduct an Academy.

ALDERS AND CONSTITUENTS – work with any interested Alders in providing information, training and services specific to their districts and constituents.

RANGE IMPROVEMENTS – Implement and finish improvements to the range.

LICENSE HOLDERS - Continue our efforts in working with the License holders to address any concerns and reinforce the progress attained during the SARA Project.

TEAM BUILDING – Focus on increasing the cooperation with other Department Heads which will enhance the police department's ability to transition to an increased emphasis on problem solving.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION/INCREASE IN LOBBY HOURS - Attain all necessary training and equipment to become a Department of Transportation Registration Center. The part-time person who will be hired in 2009 will primarily perform this task. The hours of lobby access will also be increased until 8:30 p.m. This will provide much better community service to our citizens.

RESEARCH THE TRANSITION FROM FTO TO PTO TRAINING PROGRAM – Currently the typical police Field Training Program focuses largely on the enforcement activities of policing. The newer model, the Police Training Program places a greater emphasis on community problem solving.

BIKE PATROL - In 2008, we began a renewed effort to use the bike patrol. In 2009, we will continue placing to emphasis on this Program in an effort to establish additional community contacts, as well as to be more environmentally and fiscally responsible.

VIDEO CONFERENCING WITH THE DA'S OFFICE – Focus on implementing this technology in an effort to minimize the amount of time officers are required to travel to Sparta for Motion and Preliminary Hearings. This could also be used in trial preparation when possible.

RMS ACCESS – Focus on implementing the technology and training needed to allow officer's access to our Records Management System (ITI) from squad cars in an effort to create, access and download information and reports directly from and into the records system while on patrol.

TRANSITION TO A WEB-BASED PROCESS FOR TRACS AND E-TIME – Focus on implementing this technology in an effort to provide information generated in TraCS to E-Time.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM – Continue to work with the school district to integrate this Program within the district and expand on its functions.

POLICING MANAGEMENT PRINCIPLES - Work toward implementation of a stronger understanding with staff members focusing on current policing management principles.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Continue with the professional development of Department Members

INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN - Establish a greater involvement regarding the investigation of Internet Crimes against Children through involvement in the Department of Justice's initiative on Child Pornography on the Internet.

MUNICIPAL COURT - Work with other members of the Criminal Justice System to explore ways to increase the number of cases handled in Municipal Court and reduce the number of cases referred to Circuit Court.

2008 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION REPORT

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and for the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Mark Nicholson and supervised by Sergeant Scott Holum. The Field Training Officers are Officer Paul Sloan, Officer Brittnay Westpfahl and Officer Joshua Kenworthy.

2008 was another busy year for the Field Training Unit. Officer David Schneider and Officer Joshua Kenworthy successfully completed their training and were granted tenure as patrol officers. Both officers are performing at a high level and have proven to be an asset to our department. Officer Jarrod Furlano began employment with the department in January of 2008 and is currently in Step V of the training process. Officer Furlano is currently on pace to be tenured with our agency. Officer Sara Angle was hired in August of 2008. Regrettably, she did not successfully complete the training program and is no longer employed with our department.

Investigator's Report

TPD Case 08-0348

In 2006 the Tomah Police Department was involved in an investigation regarding numerous fraudulent prescriptions passed at a Tomah pharmacy. Two suspects, a male and a female, were developed in 2006, but the suspects were not charged during that time because of lack of evidence.

In February 2008 the Jackson County Sheriff's Department was again involved in an investigation involving the same male suspect from the Tomah Police Department investigation in 2006 that was involved with fraudulent prescriptions in Jackson County and a Tomah pharmacy. The male suspect was involved with a different female suspect at this time. A search warrant was executed in Jackson County and evidence of prescription fraud and drug possession and use was located in the residence. The male suspect was charged in Jackson County and Monroe County with prescription drug fraud for the 2008 crimes. Evidence was also obtained that led the Tomah Police Department to be able to charge the male suspect in the 2006 investigation that was previously unable to be charged. The male subject was charged with 32 felony counts of obtaining prescription drugs by fraud in Monroe County alone and is scheduled for a plea hearing and sentencing in early 2009. Prescription drug and associated crimes have become a major problem in Tomah.

