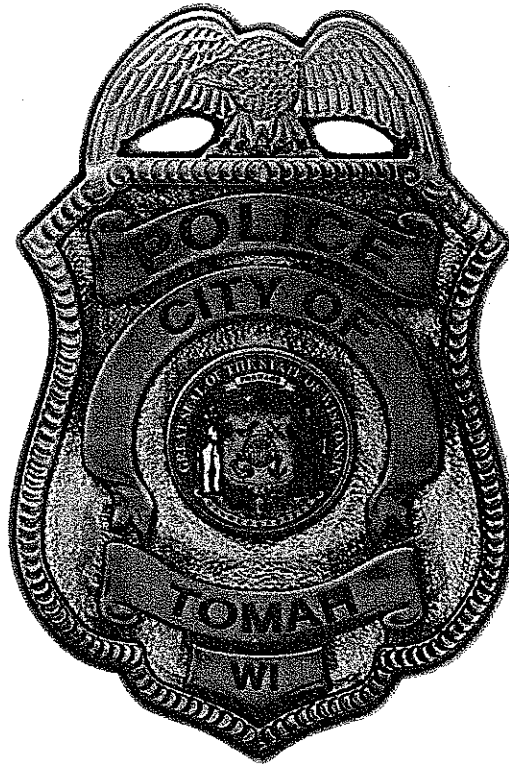

LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life.

I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

2010 ACHIEVEMENTS

DOWNTOWN TOMAH – Continued our ongoing involvement with this group to assist in their goals to revitalize the downtown area.

ANDRES DONATION – G.R.E.A.T. \$5,000.00 – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant for the G.R.E.A.T. Program, as well as other crime prevention initiatives from the Andres Foundation. These monies will be used to implement the G.R.E.A.T. Program at Tomah Middle School and a summer program in cooperation with the Tomah Boys and Girls Club. These monies will also be used to support other crime prevention initiatives.

THOMAS EARLE GRANT – LAPTOP \$2,000 – The Department received a \$2,000.00 grant for use in purchasing the necessary hardware and software for use by our Investigator.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF DRUG DIVERSION INVESTIGATORS – SURVEILLANCE EQUIPMENT - \$5,000 – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant from NADDI. These monies have been used to purchase surveillance equipment.

STATE OF WISCONSIN BUREAU OF TRANSPORTATION SAFETY - \$4,000.00 – The Department received a \$4,000.00 grant for use in purchasing equipment related to traffic enforcement.

STATE OF WISCONSIN OFFICE OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE – SMALL POLICE AGENCY - \$5,554.00- The Department received a \$5,554.00 grant for use in outfitting a vehicle to be used as a Neighborhood Nuisance Surveillance Vehicle.

STATE OF WISCONSIN OFFICE OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE EDWARD BRYNES MEMORIAL GRANT - \$3,589.75- The Department received a \$3,589.75 grant for use in purchasing the base station equipment for use in the mutual aid radio channel.

CARD GRANT - \$4,000.00 – The Department received a \$4,000.00 grant for use in offsetting overtime expenses associated with Alcohol Compliance Checks.

STATE OF WISCONSIN BUREAU OF TRANSPORTATION SAFETY \$3,570.85 – The Department received a \$3,570.85 grant for use in purchasing a MDC (Mobile Data Computer) and associated equipment for use in a squad car.

FOCUS ON DRUG ENFORCEMENT – We will continue placing a high priority on the development of cases related to the sale and distribution of narcotics to include pharmaceuticals. Those that chose to profit from the sale and distribution of illegal substances need to be held accountable.

BULLETPROOF VEST PURCHASE REIMBURSEMENT – Once again our Department has been awarded federal grant monies to partially reimburse the purchase price of the bulletproof vests worn by Department personnel.

DONATION FROM WALMART – The Department received two donations from Walmart in the amounts of \$500.00 and \$1,000.00 respectively. The \$1,000.00 donation was used to purchase a stair master for use in the physical fitness room and the \$500.00 donation was used in association with the Community Services Program.

SARA PROJECT – The Department continues to utilize this model in the downtown area. This program was devised to address growing concerns in the bar district relating to liquor license violations, fights and public nuisance violations. Through this concentrated patrol approach, improvements have been realized in all areas of concern. This Project has also increased the communication between bar owners, bartenders and our Department in a positive manner. The continued support that the Department receives from the Common Council is a valuable part in reducing the concerns that we have in the downtown.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – National Night Out was once again held in August in Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens could participate in the Bike/Blading Rodeo, as well as view demonstrations from many different groups addressing various safety-related issues and community concerns.

DEPARTMENT WEBSITE – The Department website continues to expand and provide more information and useful links to our community. This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is www.tomahpolice.com.

DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM – This year the Department participated in a program sponsored by the Drug Enforcement Agency which facilitated a community-wide event. By participating in this program we were afforded the opportunity to dispose of all of our unwanted medication at no cost. The Department continues to offer a Medication Drop Off Container located in the lobby of the Department for use by citizens who wish to dispose of their unwanted medications.

INCREASE IN LOBBY HOURS – The Department has hired a part-time person who works until 8:30 p.m. thus increasing our lobby hours. An additional part-time person will be hired by the end of 2010.

TRANSITION TO A WEB-BASED PROCESS FOR TRACS AND E-TIME – The Department successfully implemented this technology to provide information generated in TraCS to E-Time.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM – The Department successfully worked with the school district to fully integrate this Program within the district and expand upon its functions.

“COPS IN SHOPS”/COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department successfully participated in the “Cops in Shops”/Compliance Checks focusing on alcohol compliance in the community.

G.R.E.A.T. PROGRAM – The Department has successfully worked with the school district to introduce and launch the G.R.E.A.T. Program at the Middle School.

ACISS – The Department has successfully implemented the MEG Unit database program “ACISS” for use in drug investigations.

GIVING TREE – The Department successfully hosted the Giving Tree which provided Christmas gifts to 34 children from our community.

ANIMAL ORDINANCE WORKGROUP – Through a cooperative effort with members of the community, the Department reviewed/revised/drafted and offered recommendations to the Common Council for all animal-related City ordinances.

2011 GOALS

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TASK FORCE ARRESTS – In 2011 the Department will continue its focus on the enforcement of prescription drug-related violations and arrests.

CITIZEN'S POLICE ACADEMY - Due to budgetary constraints, this program had been placed on hold. In 2011, we hope to again conduct an Academy.

ALDERS AND CONSTITUENTS – Continue to work with any interested Alders in providing information, training and services specific to their districts and constituents.

"PARENTS WHO HOST" – Continue to work with this countywide group to increase awareness and enforcement relating to parents who choose to host underage alcohol parties.

LICENSE HOLDERS - Continue our efforts in working with the License holders to address any concerns and reinforce the progress attained during the SARA Project.

TEAM BUILDING – Focus on increasing the cooperation with other Department Heads, which will enhance the police department's ability to transition to an increased emphasis on problem solving.

BIKE PATROL - In 2010, we began a renewed effort to use the bike patrol. In 2011, we will continue placing an emphasis on this Program in an effort to establish additional community contacts, as well as to be more environmentally and fiscally responsible.

VIDEO CONFERENCING WITH THE DA'S OFFICE – Focus on implementing this technology in an effort to minimize the amount of time officers are required to travel to Sparta for Motion and Preliminary Hearings. This could also be used in trial preparation when possible.

G.R.E.A.T PROGRAM – Work with the Tomah Boys and Girls Club to implement the G.R.E.A.T. Program as part of their summer programming.

POLICING MANAGEMENT PRINCIPLES - Work toward implementation of a stronger understanding with staff members focusing on current policing management principles.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Continue with the professional development of Department Members.

MUNICIPAL COURT – Continue to work with other members of the Criminal Justice System to explore ways to increase the number of cases handled in Municipal Court and reduce the number of cases referred to Circuit Court.

"COPS IN SHOPS"/COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department has applied for the "Cops in Shops"/Compliance Checks grant for the purpose of continuing alcohol compliance within our community. If received, this program will be continued in 2011.

INTEROPERABILITY REQUIREMENTS – The Department will continue to move forward with purchasing communication equipment necessary to meet the interoperability requirements of 2013.

TRAFFIC STOP DATA COLLECTION – The Department will implement the state-mandated Traffic Stop Data Collection initiative.

CUSTODIAN TRANSITION – The Department will transition from a private cleaning service to a part-time employee for custodial duties.

2010 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION ANNUAL REPORT

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. Upon completion of these steps, the Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the Department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result; that is, a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and to the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Mark Nicholson and supervised by Sergeant Scott Holum. The Field Training Officers are Officer Paul Sloan, Officer Brittnay Westpfahl, Officer Joshua Kenworthy and Officer David Schneider.

2010 was a busy year for the Field Training Unit. Officer Nathan Stafford began employment with the department in November of 2009 and resigned in 2010. Officer Jennifer Helgerson was hired to replace Officer Stafford. Officer Helgerson successfully completed the Field Training program and was placed on solo patrol. Officer Helgerson is performing at a high level and has proven to be an asset to our Department.

