## 2009 DEPARTMENT ACHIEVEMENTS

**PRESCRIPTION DRUG TASK FORCE ARRESTS** – In January the Department participated in a multi-jurisdictional prescription drug task force operation that resulted in over 33 persons being arrested for prescription drug related violations.

**DOWNTOWN TOMAH** – Continued our ongoing involvement with this group to assist in their goals to revitalize the downtown area.

**ANDRES DONATIONS - DARE \$5,000.00** – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant for the DARE Program from the Andres Foundation. These monies will be used to continue the instruction of this program in our school district. Our program is the only DARE Program currently being instructed in Monroe County and provides valuable information to students regarding drug and alcohol use.

**ANDRES DONATIONS – K-9 \$2,000.00** – The Department received a \$2,000.00 grant for use towards the purchase and implementation of a new K-9 unit due to the retirement of the Department's K-9, Sierra.

**THOMAS EARLE GRANT – ICAC \$2,000** – The Department received a \$2,000.00 grant for use in purchasing the necessary hardware and software to successfully implement the Internet Crimes Against Children within our agency.

**STATE OF WISCONSIN INTEROPERABILITY GRANT - \$6,211.93** – The Department received a \$6,211.93 grant for use in purchasing communication equipment that will replace existing equipment for compliance with the 2013 deadline.

**FOCUS ON DRUG ENFORCEMENT** – We will continue placing a high priority on the development of cases related to the sale and distribution of narcotics to include pharmaceuticals. Those that choose to profit from the sale and distribution of illegal substances need to be held accountable.

**BULLETPROOF VEST PURCHASE REIMBURSEMENT** – Once again our Department has been awarded federal grant monies to partially reimburse the purchase price of the bulletproof vests worn by Department personnel.

**DONATION FROM WALMART** – The Department received a \$2,000.00 donation from Walmart. These monies will be used towards the expenses associated with the replacement of our K-9 Unit.

**SARA PROJECT** – The Department commenced the SARA Project in the downtown area in the spring. This program was devised to address growing concerns in the bar district relating to liquor license violations, fights and public nuisance violations. Through this concentrated patrol approach, improvements have been realized in all areas of concern. This Project has also increased the communication between bar owners, bartenders and our Department in a positive manner. Support that the Department receives from the Common Council is a valuable part in reducing the concerns that we have in the downtown area.

**NATIONAL NIGHT OUT** – National Night Out was once again held in August in Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens could participate in the Bike/Blading Rodeo, as well as view demonstrations from many different groups addressing various safety-related issues and community concerns.

**HOCKEY TEAM AND GAME** – Some of the members of the Department play on the Tomah Police Department Hockey team. The Department indirectly benefits from the officers involvement with members of the community in activities outside of their day-to-day policing responsibilities. Simply stated, this interaction and relationship building provides the basis of future cooperation.

**DEPARTMENT WEBSITE** – The Department website continues to expand and provide more information and useful links to our community. This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is [www.tomahpolice.com](http://www.tomahpolice.com).

**BOTS GRANT** – The Department received a \$4,000.00 BOTs grant from the State of Wisconsin. This grant was received as a result of the Department's unfunded participation in the Click It or Ticket Program.

**PBT** – The Department received a new PBT unit from the State of Wisconsin (\$450.00 value). This PBT unit was received as a result of the Department's unfunded participation in the Booze and Belts Program.

**EDWARD BYRNE STIMULUS GRANT** – The Department received \$19,151.00 from the State of Wisconsin-Edward Byrne Stimulus Grant. These monies will be used to purchase handheld radios, Microsoft Office 2007 software, a medication drop-off container, an evidence drying cabinet and for the implementation of the new K-9 unit.

**DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM** - The Department partnered with Tomah Memorial Hospital in facilitating a drug drop off program. This program resulted in over 102 pounds of prescription pills being taken in from community residents. In addition, numerous other types of medications were recovered, including liquids, powders, etc.

**VEHICLE REGISTRATION PROGRAM** - The Department successfully implemented the vehicle registration program and is now able to offer vehicle registrations and renewals from the hours of 8 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.

**INCREASE IN LOBBY HOURS** – The Department has hired and trained an additional part-time employee who works the hours of 4:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Monday –Friday. The additional lobby hours provides a valuable community service to our citizens.

**INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN** – The Department successfully partnered with the State of Wisconsin in obtaining the hardware, software and training necessary to investigate Internet Crimes Against Children.