TPD Case 08-0465

In February of 2008 the Tomah Police Department received information regarding a subject who had obtained prescription drugs fraudulently from a Tomah clinic and a Tomah pharmacy. Investigation of this matter identified a 50 year-old Lake Delton man as the suspect in the prescription fraud cases. The suspect in this case was a career criminal with several arrests for similar conduct dating back to 1986. The suspect in this case was able to go to clinics throughout Wisconsin and actually be examined by doctors and convince them to prescribe narcotic medications without any actual injury or illness. This suspect was also able to obtain the narcotics through the use of numerous false names at the clinics, thus creating a medical record under a fake name so he could return for follow up visits and more narcotics at a later time. This subject was charged with felony charges in Monroe County. The investigation into this suspect also provided information to several other jurisdictions in Wisconsin where the suspect could be charged, including Madison, Waunakee, Sun Prairie, McFarland, Stoughton, Mt. Horeb, Black Earth, Dodgeville, Prairie du Chien, Spring Green, Columbus, Richland Center, Viroqua, Lacrosse, Sparta, Mauston, Reedsburg, Lake Delton, Baraboo, Portage, Pardeeville, Stevens Point, Plover, Black River Falls, Whitehall, Osseo, Eau Claire, Friendship, Wisconsin Dells, Wausau, Wisconsin Rapids and Marshfield.

TPD Case 08-1097

In May of 2008 the Tomah Police Department was contacted by a male Lacrosse resident who had been solicited for sex in an internet chat room. The female solicited sex from the male and offered to meet in Tomah for sex for \$100.00. The Lacrosse male provided Tomah Police with information to log into his account in the chat room. Officers posed

as the male in the chat room and agreed to meet with the female soliciting sex from the Lacrosse man for money. The 22 year-old female arrived at the parking lot of a Tomah motel and was ultimately stopped by officers and taken into custody. The vehicle was basically fashioned into a mobile bedroom, with a bed, stuffed animals, female clothing, condoms, condom wrappers and discarded condoms. The female suspect had been meeting men in the chat rooms on the internet and had been meeting with men from all over at various area locations prior to her arrest.

TPD Case 08-1219

From March 2008 through September of 2008 the Tomah Police Department was involved in the investigation of several subjects for selling crack cocaine in Tomah and surrounding area. Several controlled purchases of crack cocaine were made from various people in Tomah and drug dealers from Pennsylvania. As a result of the investigation several arrests were made, including the same subject that was arrested in Tomah in 2007 with 42 bags of crack cocaine. Arrests in this case included an 18 year-old male, a 21 year-old male from Pennsylvania, a 19 year-old female, a 42 year-old female, a 21 year-old male, a 46 year-old male, a 42 year-old male, a 26 year-old male, an 18 year-old female and a 21 year-old male from Pennsylvania.

TPD Case 08-1388

In June of 2008 the Tomah Police Department attempted to stop a vehicle on STH 21. The driver of the vehicle fled on foot and jumped into the water east of the city. The driver of the vehicle would not talk to officers and refused to come out. The driver was observed about fifty yards from shore hiding in some weeds and branches and refused to swim out of the water. With the assistance of a Tomah Fire Department boat, officers retrieved the driver of the vehicle from the water and the 28 year-old male driver was taken into custody.

TPD Case 08-1548

In July of 2008 the Tomah Police Department and the Tomah Fire Department investigated a suspicious house fire in Tomah. The fire was determined to be arson based on an investigation that was conducted. The 34 year-old male owner of the home was arrested and charged with arson.