2010 INVESTIGATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Tomah Police Department Case 10-0114

On January 15, 2010 Walmart reported information to the Tomah Police Department regarding an employee that was stealing a large amount of electronic items from the store. It was reported that many stolen items were being stored at a residence. Another employee at the store that was related to the suspect in this case was interviewed and consented to a search of the residence where the stolen property was reportedly being stored. Approximately \$20,000.00 worth of stolen property was recovered from this residence. The suspect cooperated with police and reported that another employee at Walmart was involved with the thefts and the stolen property was being used to trade for cocaine that was being sold in Monroe County and Juneau County. The cooperating employee was able to make arrangements to purchase cocaine from the other employee. This occurred in Elroy. A search warrant was executed at the Elroy residence and more cocaine and marijuana was located during the search. The owner of the residence in Elroy cooperated with police and arranged for his drug source to obtain cocaine from a source in Tomah. When the drug source met with a subject in Tomah to obtain cocaine this was observed by police. The subjects who delivered the cocaine to the Elroy drug source were stopped by police, as well as the drug source for the person from Elroy that picked up cocaine to deliver to Elroy. Cocaine, oxycontin and marijuana were located. A search warrant was obtained for the residence of the subject who delivered the cocaine to the drug source for the person in Elroy. Discovered at the residence were several ounces of cocaine, several ounces of marijuana and a large amount of money. Another search warrant had also been executed at the Elroy residence and approximately \$30,000.00 worth of property believed to have been stolen from Walmart was recovered. Some of the subjects were charged in both Monroe County and Juneau County for the theft and drug charges in this case. This was a case that took several months to investigate involving several jurisdictions and containing over 1200 items of evidence. The second Walmart suspect that lives in Elroy is scheduled for trial in January of 2011 in Monroe County.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-0161

Tomah Officers were dispatched to the Tomah High School for a reported Burglary. Upon arrival Officers were able to determine that a subject or subjects had forcibly entered the school property. Taken during the burglary were several items of food and electronic equipment. Officers began to investigate and their investigation led to an address on Clark Street in the City of Tomah. Two subjects were located at this address and both admitted to their respective involvement in the burglary. Both subjects were taken into custody and transported to the Monroe County Jail.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-0850

On April 27, 2010 the Tomah Police Department responded to a Woodard Avenue residence and discovered the body of Vance Evans. Vance Evans was deceased and there was an apparent gunshot wound to the head. Over the next several months hundreds of hours of investigation were conducted into the death of Vance Evans, which was determined to be a homicide. A suspect was identified and a lengthy investigation resulted in the arrest of Tammy Cole from Big Rock, Illinois. Tammy Cole is currently in custody and is awaiting trial in Monroe County for 1st Degree Intentional Homicide and attempted arson. Much of this investigation involved cellular telephone records and investigation in Illinois where the suspect resided. This involved search warrants and working with several different law enforcement jurisdictions in Wisconsin and Illinois, as well as Prosecutors in Illinois. The trial is scheduled for March of 2011.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-0956

Tomah Officers assisted with a low speed traffic pursuit involving a semi-tractor and trailer. The semi was traveling into oncoming traffic and had swerved at a Police vehicle. The pursuit culminated on the west side of the City of Sparta. The Tomah Police Department Combined Tactical Unit members were activated to assist with the arrest of the vehicle operator. The La Crosse County Bearcat was utilized to affect the safe arrest of the vehicle operator.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-1343

Tomah Officers were dispatched to the Farmers and Merchants Bank-North Branch for a reported robbery. Additional information was that the suspect would be at a location near the bank. Officers arrived on scene and located the suspect. The suspect was taken into custody without incident. The suspect was eventually interviewed and admitted to the robbery. The suspect was transported to the Monroe County Jail.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-1381

On July 2, 2010 the Tomah Police Department received information from a pizza delivery man that marijuana was being smoked at a room at Daybreak Motel in Tomah when pizza was delivered to the motel room. Surveillance was established on the motel room and people were observed coming and going from the room. A search warrant was obtained for the motel room. During the search, officers located a small amount of marijuana and a large amount of crack cocaine. Money was also recovered from the occupants of the room. The occupants of the motel room were identified as two gang members from Chicago with ties to LaCrosse. One of the subjects had drug contacts in Tomah and had sold crack cocaine to people in Tomah in the past. The subjects were arrested for several drug-related felony charges. The cases are pending in court at this time.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-1576

In July and August of 2010 the Tomah Police Department was involved in a drug investigation related to cocaine distribution. A confidential source was able to make controlled purchases of

cocaine from another subject in Tomah during this time. The confidential source was also able to accompany the Tomah drug source to meet with their source in Sparta. The confidential source was able to make purchases of cocaine directly from the Sparta source after meeting this person a couple times. Ultimately, search warrants were executed at the residence of the Tomah drug source and the residence of the Sparta drug source. Several ounces of cocaine were located in the residence of the Sparta drug source during this investigation. Another drug source from Sparta was identified as well. The suspect from Tomah and the two suspects from Sparta have all been arrested and there are pending court cases for felony drug charges at this time.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-1628

