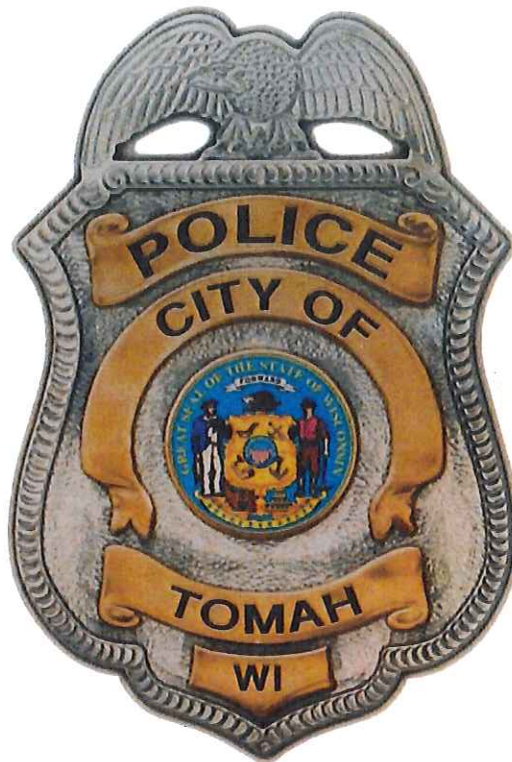

LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life.

I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

2011 ACHIEVEMENTS

DOWNTOWN TOMAH – Continued our ongoing involvement with this group to assist in their goals to revitalize the downtown area.

ANDRES DONATION – G.R.E.A.T. \$5,000.00 – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant for the G.R.E.A.T. Program, as well as other crime prevention initiatives from the Andres Foundation. These monies will be used to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program at Tomah Middle School and a summer program in cooperation with the Tomah Boys and Girls Club. These monies will also be used to support other crime prevention initiatives.

THOMAS EARLE GRANT – BASE STATIONS \$3,742.29 – The Department received a \$3,742.29 grant for use in purchasing the necessary equipment to replace the radio base stations to be compliant with the 2012 National Interoperability Requirements.

STATE OF WISCONSIN BUREAU OF TRANSPORTATION SAFETY - \$8,000.00 – The Department received two \$4,000.00 grants for use in purchasing two speed boards to be used in traffic enforcement and safety.

CARD GRANT - \$4,000.00 – The Department received a \$4,000.00 grant for use in offsetting overtime expenses associated with Alcohol Compliance Checks.

REMEMBERING JESSE DONATION \$1,500.00– The Department received a \$1,500.00 donation from the Remembering Jesse foundation which was used to facilitate the Summer G.R.E.A.T. Program and other-related activities at the Boys and Girls Club.

FOCUS ON DRUG ENFORCEMENT – We will continue placing a high priority on the development of cases related to the sale and distribution of narcotics to include pharmaceuticals. Those that chose to profit from the sale and distribution of illegal substances need to be held accountable.

BULLETPROOF VEST PURCHASE REIMBURSEMENT – Once again our Department has been awarded federal grant monies to partially reimburse the purchase price of the bulletproof vests worn by Department personnel.

DONATION FROM WALMART – The Department received two donations from Walmart in the amounts of \$500.00 and \$1,000.00 respectively. The \$1,000.00 donation was used to purchase a stair master for use in the physical fitness room and the \$500.00 donation was used in association with the Community Services Program.

NUISANCE ABATEMENT VEHICLE GRANT \$4,206.37 – The Department received a grant in the amount of \$4,206.37 for use in outfitting a vehicle to be used for the purposes of outfitting the former Supervisor’s vehicle as a Nuisance Abatement vehicle.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – National Night Out was once again held in August in Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens could participate in the Bike/Blading Rodeo, as well as view demonstrations from many different groups addressing various safety-related issues and community concerns.

DEPARTMENT WEBSITE – The Department website continues to expand and provide more information and useful links to our community. This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is www.tomahpolice.com.

DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM – This year the Department participated in a program sponsored by the Drug Enforcement Agency which facilitated a community-wide event. By participating in this program we were afforded the opportunity to dispose of all of our unwanted medication at no cost. The Department continues to offer a Medication Drop Off Container located in the lobby of the Department for use by citizens who wish to dispose of their unwanted medications.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM – The Department continues to successfully work with the school district to facilitate this Program within the district and expand upon its functions.

“COPS IN SHOPS”/COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department successfully participated in the “Cops in Shops”/Compliance Checks focusing on alcohol compliance in the community.

G.R.E.A.T. PROGRAM – The Department has successfully worked with the school district to introduce and launch the G.R.E.A.T. Program at the Middle School, as well as conducting a Summer G. R. E.A.T. Program in cooperation with the Boys and Girls Club. The summer programming was possible due to a grant received from the Remembering Jesse Foundation.

GIVING TREE – The Department successfully hosted the Giving Tree which provided Christmas gifts to 35 children from our community.