TPD Case 08-2717

In November of 2008 Tomah Police went to an address in Woodland Terrace Mobile Home Park to arrest a subject. While at the residence officers observed evidence of marijuana use and possession in the residence. The Tomah Police Department obtained a search warrant for the residence. Officers located numerous illegal prescription pills, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and a sawed off 12 gauge shotgun. An 18 year-old male was arrested on drug charges and possession of the sawed off shotgun. A 28 year-old male was arrested for possession of the sawed off shotgun. A 24 year-old female was arrested on a warrant for Iowa.

TPD Case 08-2859

In December of 2008 Tomah Police went to a residence in Edgewood Trailer Park to locate a subject wanted on several felony charges. While officers were present at the residence, officers obtained evidence of recent drug use and possession at the residence. A search warrant was obtained for the residence and marijuana, drug paraphernalia, ecstasy pills and illegal prescription pills were located in the residence. Also located in the residence was a growing operation for psilocybin mushrooms. This is the first psilocybin mushroom growing operation Investigator Walensky is aware of that has been located in Tomah. A 23 year-old male and his 47 year-old father were arrested and charged with various drug crimes.

TPD Case 08-3014

In December of 2008 the Tomah Police Department was contacted by the VA Police Department to assist with a deceased male subject in a vehicle in a parking lot at the VA Hospital. The Federal Bureau of Investigation was contacted and agreed to investigate the death and process the scene with their agency evidence technicians. The Tomah Police Department provided assistance to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the VA Police Department during the investigation.

School Resource Officer

In January of 2008 Officer Marshall started as the first School Resource Officer for the school district. Officer Marshall has an office at the Tomah High School but also serves the other schools in the City of Tomah.

Officer Marshall is directly involved in many different activities within the school district such as: Child Development Day, Tomah High School Wellness Day, Reality Check, Prom, Homecoming, Project Wisdom, Tomah High School Career Fair, and Read Across America. Officer Marshall has also been a guest in some of the high school health and driver's education classes, and she has worked at numerous sporting events.

Officer Marshall also serves as a resource for both the staff and students. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regards to any concerns or questions they may have. She is also been available for the staff to use as a resource.

Officer Marshall teaches D.A.R.E to 5th grade students and provides tours of the Police Department to kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall works closely with the high school administration in regards to the safety and security of the high school students and building.

2008 Canine Unit Annual Report

The Tomah Police Department Canine Unit is a partnership between Sergeant Chris Weaver and his partner, K-9 Sierra. Sergeant Weaver has been with the Department since December 1997 and raised K-9 Sierra from a puppy. K-9 Sierra is a male black and tan color German Shepherd Dog and he joined the Department in June of 2000. Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra completed Basic Patrol Dog School at the Ramsey County, Minnesota Sheriff's Office Regional K-9 Training Center in St. Paul, Minnesota. Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra attended school together for 12 weeks. By investing this amount of time Sergeant Weaver was able to gain the necessary skills to provide ongoing training, testing, and evaluation of the Canine Unit.

Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra not only work their scheduled shift (10PM – 8AM), but are on-call to assist the members of the Department with a wide variety of tasks. K-9 Sierra is a dual-purpose patrol dog. While the term “dual-purpose” implies two jobs, this is somewhat deceiving. First, K-9 Sierra is trained as a patrol dog, providing handler protection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building search, area search, and evidence recovery search. Secondly, K-9 Sierra is trained as a drug detector dog. He is trained to detect the odor associated with marijuana, cocaine/crack, methamphetamine, heroin, and ecstasy. In addition to these trained jobs, K-9 Sierra serves as a community relations ambassador for the Department.

Notable Cases for 2008

February 28, 2008: Agency Assist- Sparta Police Department. Sgt. Weaver & K-9 Sierra responded to assist for the third time for an Armed Robbery at a Sparta area business. Two previous K-9 tracks provided some information, but did not result in any apprehension. On this night Sgt. Weaver & K-9 Sierra were able to conduct a track for several blocks through the City. The track led to the recovery of some discarded money and ended in the area of a previous suspect's residence. That suspect was contacted, interviewed, and confessed to all three incidents while implicating two other people.