On August 4, 2010 Officers were dispatched to a report of a stolen vehicle in the 400 block of East Washington Street. A Mercury Mariner had been stolen from that location. During this time it was also learned that the Monroe County Sheriff's Department was dispatched to an accident on CTH M and Flax Road. The vehicle involved in the accident was gone when police arrived and a Mercury bumper was located at the accident scene. A short time later a complaint was received involving a Honda driving in Tomah on the rim. The vehicle was located in the 300 block of Glendale Avenue unoccupied and believed to be stolen, which was verified with the owner of the Honda. The Mercury Mariner was located near Tunnel City. During the course of the investigation a possible suspect was identified. The suspect consented to the police obtaining DNA swabs from him and the stolen vehicle was processed for DNA evidence. The Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory matched evidence recovered from the stolen vehicle to the suspect. The suspect was charged with the theft of the vehicle due to this investigation, which was largely based upon the collection and processing of DNA evidence.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-1650

Tomah Officers were on foot patrol in the downtown bar district when they observed a fight in front of Dimensions Bar. As Officers were attempting to intervene a male subject punched another male subject in the face knocking him unconscious. Officers immediately summonsed medical treatment for the subject that was lying unconscious on the sidewalk. A Tomah Officer deployed his department issued Electronic Control Device (ECD) and fired it at the aggressive male subject, who was still trying to fight other patrons. The ECD was effective and allowed the Officers to take this subject into custody without any further incident. During this chaotic scene, that was in the middle of 75-100 citizens, a male subject walked towards Officers in the street and refused to stop even after being verbally instructed to several times. This male subject then turned around, pulled his pants down and "mooned" the Tomah Officers as well as the male subject that had been taken into custody. This action energized the crowd and was creating an even more chaotic scene for Officers to handle. This subject was also taken into custody. The male subject that punched the other was referred to the Monroe County District Attorney for Felony Battery charges. The male subject that entered the street and lowered his pants was cited for Disorderly Conduct and released.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-2260

Tomah Officers were dispatched to the Break Room Bar for a fight in progress. Officers were informed that a fight had occurred in the alley behind the bar. Officers arrived on scene and located a male subject who was bleeding profusely from the mouth and was also spitting teeth out into his hand. The subject was the victim and was taken to Tomah Memorial Hospital for treatment. The suspect had fled prior to Police arrival but had been identified by three people, including the victim. The victim suffered several broken teeth and the victim's jaw was broken in two locations. The suspect had been contacted and stated he would turn himself into the Police on 10-25-10. On 10-26-10 the suspect turned himself in at the Tomah Police Department and was taken to the Monroe County Jail on charges of Aggravated Battery and Disorderly Conduct.

Tomah Police Department Case 10-2678

Tomah Officers received information that a 16-year-old juvenile had run away from his residence in the State of California and was believed to be traveling by Grey Hound to an address in Monroe County. The Grey Hound Bus Depot was checked several times for the juvenile as it was believed the juvenile would be arriving in Tomah. Two days after the Tomah Police Department received this information Tomah Officers observed a vehicle that matched a vehicle from a residence in Monroe County where this juvenile was supposed to be going. The vehicle was stopped and the juvenile was located in the backseat. The adult female was not cooperative with Law Enforcement and was actually aiding the juvenile by taking him to the adult female's residence. The adult female had previously been contacted by the Monroe County Sheriff's Department and instructed to report the location of the juvenile as soon as the adult female knew. The adult female had driven past the Tomah Police Department while she was en route to her residence, making it clear that she wasn't interested in following the required instructions from Law Enforcement and in fact was interfering with a child custody matter. The adult female was taken to Jail.

2010 School Resource Officer Report

The year 2010 was the third year that Officer Marshall served as the School Resource Officer for the school district. Officer Marshall has an office at the Tomah High School but also serves the other schools in the City of Tomah.

Officer Marshall handles a wide variety of calls within the school district. Truancy, disorderly conduct, battery, and drug violations are just a small amount of the different types of calls that the School Resource Officer handles.

Officer Marshall also works closely with Monroe County Human Services in regards to abuse investigations involving students or monitoring students that are on supervision through Human Services with the ISP program.

Officer Marshall is directly involved in many different activities within the school district such as: Child Development Day, Reality Check, Prom, Homecoming, Project Wisdom, Tomah High School Career Fair, and other special events. Officer Marshall has also been a guest in some of the high school health, driver's education and teen parenting classes, and she has worked at numerous sporting events.