**K-9 UNIT REPLACEMENT** – With the assistance of civic organizations, local businesses and community members, the Department was able to raise over \$14,000.00 for the successful replacement, equipment and training of the new K-9 unit, Jager.



## 2010 DEPARTMENT GOALS

**CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY** - Due to budgetary constraints, this program had been placed on hold. In 2010, we hope to again conduct an Academy.

**ALDERS AND CONSTITUENTS** – work with any interested Alders in providing information, training and services specific to their districts and constituents.

**“PARENTS WHO HOST”** – work with this countywide group to increase awareness and enforcement relating to parents who choose to host underage alcohol parties.

**LICENSE HOLDERS** - Continue our efforts in working with the License holders to address any concerns and reinforce the progress attained during the SARA Project.

**TEAM BUILDING** – Focus on increasing the cooperation with other Department Heads, which will enhance the police department's ability to transition to an increased emphasis on problem solving.

**BIKE PATROL** - In 2009, we began a renewed effort to use the bike patrol. In 2010, we will continue placing an emphasis on this Program in an effort to establish additional community contacts, as well as to be more environmentally and fiscally responsible.

**VIDEO CONFERENCING WITH THE DA'S OFFICE** – Focus on implementing this technology in an effort to minimize the amount of time officers are required to travel to Sparta for Motion and Preliminary Hearings. This could also be used in trial preparation when possible.

**RMS ACCESS** – Focus on implementing the technology and training needed to allow officer's access to our Records Management System (ITI) from squad cars in an effort to create, access and download information and reports directly from and into the records system while on patrol.

**TRANSITION TO A WEB-BASED PROCESS FOR TRACS AND E-TIME** – Focus on implementing this technology in an effort to provide information generated in TraCS to E-Time.

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM** – Continue to work with the school district to integrate this Program within the district and expand on its functions.

**POLICING MANAGEMENT PRINCIPLES** - Work toward implementation of a stronger understanding with staff members focusing on current policing management principles.

**PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT** - Continue with the professional development of Department Members.

**MUNICIPAL COURT** – Continue to work with other members of the Criminal Justice System to explore ways to increase the number of cases handled in Municipal Court and reduce the number of cases referred to Circuit Court.

**“COPS IN SHOPS”/COMPLIANCE CHECKS** – The Department has applied for the “Cops in Shops”/Complaint Checks grant for the purpose of increased license holder compliance checks. If received, this program will be implemented in 2010.

**INTEROPERABILITY REQUIREMENTS** – The Department will continue to move forward with purchasing communication equipment necessary to meet the interoperability requirements of 2013.

## **2009 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION ANNUAL REPORT**

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and for the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Mark Nicholson and supervised by Sergeant Scott Holum. The Field Training Officers are Officer Paul Sloan, Officer Brittnay Westpfahl and Officer Joshua Kenworthy.

2009 was a busy year for the Field Training Unit. Officer Jarrod Furlano successfully completed training and was granted tenure as a patrol officer. Officer Furlano is performing at a high level and has proven to be an asset to our department. Officer Rustin Parker was hired and resigned in 2009. Officer Nathan Stafford began employment with the department in November of 2009 and is currently in Step II of the training process.

## **2009 INVESTIGATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT**

### **TPD PRESCRIPTION DRUG INVESTIGATION (DRUGS)**

On January 16, 2009, the Tomah Police Department arrested approximately 38 individuals involved with selling prescription drugs, cocaine, and marijuana in Tomah and the surrounding area. Some of the prescription drugs involved with this investigation included OxyContin, Percocet, Vicodin, Xanax and Suboxone. Most of this investigation was conducted in 2008, with the arrests, search warrants, suspect interviews and prosecution of the suspects being done in 2009. Some of the drugs were being supplied by dealers locally, as well as from Sauk County and Illinois. This investigation required a cooperative effort of several law enforcement agencies, to include the Tomah Police Department, Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Wisconsin State Patrol, Wisconsin Department of Justice, Sauk County Sheriff's Department, Reedsburg Police Department and the Sparta Police Department.

### **TPD CASE 08-2102 and TPD Case 08-2637 (VEHICLE THEFT)**

On September 10, 2008, the Tomah Police Department took a complaint of a vehicle that was stolen from Norris Vernier in Tomah. A male subject came into the business and test drove a vehicle after having someone call the business saying they were a loan officer and wanted to see the vehicle before it was purchased. The suspect "test drove" the vehicle and did not return with the vehicle. This vehicle was recovered in Ohio.