April 7, 2008: Drug Sniff – Vehicle. Tomah Police Department officers were dispatched to a complaint of possible drug use near a downtown tavern during the afternoon. Sgt. Weaver & K-9 Sierra responded from off-duty and conducted exterior sniffs of two vehicles, one parked downtown and one stopped leaving the area. K-9 Sierra alerted to the odor associated with illegal drugs on both vehicles. During subsequent searches marijuana, cocaine, and drug paraphernalia were seized. Officers seized a 1999 Chevy Tahoe, which was later forfeited.

November 16, 2008: Criminal Apprehension. Tomah Police Department officers responded to assist a Monroe County Sheriff's Department deputy who was following a vehicle earlier reported stolen from the City of Tomah. Officers developed a plan to attempt to stop the vehicle and also deploy a tire deflation system to prevent a high-speed pursuit. Sgt. Weaver and K-9 Sierra responded to assist and were present at the time of the traffic stop. Unfortunately the suspect vehicle did not stop and instead ran over the tire deflation system, causing the tires to lose air pressure. Once the vehicle came to a stop the driver and one passenger fled on foot. K-9 Sierra pursued and apprehended the driver. The passenger who fled was not caught by the other officer, which highlighted the benefit of a trained police dog for criminal apprehension. The passenger was identified and later arrested.

Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department, and Monroe County Sheriff's Department. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit was activated five times in 2007. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

February 6 – CTH WW – High Risk Search Warrant. CTU served a search warrant for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department at a trailer house on CTH WW. Juneau County Sheriff's Department Personnel served a search warrant at a nearby house at the same time. Information was provided that the suspect at the trailer house frequently carried a pistol around the trailer. CTU team members executed the "no knock" search warrant by breaching a glass patio door. The suspect and a visitor were safely detained and the residence was turned over to the investigators.

July 13 – Butts Avenue – Barricade With Hostages. Tomah Police Department officers responded to Butts Avenue in reference to a suicidal subject in an apartment. Officers determined that the suspect was inside with a female and the female's 10-year-old son. CTU personnel were able to get the son onto a second floor balcony where he was rescued by a ladder before the suspect pulled his mother back inside the apartment. CTU entry team personnel eventually entered the apartment and found the suspect and the woman barricaded in a bedroom. A crisis entry into the bedroom was conducted. The woman was rescued unharmed and the suspect was arrested after a short struggle.

October 3 – Downy Road – Search Warrant. CTU served a high-risk search warrant for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department on Downy Road in the Valley Junction area. The suspect was not at the location at the time and two other persons were detained. CTU personnel providing security for the investigators detained the suspect as he arrived home in a vehicle.

December 6 – Abbotsford Avenue – Search Warrant. CTU served a high-risk search warrant for the Monroe County Sheriff's Department on Abbotsford Avenue in the Cataract area. Due to information regarding numerous firearms at the location and a surveillance system, CTU requested assistance from the Jackson County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team and the La Crosse County Sheriff's Department for the BEARCAT armored rescue vehicle. Two simultaneous entries were conducted with CTU personnel entering a trailer house and Jackson County Sheriff's Department personnel entering the residence. Both teams arrived at the location via the La Crosse County Sheriff's Department BEARCAT. Both locations were secured and the Jackson County Sheriff Department personnel detained one subject who was armed with two pistols. Several other illegally possessed firearms were also seized.

Tomah Police Department 2008 Information Technology Report

With the new Police Department came several new processes as it relates to Information Technology.

Department/Building Security - Officers are now issued "key cards" to enter the exterior doors of the Police Department as well as several locations within the Police Department. The "key cards" have computer chips imbedded in them which allow the officers access through doors without using an actual key. Using the same "key cards" allows for different access levels throughout the building. With this in place different security levels can be given to cleaning personnel, civilian employees, officers, and supervisors.