Officer Marshall serves as a resource for both the staff and students. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regards to any concerns or questions they may have. She has also been available for the staff to use as a resource.

Officer Marshall taught D.A.R.E to 5th grade students in the elementary schools and provided tours of the police department to kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall works closely with the High School Administration regarding the safety and security of the high school students and building. As a result of the working relationship truancy and tobacco citations have decreased.

2010 K-9 Unit Annual Report

The Tomah Police K-9 Unit consists of Officer Aaron Hintz and his partner, K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz has worked for the Department since September 2005 and was selected as the next K-9 Handler in 2009 to take over after the retirement of K-9 Sierra.

In June 2009 Officer Hintz traveled to Sanford North Carolina and visited Tarheel Canine Training Inc. Officer Hintz was able to look at several dogs and ultimately selected K-9 Jager. K-9 Jager is a male sable German Shepherd Dog that came from the Czech Republic. Officer Hintz traveled back to Tarheel Canine in September of 2009 for 4 weeks of training with K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager successfully completed training together in a variety of different areas.

Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager work together on the scheduled shift, but are also on-call to assist members of the Department with situations where K-9 Jager could be of assistance. K-9 Jager is a dual-purpose patrol dog. The term "dual-purpose" suggests two jobs; this is somewhat deceiving. First, K-9 Jager is trained as a patrol dog, providing handler protection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches and area searches. Secondly, K-9 Jager is also trained as a drug detector dog. He is trained to detect and alert to the odor associated with marijuana, cocaine/crack, methamphetamine and heroin. In addition to these trained jobs, K-9 Jager serves as a community relations tool for the Department. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager train together on a regular basis in order to stay proficient in the different tasks K-9 Jager is trained to perform.

Interesting K9 Cases for 2010

2-6-10 Reference Case #10-0238

Burglary / Home Invasion: At 0308 hrs Sgt. Holum and Officer Hintz were dispatched to 1117 Hollister Avenue for an intruder in the complainant's residence. This intruder was unknown to the complainant and it was unclear what his intentions were. Sgt. Holum and Officer Hintz were also advised that the complainant was holding the suspect at gun point. Upon their arrival Officer Hintz deployed K-9 Jager to assist. This added another use of force option and would have assisted in the apprehension of the suspect had he fled. Sgt Holum and Officer Hintz were able to order the suspect out of the house and positioned him where they wanted him. K-9 Jager's presence helped gain compliance and the subject was taken into custody without incident.

5-13-10 Reference Case #10-0918

Agency Assist – Semi Pursuit: Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager, along with Sgt. Weaver responded to the scene of a stand off that started at the end of an approximately 20 mile pursuit. Once they arrived on scene Officer Hintz deployed K-9 Jager and moved to a position next to the lead squad car. Officer Hintz directed K-9 Jager to watch the semi and he did. K-9 Jager clearly made his presence known as he watched from a down position. Once the suspect exited the semi and moved back towards us, K-9 Jager made an attempt to apprehend the suspect. However, the suspect returned to the cab of the semi before K-9 Jager reached him. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager provided cover and assisted in gaining compliance partially due to K-9 Jager's behavior and presence. Once the suspect was in custody officers moved up to the cab of the semi utilizing the Bearcat (an armored vehicle) for cover. After they were in position Officer Hintz directed K-9 Jager up into the cab to clear it for any other hidden suspects. K-9 Jager cleared the cab and returned to Officer Hintz indicating the cab of the semi was clear/safe. The La Crosse Police Department's explosive K-9 eventually arrived and alerted to the presence of some type of explosive coming from the trailer. It was later confirmed the trailer did not contain any explosives.

6-4-10 Reference Case #10-1145

Building Clearing – Residence: Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager were called in to assist with the clearing of a residence that had been broken into. The entry was quite fresh with the possibility that someone was hiding inside the residence. Officer Hintz arrived and deployed K-9 Jager. From the garage we moved down the stairs to the door at the bottom of the stairs. Officer Hintz opened the door and gave my K-9 warnings with no response. Officer Hintz directed K-9 Jager to search and he checked the entire basement. Officers then moved upstairs and cleared the main floor the same way. K-9 Jager allowed us to clear the residence in a safer fashion than without him. Officers were able to keep positions of cover while K-9 Jager checked different areas for the intruder.