On November 11, 2008, the Tomah Police Department received information that there was a stolen vehicle at Shaw's Auto Salvage that had been towed from an apartment complex in Tomah. Upon investigation it was learned that this vehicle was towed from an apartment complex parking lot around the same time as the vehicle that was stolen from Norris Vernier and was reported stolen from West Virginia.

Evidence was recovered from the vehicle at Shaw's Auto Salvage that was from West Virginia and the Norris Vernier vehicle that was recovered in Ohio. Through DNA evidence submitted to the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory in 2009 the Tomah Police Department was able to link a specific suspect to the stolen vehicle from Norris Vernier in Tomah to another stolen vehicle from Janesville and other states. Ultimately we were able to link the same suspect that stole the vehicle from Norris Vernier in Tomah to stolen vehicles in several other jurisdictions, to include the State of West Virginia, the State of Illinois, the State of Ohio and several vehicles in Wisconsin. The suspect was eventually located in a prison in Pinckneyville, Illinois, and will be extradited to Wisconsin to face charges in this case.

### **TPD CASE 09-0766 (SEXUAL ASSAULT)**

On April 19, 2009, the Tomah Police Department responded to a reported rape. An adult female was found outside of a residence telling the resident that she was raped and was pulling up her pants. The suspect was seen fleeing on foot from the area and a description was provided. The victim also knew that the suspect had been previously arrested for OWI and described the OWI arrest. Based on this information the suspect was identified and it was learned the suspect was employed by a painting contractor from Texas working on painting gas tanks at Fort McCoy and was staying in Warrens. The suspect denied sexually assaulting the victim. A sexual assault kit was done on the victim at a Lacrosse hospital and DNA evidence was recovered from the victim. DNA was obtained from the suspect and he subsequently fled the area. After a DNA match between the suspect and the victim was obtained, the suspect was arrested in Texas and returned to Monroe County to face charges in this case. The suspect ultimately pled guilty to sexually assaulting the victim and was sentenced to prison.

### **TPD CASE 09-1167 (DRUGS)**

On May 29, 2009, the Tomah Police Department responded to a theft from Wal Mart. The theft involved two suspects smashing a secure electronics case within the electronics department and stealing several expensive electronic devices. The suspects left the store with the electronic items and were not identified. After further investigation with Wal Mart asset protection staff, this theft appeared to be related to thefts at numerous other Wal Mart stores in Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa. The Tomah Police Department worked with approximately 35 other jurisdictions that have Wal Mart stores and reported similar type thefts. Five suspects were identified that were doing the thefts, including the two suspects from the Tomah Wal Mart theft. The thefts from Wal Mart were ultimately linked to known criminal gangs.

### **TPD CASE 09-1183 (DRUGS)**

In June of 2009 the Tomah Police Department initiated a drug investigation involving a subject from the Williams Street area in Tomah. Controlled purchases of marijuana were made from the subject at the residence, with the police purchasing ¼ pound of marijuana on one occasion and ½ pound of marijuana on another occasion. A search warrant was executed at the residence and approximately ½ pound of marijuana, cocaine and ecstasy were located in the garage on the premises where one of the controlled buys of marijuana took place. A sawed-off shotgun was also located in the residence. The marijuana and ecstasy was determined to be coming from Minnesota from a drug source that lived in the Somerset, Wisconsin area. The cocaine was determined to be coming from a different source in Lacrosse.

### **TPD CASE 09-1502 (FRAUD)**

In July of 2009 the Tomah Police Department was contacted by Kwik Trip Incorporated in reference to numerous fraudulent checks that had been passed at Kwik Trip Stores in Wisconsin and Minnesota. The investigation determined that a group from the Minneapolis/St. Paul area in Minnesota were stealing checkbooks from various locations and creating fake checks with account numbers obtained from stolen checkbooks. The checks were then being passed along the Interstate 94 system, including Tomah. Several suspects have been identified in this case that involves multiple jurisdictions in both Wisconsin and Minnesota.

### **TPD CASE 09-1717 (DRUGS)**

In August of 2009 the Tomah Police Department received information of a subject selling marijuana from a residence in rural Wyeville to a subject in Tomah. The Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Sheriff's Department worked together on this investigation and made controlled purchases of marijuana from the subject at the rural Wyeville residence. A search warrant was obtained for the residence and approximately one pound of marijuana and prescription drugs were seized from the residence.