Audio/Visual Presentations - Ceiling mounted projectors and drop down screens have been installed in the Multi-Purpose Room as well as the Training Room. The projectors are hard wired into our current computer network as well as set up for wireless presentations from a laptop computer. Software has been loaded on to the computers at the Police Department that allow any computer to access the projectors and display a presentation.

Virtual Private Networks - As part of the network infrastructure for the new Police Department, routers were purchased which allow for Virtual Private Networks, referred to as VPN's. VPN's allow employees to access our network infrastructure from a computer not located in the Police Department. Examples for future use of the VPN's are access from the squad car computers to our in-house records management system, access for the School Resource Officer into our in-house records management system, access from squad car computers to dispatch/jail computers, and access to the in-house printers for dispatchers located at the Monroe County Dispatch Center.

VOIP Phone System – Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) is a phone system using our Computer Network Infrastructure. VOIP has allowed all employees of the Tomah Police Department to have individual phone numbers, voice mail obtained and stored on a network server, and fax numbers for individual employees or sections. VOIP further allows voice messages to be saved or retrieved in an email setting and disseminated to other employees.

Other Technology updates/changes at the Tomah Police Department include:

- Replacement of 1 in-car Mobile-Vision system
- 1 new digital camera
- Replacement of two network printers
- Replacement of 1 in-car computer

FLEET MAINTENANCE

The Tomah Police Department has ten vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. Vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

- 2000 Ford F-350 Ambulance – Combined Tactical Unit
- 2003 Chevrolet Impala – Training Vehicle
- 2005 Ford Crown Victoria – K-9 Unit
- 2005 Chevrolet Tahoe – Shift Supervisor
- 2007 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel
- 2007 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel
- 2007 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel
- 2007 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel (Totaled in traffic crash)
- 2008 Chevrolet Impala – Chief of Police
- 2008 Chevrolet Impala – Investigations

Two 2008 Chevrolet Impalas were added to our fleet to replace the old vehicles assigned to the Investigator and the Chief of Police. In August of 2008, the Tomah Police Department graciously accepted a 2000 Ford F-350 Ambulance from the Tomah Area Ambulance Service. That vehicle received traditional black/white paint and is assigned to the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit. In November, a 2007 Ford Crown Victoria was involved in a traffic crash and sustained heavy damage. That vehicle was considered “totaled” by insurance adjusters and is scheduled for replacement. Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black/white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigator and Shift Supervisor are unmarked patrol vehicles.

All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with radar, Mobile Data Computers (MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators (AED), In-car audio / video recording, digital cameras, Stinger spike systems, Preliminary Breath Tests (PBT) and other specialized items.

In 2008, officers from the Tomah Police Department logged over 175,000 miles in all police vehicles.

2008 Community Service Activities

In 2008 the members of the Police Department were again busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

Bike Rodeo

Once again in August the Police Department held it's annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo. It was held in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Several members of the Police Department volunteered their time to assist with running the event.

Participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members are used to purchase bicycles, safety helmets, roller blades, bike locks, games and other items that are given away to children who participate in the safety courses.

This event would not be possible without the donations from the community and the assistance of the members of the Police Department.

Special Olympics

Each year members of the Police Department take part in the Polar Plunge and Law Enforcement Torch Run. At least one member of the Police Department takes a plunge into the frozen Mississippi River to help raise money for Special Olympics.

Other members of the Police Department, along with some members of the community, participate in the Law Enforcement Torch Run. Our bicycle route is from Tomah to Port Edwards.

Tours

Throughout the year the Department provides tours of the Police Department building to the Kindergarten Classes in the school district. Members of the Fire Department and Ambulance Service also assist with the tours. During the tour the children are shown a video in regards to using the 911 system. They are then able to see a police car, ambulance and fire trucks up close, and are even invited to sit inside them. At the end of their tour they are provided with a "goodie" bag that includes stickers, coloring books, a pencil and other safety information.