7-10-10

Possible Burglary/Home Invasion: Officers received a call from a female who advised she had locked herself in her bedroom and could hear what she believed was someone in her living room. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager responded and took a position on the corner of the apartment building and waited for additional officers to arrive. Sgt. Weaver arrived shortly after Officer Hintz and took a position on another corner providing complete coverage of the apartment building. Officers made contact with the caller and assisted her out of her bedroom window. Sgt. Weaver and Officer Hintz then entered the bedroom through the window. Once inside Officer Hintz called for K-9 Jager and he jumped through the window to join Sgt. Weaver and Officer Hintz in the bedroom. Officer Hintz provided a K-9 announcement and released K-9 Jager to search the apartment off leash. K-9 Jager searched the apartment and came back to Sgt. Weaver and Officer Hintz indicating there was no one there. Sgt. Weaver, Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager then cleared the apartment a second time to confirm this. Sgt. Weaver and Officer Hintz did locate a number of balloons that were moving into the ceiling fan and then getting knocked away and then back again. This created the sound the caller heard and matched her description of what she thought she was hearing.

2010 Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit Annual Report

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department, and Monroe County Sheriff's Department. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit was activated three times in 2010. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

March 19 – Hardwood Road, rural Sparta – High Risk Search Warrant. CTU served a search warrant for the Sparta Police Department at a residence on Hardwood Road. Information from the investigators was that this search warrant was obtained as part of an ongoing drug investigation and that the occupant of the residence was known to be armed. Investigators obtained authorization for the search warrant to be served in a "no knock" fashion. The warrant was served and the residence was secured without incident. CTU Personnel also provided security at the scene and detained one subject who arrived at the residence during the search.

August 19 – John Street, Sparta – High Risk Search Warrant. After a cooperative drug investigation between the Tomah Police Department and Sparta Police Department investigators requested CTU serve a search warrant at a residence. CTU was requested to serve the search warrant due to the relatively large amount of cocaine that was potentially at the location and the potential that the suspects would be armed. The search warrant was served in a "no knock" manner and one suspect was located in the living room of the residence and detained without incident. No other suspects were located in the residence. CTU personnel provided security at the residence during the search.

August 27 – Kilbourn Avenue, Tomah – Barricaded Subject. Tomah Police conducted a traffic stop and during the course of the investigation a subject fled into his residence. Due to prior information regarding the subject's mental state and possession of firearms a CTU call-out was initiated. CTU negotiators attempted to contact the subject for several hours and eventually chemical agents were fired into the residence. Ultimately CTU personnel entered the residence and found that the subject was not inside.

2010 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT

The following enhancements or upgrades were made in the area of Information Technology or electronic communications:

Two new Mobile Data Computers were purchased for the squad cars. One of the computers and docking stations was purchased via the Wisconsin Department of Transportation "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" unfunded grant process.

Four new digital cameras were purchased. Three of the cameras are point and shoot type digital cameras. The other is a SLR Digital camera which will assist in taking telephoto and macro pictures.

A new DVD player was purchased.

During 2010 our in-house camera recording system received an enhancement and a software upgrade. An input/output switch was installed in the front interview room which will allow officers to record interviews with citizens in this room. The software which runs this program, Geo Vision, was updated to the most current version.

A new printer was purchased and installed in the Booking Room.

The Department applied for and received a grant through the National Association of Drug Diversion Investigators Association. This grant allowed the Department to upgrade our Body Wire Receiver to a digital format. This grant was also used to purchase covert audio/video equipment.

A new laptop computer was purchased for use by the Investigator. The laptop was purchased to replace the computer located on the Investigator's desk. The laptop and docking station allows the Investigator to remove the computer from the docking station and take it with him/her when needed. These items were purchased from monies obtained from the Thomas Earle Grant.

An update was completed to the departments TraCS System. "TraCS 2011" (Traffic and Criminal Software) is a software system administered by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. TraCS allows officers to issue computer generated citations and crash reports from mobile data computers or computers located within the Department. The TraCS process then allows for the citations and crash reports to be sent to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation in an electronic format. "TraCS 2011" will also supply information to the State of Wisconsin related to the Traffic Stop Data Collection initiative which begins January 1, 2011.

During 2010 members of the Department were trained to use the ACISS system. ACISS is an internet based program that the Department will be required to use when it conducts narcotics investigations with the West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group (WCMEG). ACISS integrates investigative information such as addresses, vehicles, subjects, telephones, financial information, and physical evidence in a format accessible by other narcotics investigators throughout the State of Wisconsin.

2009 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department has eleven vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. Vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

One 2010 Ford Crown Victoria was added to our fleet to replace one old patrol vehicle.

Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black/white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigator and Shift Supervisor are unmarked patrol vehicles.

All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with radar, Mobile Data Computers (MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators (AED), In-car audio / video recording, digital cameras, Stinger spike systems, Preliminary Breath Tests (PBT) and other specialized items.

2010 Community Service Activities

In 2010 the members of the Police Department were again busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

Bike and Blading Safety Expo

In August the Police Department held its annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo. It was held in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Several members of the Police Department volunteered their time to assist with running the event, along with associates from the Wal-Mart Distribution Center and other community members.

Participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members are used to purchase bicycles, safety helmets, roller blades, bike locks, games and other items are given away to children who participate in the safety courses.

This event would not be possible without the donations from the community and the assistance of members of the Police Department and the Monroe County Sheriff's Reserve.

Special Olympics

Each year members of the Police Department take part in the Polar Plunge and Law Enforcement Torch Run. At least one member of the Police Department takes a plunge into the frozen Mississippi River to help raise money for Special Olympics.

Members of the Police Department, together with some members of the community, participate in the Law Enforcement Torch Run. Our bicycle route is from Tomah to Port Edwards.

Tours

Throughout the year the Department provides tours of the Police Department building to the Kindergarten Classes in the school district. Members of the Fire Department and Ambulance Service also assist with the tours. During the tour the children are shown a video in regards to using the 911 system. They are then able to see a police car, ambulance and fire trucks up close, and are even invited to sit inside them. At the end of their tour they are provided with a "goodie" bag that includes stickers, coloring books, a pencil and other safety information.

The Department also provides tours to child care centers, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and other groups who request a tour. On occasion, officers go to other facilities to provide information on a particular topic. These special requests keep us busy throughout the year.

School District Events

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day sponsored by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information regarding child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to participants.

At the elementary level, Officer Marshall teaches D.A.R.E. to fifth grade students in the school district, including the parochial schools. She also recently began teaching G.R.E.A.T. to middle school students as a replacement to the D.A.R.E. program.

The Middle School holds an event they call Reality Check, that the Police Department takes part in. This can be best described as similar to the game, LIFE. The students have to learn to budget money in order to support themselves and their family. The Police Department issues citations to students for various offenses, similar to things that could happen in real life.

High school students interested in a career in law enforcement are able to participate in a ride-along prearranged by the High School. Students are able to spend a few hours riding with an officer and observing the work day. Students come with a prepared list of questions for the officers and the officers complete an evaluation of the student, which is sent back to the school.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at the High School. Topics range from driver's education training, traffic enforcement, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

Car Seat Safety Inspections

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from the Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Tomah Memorial Hospital, provide free car seat safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is passed out and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost. In the case of financial need they are provided to families free of charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a State Grant in which they purchased car seats and provided them to families who received county support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats during WIC events around the county.

Without the support of Wal-Mart, the Wal-Mart Distribution Center, Culver's, Subway, Mathews of Sparta, and other organizations, we would not be able to provide car seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week regarding car seat safety and safety seat inspections.

Child Fingerprinting

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an identification kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

National Night Out

Once again with the help of Tomah Memorial Hospital, Monroe County Triad, Wal-Mart Distribution Center and the Monroe County Safe Community Coalition, we held our 8th Annual Monroe County National Night Out. Organizations from around the area were invited to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public coming out to see what was offered.

A Police K-9 demonstration was held along with a mock crash and other demonstrations.

The Police Department's Bike and Blading Safety Expo was also held in conjunction with National Night Out. We will continue to hold the two events together in the park.

Monroe County Safe Community Coalition

The Department participates in the county wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seat belt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking and underage alcohol.

Fort McCoy Morale, Wellness, and Recreation Days

For the past several years the Department has been represented at the Fort McCoy MWR event by our K9 unit. The military and its members are an important part of Tomah. This event provides us with an opportunity to offer ourselves as a resource and build relationships with military personnel living in the Tomah area.

Tomah Business and Industry Committee

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach coordinates this Committee. The Committee meets every two months and is made up of representatives from Tomah Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, workplace safety and employee health are all discussed.

Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee

This consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim/Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders Office, Jail Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

Others

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, stranger danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the police department.

Drug Abuse Resistance Education
Gang Resistance Education And Training

During the first part of the year 2010 Officer Marshall completed teaching D.A.R.E to the 5th grade students attending school in the City of Tomah.

The ten-week course is divided amongst five schools in the city, with half of the classes being taught in the fall and half in the spring. The D.A.R.E program focuses on educating students about the harmful effects of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana and inhalants. D.A.R.E is taught to approximately two hundred 5th graders each year.

In order to successfully graduate from the D.A.R.E program students are required to complete a written essay about what they learned during D.A.R.E classes. Successful graduates participate in a small graduation ceremony where they are presented with D.A.R.E certificates.

The D.A.R.E program can be considered as a form of community policing. Students begin to relate to Officer Marshall as a person and not just as a law enforcement role. The contact that Officer Marshall has with the 5th graders allows them to realize that police officers are not as intimidating as they may believe. Officer Marshall has numerous contacts with the students after teaching them, and some of them and their families specifically come to Officer Marshall with their police concerns.