### **TPD CASE 09-1784, 09-1785, 09-1786 AND 09-1832 (THEFT)**

On August 26, 2009, the Tomah Police Department took several reports of vehicles that had been entered in the Mc Adams Street, View Street and Hollister Avenue areas on the south side of Tomah. The suspect targeted unlocked vehicles parked in residential areas. The Viroqua Police Department arrested a subject for similar offenses in Viroqua and it was determined this suspect was also involved in the thefts from vehicles in Tomah. The subject was charged with the thefts from vehicles in Tomah. Further investigation determined that the same suspect had been involved in thefts from vehicles in Sparta, Lacrosse and Minnesota. The suspect was stealing easily accessible items and small amounts of money

from vehicles to support a drug addiction. This type of crime is common in Tomah, easily preventable by citizens and very difficult to investigate.

**TPD CASE 09-1821, 09-1822, 09-1823 and 09-1824 (FORGERY)**

In September of 2009 the Tomah Police Department investigated several cases of stolen and forged checks. The checks were stolen from a Jackson County residence and passed at various locations in Tomah for cash. The suspect was eventually arrested and was determined to be the son of the owner of the checks that was cashing checks to support a severe addiction to narcotics. Some of the checks were personal checks and some were payroll checks from the family business.

**TPD CASE 09-2074 (DRUGS)**

In September of 2009 the Tomah Police Department initiated a drug investigation at an apartment in the area of the Tomah Middle School after information was received that a subject was selling prescription drugs from the apartment. Controlled purchases of Oxycodone and Clonazepam were made by police on two occasions. A search warrant was conducted and prescription drugs were located in the apartment that were being sold. The subject was on probation at the time of the arrest and has since been evicted from the apartment.

**TPD CASE 09-2123 (DRUGS)**

On October 14, 2009, the Tomah Police Department made arrangements through a confidential informant to purchase Oxycodone, marijuana and a pistol from a drug source from Winona, Minnesota. On October 15, 2009, the drug source from Winona came to Tomah to deliver ¼ pound of marijuana, a pistol and Oxycodone pills to a confidential informant. The suspect arrived at the apartment building and was arrested. The suspect was in possession of ¼ pound of marijuana, 300 Oxycodone pills and a semi-automatic pistol to sell to the confidential informant. Another ¾ pound of marijuana was located in the suspect's vehicle as well. This was one of the first drug seizures by K-9 Jager with Officer Hintz.



## 2009 SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT

The year 2009 was the second full year that Officer Marshall served as the School Resource Officer. Officer Marshall has an office at the Tomah High School but also serves the other schools in the City of Tomah.

Officer Marshall handles a wide variety of calls within the school district. Truancy, disorderly conduct, battery, and drug violations are just a small amount of the different types of calls that the School Resource Officer handles.

Officer Marshall also works closely with Monroe County Human Services in regards to abuse investigations involving students and monitoring students that are on supervision through Human Services with the ISP program.

Officer Marshall is directly involved in many different activities within the school district such as: Child Development Day, Tomah High School Wellness Day, Reality Check, Prom, Homecoming, Project Wisdom, Tomah High School Career Fair, and Read Across America. Officer Marshall has also been a guest in some of the high school health and driver's education classes, and she has worked at numerous sporting events.

Officer Marshall also serves as a resource for both the staff and students. Students and staff are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regards to any concerns or questions they may have.

Officer Marshall teaches D.A.R.E to 5<sup>th</sup> grade students and provides tours of the police department to kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall works closely with the High School Administration in regards to the safety and security of the high school students and building. An example of one of the safety concerns resulted in the closing of the high school parking lot exits on Lincoln Avenue at the end of the school day. This has reduced the amount of traffic around other schools in the area of the high school and we have heard a positive response from bus drivers and crossing guards in regarding the reduction in the traffic flow.

## **2009 K-9 UNIT ANNUAL REPORT**

The past year brought us to a transition period with the retirement of K-9 Sierra and the launch of the career of our new police service dog, K-9 Jager.

Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra served the Tomah Police Department from June of 2000 until October of 2009, which is a quite lengthy career for a dual-purpose police service dog – especially a large German Shepherd Dog. K-9 Sierra will now transition from a work dog to a family pet and will continue to live with Sergeant Weaver and his family.