The Department also provides tours to daycares, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and other groups who request a tour. On occasion, officers go to the facility to provide information on a particular topic. These special requests keep us busy throughout the year.

School District Events

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day held by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information in regards to child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to the children.

At the elementary level, Officer Marshall teaches DARE to fifth grade students in the school district, including the parochial schools.

The Middle School holds an event they call Reality Check, that the Police Department takes part in. This can be best described as similar to the game Life. The students have to learn to budget money in order to support themselves and their family. The Police Department issues tickets to students for various offenses that could happen in real life.

High school students interested in a career in law enforcement are able to participate in a ride-along prearranged by the high school. Students are able to spend a few hours riding with an officer and observing the workday. Students come with a prepared list of questions for the officers and the officers complete an evaluation of the student, which is sent back to the school.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at the high school. Topics range from driver's education training, traffic enforcement, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

Car Seat Safety Inspections

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Tomah Memorial Hospital, provide free car seat safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is passed out and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost or in the case of financial need, they are provided to families free of charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a state grant in which they purchased car seats and provided them to families who received County support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week in regards to car seat safety and safety seat inspections, and without the financial support of numerous organizations we would not be able to provide car seats to the public.

Child Fingerprinting

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an identification kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

National Night Out

Once again with the help of Tomah Memorial Hospital, Monroe County Triad, Wal-Mart Distribution Center and the Monroe County Safe Community Coalition, we held our 5th annual Monroe County National Night Out. Organizations from around the area were invited to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public coming out to see what was offered.

Again a Police K-9 demonstration was held along with a mock crash and other demonstrations.

The Police Department's Bike Rodeo was also held in conjunction with National Night Out and we will continue to hold the two events together in the future.

Monroe County Safe Community Coalition

The Department participates in the county wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seat belt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking and underage alcohol.

Fort McCoy Morale, Wellness, and Recreation Days

For the past several years the Department has been represented at the Fort McCoy MWR event by our canine unit. The military and its members are an important part of Tomah. This event provides us with an opportunity to offer ourselves as a resource and build relationships with military personnel living in the Tomah area.

Tomah Business and Industry Committee

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach coordinates this Committee. The Committee meets every two months and is made up of representatives from Tomah

Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, workplace safety and employee health are all discussed.

Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee

This consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders Office, Jail Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

Others

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, stranger danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the Police Department.

Drug Abuse Resistance Education

2008 D.A.R.E.

The Tomah D.A.R.E program is still the only one in Monroe County. Officer Marshall is the current D.A.R.E instructor for all of the elementary schools in the City of Tomah.

The ten-week course is divided amongst five schools in the city, with half of the classes being taught in the fall and half in the spring. The D.A.R.E program focuses on educating students about the harmful effects of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and inhalants. D.A.R.E is taught to approximately two hundred 5th graders each year.

The first day of D.A.R.E class is an introduction day. Officer Marshall introduces herself and allows the children to ask any questions they may have, since time is limited during D.A.R.E. class. The students are given a D.A.R.E t-shirt, and to show their support, they are encouraged to wear their t-shirt on D.A.R.E days. They also are provided with a D.A.R.E workbook and pens and pencils.

In order to successfully graduate from the D.A.R.E program students are required to complete a written essay about what they learned during D.A.R.E classes. Successful graduates participate in a small graduation ceremony where they are presented with D.A.R.E certificates.

The D.A.R.E program can be considered as a form of community policing. Students begin to relate to Officer Marshall as a person and not just as a law enforcement role. The contact that Officer Marshall has with the 5th graders allows them to realize that police officers are not as intimidating as they believe. Officer Marshall has numerous contacts with the students after teaching them, and some of them and their families specifically come to Officer Marshall with their police concerns.

The City of Tomah is able to continue the D.A.R.E program due to donations received from business and organizations in the City. Their donated money is used to purchase the D.A.R.E t-shirts, workbooks, pens and pencils and graduation certificates for each of the students involved in the D.A.R.E program.