The City of Tomah was able to continue the D.A.R.E program due to donations received from business and organizations in the City. Their donated money was used to purchase D.A.R.E tee shirts, workbooks, pens, pencils and graduation certificates for each of the students involved in the D.A.R.E program.

Over the summer of 2010 it was decided that the City would no longer provide D.A.R.E instruction to elementary students but would instead teach G.R.E.A.T. to 6th grade students at Tomah Middle School.

G.R.E.A.T. stands for Gang Resistance Education And Training. Officer Marshall attended classes in the fall of 2010 in order to become a G.R.E.A.T teacher. When she returned she began teaching at Tomah Middle School and will continue to do so until the end of the school year.

The G.R.E.A.T. Program differs from D.A.R.E. in that it teaches about gangs, drugs, violence and crime and why people choose to get involved in those types of activities. It encourages students to become involved in their communities by completing a service project. Students also learn how to make good decisions and to set goals for themselves.

2010 - GRANTS AWARDED TO THE TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT

During 2010 the Tomah Police Department applied for several grants. Throughout the year the Department was awarded \$33,554.00 in grants and equipment. The following is a list of grants, the amount received from the grant, and how the money was used that was received:

National Association of Drug Diversion Investigators Association – The Department applied for a grant through this Association. Along with the grant application the grant underwriter, Purdue Pharmaceuticals, required statistical data to be sent to them related to prescription drug investigations and arrests that the Tomah Police Department conducted. Based upon the information that was sent to them the Department was awarded \$5000.00 to be used to assist in prescription drug investigations. This grant allowed the Department to upgrade our Body Wire Receiver to a digital format. This grant was also used to purchase covert audio/video equipment.

Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA), Smaller Police Agency Initiative 2010 – As part of the application process the Tomah Police Department was required to submit an idea or program that we felt would assist in preventing crime. This grant was restricted to police agencies with 20 or fewer sworn employees. The Department submitted a proposal for a Nuisance Abatement Vehicle (NAV). The vehicle to be used as the NAV will be a vehicle that was previously forfeited to the Tomah Police Department by a narcotics dealer. The vehicle will be painted to look similar to a police vehicle. It will be equipped with a camera system to record activities around the area in which it will be parked. The intent of the NAV is to deter crime and to provide assurance to residents that the Tomah Police Department is attempting to improve their neighborhood by eliminating nuisance type issues. The Tomah Police Department was awarded \$5554.00 for this project. The monies will be used to prepare the vehicle to look like a police vehicle and be equipped with a camera system.

2010 Over the Limit, Under Arrest – As part of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's "Over the Limit, Under Arrest" initiative, agencies across Wisconsin were asked to supply traffic stop data to the Department of Transportation. During this time frame officers were asked to focus their traffic enforcement efforts on alcohol and seatbelt enforcement. Agencies who took part in this initiative were not guaranteed any funds. Of the agencies that did participate, four agencies were drawn out of hat to receive a \$4000.00 grant. The Tomah Police Department's name was drawn twice for awards in 2010. The first grant was for 2009; however, it was not processed until 2010. This grant was for \$3570.85. This money was used to purchase a new Mobile Data Computer. The second grant of \$4000.00 was recently announced. It has not been decided what these funds will be used for. They must be used to enhance enforcement activities.

Thomas Earle Grant – The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$2000.00 grant from the Thomas Earle Grant. The grant was used to purchase a laptop computer and a docking station for the Department's Investigator. The laptop replaces the desktop computer located on the Investigator's desk. The laptop and docking station allows the Investigator to remove the computer from the docking station and take it with him/her when needed.

Frank G. Andres Trust - The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$5000.00 grant from the Frank G. Andres Trust. The grant was used to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program, offset costs associated with the Unwanted Medication Drop Off Program, and to purchase materials that the Department provides during Department tours.

Youth Alcohol Enforcement (CARD) Grant – As part of the Monroe County Alcohol School-Community Alliance Coalition, the Department applied for and received a \$4000.00 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. This grant was used to offset overtime expenses incurred to ensure that alcohol serving establishments in the City of Tomah were not providing alcohol to underage persons. Specifically officers conducted compliance checks at taverns, liquor stores, hotels, grocery stores, and convenience stores during this process. Sixty-five compliance checks were performed. Eleven businesses were in violation by serving alcohol to an underage person.

Law Enforcement 1033 Program - The National Defense Authorization Act allows the Department of Defense to transfer excess military property to state and local law enforcement agencies. The Tomah Police Department became involved in this program in 2010. Over the last six months the Department has received approximately \$8000.00 worth of excess military equipment from this program. Equipment received includes: cold weather boots, cold weather overalls, a hand cart, watches, a rolling tool chest with tools, first aid bandages, a paper shredder, and a handheld drill.