Planning for replacement of K-9 Sierra began early in 2009. All of the funding for the acquisition of K-9 Jager was gathered through community donations and grants, which allowed for continuation of the K-9 program without impacting the Tomah Police Department operating budget. Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra attended many of these fundraising events. We are extremely proud to be able to have developed such a high level of community support through years of providing quality service to the citizens of the City of Tomah.

Officer Aaron Hintz was selected as the new K-9 handler and traveled to Tarheel Canine Training, Inc. in North Carolina to select his new partner. Officer Hintz selected K-9 Jager as a partner and then returned to North Carolina for a month of intensive training in patrol work and drug detection. Upon completion of their initial training Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager returned to Tomah and hit the streets approximately one week later. The transition from K-9 Sierra to K-9 Jager was seamless due to the purchase of a replacement K-9 vehicle that Officer Hintz was able to take to training prior to the vehicle being completely outfitted. Sergeant Weaver and K-9 Sierra continued working until Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager were back from training and the police department was only without a K-9 for the time it took to switch the equipment from the old vehicle to the new vehicle.

K-9 Jager has adapted well to his new job and within the first week of starting his duties participated in a drug investigation that resulted in the seizure of a large quantity of marijuana, a pistol and the suspect's vehicle.

## 2009 MONROE COUNTY COMBINED TACTICAL UNIT ANNUAL REPORT

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department, and Monroe County Sheriff's Department. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit was activated ten times in 2009. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

January 2 – CTH I, rural Sparta – High Risk Search Warrant. CTU served a search warrant for the Monroe County Sheriff Department at a residence and outbuildings on CTH I. The La Crosse Police Department Emergency Response Team also assisted. Information from the investigators was that this was a large "Rave" party. Approximately 30 people were detained at the location including several who fled and were tracked down in the wooded area surrounding the location.

July 13 – Walrath St., Sparta – High Risk Search Warrant. Sparta Police Department Investigators requested CTU serve a search warrant at a residence. The suspect of the search warrant was reportedly armed. The suspect was observed leaving the residence by a CTU scouting team and was arrested during a high-risk traffic stop.

February 7 – Main St., Black River Falls – Search Warrant. CTU served a high-risk search warrant for the Jackson County Sheriff Department on Main St. in Black River Falls. Several search warrants were served by multiple law enforcement agencies at the culmination of a lengthy drug investigation.

March 21 – Colton Ct., Warrens – Barricaded Suspect. CTU responded to apprehend a suspect who was wanted and fled from a traffic stop. Deputies tracked the suspect to the residence and observed him inside with a shotgun. CTU eventually entered the residence and found the suspect hiding in a closet with several firearms.

April 8 – N. Glendale Ave., Tomah – Barricaded Suspect. CTU responded to assist with suicidal armed subject. The subject exited the apartment building and when he attempted to return inside a CTU officer struck the subject with less-lethal projectiles and he was arrested without further incident.

July 24 – Old Glendale Rd., Kendall -- High Risk Search Warrant. Monroe County Sheriff Department requested CTU serve a drug search warrant where the suspect was known to be armed. Search warrant was served without incident.

August 19 – Carol Kay St., Tomah – Barricaded Suspect. CTU responded to assist with a wanted subject who had barricaded himself inside a friend's trailer. The subject had access to numerous firearms inside the trailer and was heard pounding inside the trailer, potentially fortifying his position. The subject surrendered to CTU perimeter units prior to CTU completing deploying at the location.



September 28 – Owl Ave., rural Kendall – High Risk Search Warrant. Monroe County Sheriff Department detectives requested CTU serve a search warrant at a high value marijuana grow. Search warrant was served and two subjects detained without incident.

October 5 – US 12, rural Tomah – High Risk Search Warrant. Monroe County Sheriff Department detectives requested CTU serve a search warrant at a high value marijuana grow. Search warrant was served and four subjects detained without incident

October 6 – Owl Ave., rural Kendall – High Risk Arrest. Monroe County Sheriff Department detectives requested CTU respond to arrest marijuana growers who were reported to be arriving from out of state to harvest their crop. CTU personnel surrounded the area, but the suspects did not arrive.

## **2009 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT**

In 2009, the Department purchased one new laptop computer, one monitor, one laser jet printer and two new squad radios.

Additionally, the Department upgraded to Microsoft Office 2007. This upgrade enhanced the Department's Call Pilot function on the phone system, as well as providing enhanced communication capability with the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

Updates were installed to the Department's Records Management System (ITI), as well as to Badger TraCS.

Air cards were installed in all of the squad cars to continue the transition to a wireless network as well as obtaining wireless access to the records system.

The Department installed and successfully implemented CVR (Computerized Vehicle Registration) software enabling the Department to title, register and license cars, light trucks and motorcycles.

The Department was awarded monies through the Homeland Security Grant. These grant monies were awarded for the purpose of meeting the 2013 Interoperability communication requirements. Seven handheld radios and one squad radio were purchased with these monies.

## 2009 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department have eleven vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. Vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

Two 2009 Ford Crown Victorias were added to our fleet to replace old patrol vehicles. Additionally, a third Crown Victoria previously assigned to the K-9 Unit was replaced with a 2009 Chevrolet Tahoe. The department seized a 1999 Chevrolet Tahoe during a drug arrest and were awarded the vehicle through the Monroe County Courts. That vehicle was added to our fleet and will be used for special purposes in the near future.

Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black/white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigator and Shift Supervisor are unmarked patrol vehicles.

All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with radar, Mobile Data Computers (MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators (AED), In-car audio / video recording, digital cameras, Stinger spike systems, Preliminary Breath Tests (PBT) and other specialized items.

In 2009, officers from the Tomah Police Department logged over 190,000 miles in all police vehicles.

## 2009 COMMUNITY SERVICES ACTIVITIES ANNUAL REPORT

In 2009, the members of the Police Department were again busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

### **Bike Rodeo**

Once again in August, the Police Department held it's annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo. It was held in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Several members of the Police Department volunteered their time to assist with running the event.

Participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members are used to purchase bicycles, safety helmets, roller blades, bike locks, games and other items that are given away to children who participate in the safety courses.

This event would not be possible without the donations from the community and the assistance of the members of the Police Department.

### **Special Olympics**

Each year members of the Police Department take part in the Polar Plunge and Law Enforcement Torch Run. At least one member of the Police Department takes a plunge into the frozen Mississippi River to help raise money for Special Olympics.

Other members of the Police Department, along with some members of the community, participate in the Law Enforcement Torch Run. Our bicycle route is from Tomah to Port Edwards.

### **Tours**

Throughout the year, the Department provides tours of the Police Department building to the Kindergarten Classes in the school district. Members of the Fire Department and Ambulance Service also assist with the tours. During the tour the children are shown a video in regards to using the 911 system. They are then able to see a police car, ambulance and fire trucks up close, and are even invited to sit inside them. At the end of their tour they are provided with a "goodie" bag that includes stickers, coloring books, a pencil and other safety information.

## 2009 DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION ANNUAL REPORT

### D.A.R.E.

The Tomah D.A.R.E program is still the only one in Monroe County. Officer Marshall is the current D.A.R.E instructor for all of the elementary schools in the City of Tomah.

The ten-week course is divided amongst five schools in the city, with half of the classes being taught in the fall and half in the spring. The D.A.R.E program focuses on educating students about the harmful effects of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and inhalants. D.A.R.E is taught to approximately two hundred 5<sup>th</sup> graders each year.

The first day of D.A.R.E class is an introduction day. Officer Marshall introduces herself and allows the children to ask any questions they may have, since time is limited during D.A.R.E. class. The students are given a D.A.R.E t-shirt, and to show their support, they are encouraged to wear their t-shirt on D.A.R.E days. They also are provided with a D.A.R.E workbook and pens and pencils.

In order to successfully graduate from the D.A.R.E program students are required to complete a written essay about what they learned during D.A.R.E classes. Successful graduates participate in a small graduation ceremony where they are presented with D.A.R.E certificates.

The D.A.R.E program can be considered as a form of community policing. Students begin to relate to Officer Marshall as a person and not just as a law enforcement role. The contact that Officer Marshall has with the 5<sup>th</sup> graders allows them to realize that police officers are not as intimidating as they believe. Officer Marshall has numerous contacts with the students after teaching them, and some of them and their families specifically come to Officer Marshall with their police concerns.

The City of Tomah is able to continue the D.A.R.E program due to donations received from business and organizations in the City. Their donated money is used to purchase the D.A.R.E t-shirts, workbooks, pens and pencils and graduation certificates for each of the students involved in the D.A.R.E program.