CUSTODIAN TRANSITION – The Department successfully made the transition from a private cleaning service to a part-time employee for custodial duties.

2012 GOALS

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TASK FORCE ARRESTS – In 2012 the Department will continue its focus on the enforcement of prescription drug-related violations and arrests.

ALDERS AND CONSTITUENTS – Continue to work with any interested Alders in providing information, training and services specific to their districts and constituents.

“PARENTS WHO HOST” – Continue to work with this countywide group to increase awareness and enforcement relating to parents who choose to host underage alcohol parties.

LICENSE HOLDERS - Continue our efforts in working with the License holders to address any concerns through our bi-annual meetings and bar checks conducted by officers while on duty.

TEAM BUILDING – Continue to focus on increasing the cooperation with other Department Heads.

BIKE PATROL - In 2011, we began a renewed effort to use the bike patrol. In 2012, we will continue placing an emphasis on this Program in an effort to establish additional community contacts, as well as to be more environmentally and fiscally responsible.

G.R.E.A.T PROGRAM – Continue working with the Tomah Boys and Girls Club to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program as part of their summer programming. In the past this funding was provided by the Remembering Jesse Foundation.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Continue with the professional development of Department Members.

MUNICIPAL COURT – Continue to work with other members of the Criminal Justice System to explore ways to increase the number of cases handled in Municipal Court and reduce the number of cases referred to Circuit Court.

“COPS IN SHOPS”/COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department has applied for the “Cops in Shops”/Compliance Checks grant for the purpose of continuing alcohol compliance within our community. If received, this program will be continued in 2012.

INTEROPERABILITY REQUIREMENTS – The Department will continue to move forward with implementing the communication equipment necessary to meet the interoperability requirements of 2013.

2011 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION REPORT

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Ronald Waddell and supervised by Sergeant Scott Holum. Field Training Officers are Officer Paul Sloan, Officer Brittnay Westpfahl and Officer Josh Kenworthy. Officer Dustin Walters was selected to join the Field Training Program and will be added to the training team in 2012.

Officer Jennifer Helgerson successfully completed training and was granted tenure as a patrol officer in July of 2011. After the resignation of Officer David Schneider in 2011 to join another agency, the Tomah Police Department hired Officer Adam Perkins in September of 2011. Officer Perkins is in the final stages of the Field Training Program and is expected to move to solo patrol during the early part of 2012.

2011 INVESTIGATOR'S REPORT

Listed below are several cases that were handled by the Tomah Police Department in 2011. This is not an all inclusive list of the investigations that were handled and is a sampling of various types of cases investigated by the Tomah Police Department.

Although none of the cases are listed below, one area of concern that has become a significant problem is the popularity of synthetic cannabinoids and bath salts. Several cases that involve the use and possession of these chemicals occurred in the latter part of 2011 when Wisconsin law began prohibiting the possession, delivery and manufacture of the chemicals. Other cases in 2011 involve businesses in Tomah that were selling the synthetic cannabinoids after the law prohibited their possession and sale in Wisconsin. A number of cases also involve synthetic cannabinoids and bath salts being ordered and distributed to various locations in Tomah through the mail or delivery service. This is a significant problem and all indications are that this will continue to be a problem we will be addressing in 2012 and beyond.

Heroin related crimes seem to be on the increase as well. Although the Tomah Police Department did not have substantial numbers of arrests related to heroin, there were some cases and arrests involving heroin in 2011. Some of the surrounding areas of Monroe County and several other rural counties in this area of the state have seen dramatic increases in the number of heroin related crimes and overdose deaths related to heroin. The Tomah Police Department does work with some of these agencies and will continue to monitor the heroin related information from the area.

In 2011 the Tomah Police Department also continued the investigation into the Vance Evans homicide and participated in the jury trial of Tammy Cole, the female arrested for the murder of Vance Evans that occurred in April of 2010. The jury trial of Tammy Cole lasted five days and involved many hours of preparation for the trial, locating and interviewing witnesses, and assisting the Prosecutor with the preparation and presentation of evidence used at the jury trial. Tammy Cole was convicted in May of 2011 by a jury in Monroe County of 1st Degree Intentional Homicide and Attempted Arson of a Building. Tammy Cole received a life sentence on the homicide charge with parole eligibility after 30 years. Tammy Cole received an additional 10 year sentence on the attempted arson conviction, 7 years in prison and 3 years of extended supervision, consecutive to the sentence on the homicide charge. In summary, Tammy Cole will serve a minimum of 37 years in prison before she is eligible for parole.

TPD Case 11-0040 (Child Enticement, Use of Computer to Facilitate a Child Sex Crime)

This case involves a 15 year old child who initially started having contact with a 22 year old male subject through Facebook in December of 2010. The contact between the male subject and the 15 year old child evolved into the exchange of telephone numbers and the contact continued through text messaging and telephone calls between the male and the 15 year old child in December of 2010 and into January of 2011. The child's mother learned of the contact and some of the text messages sent from the 22 year old male were sexual in nature so this matter was reported to the Tomah Police Department. It was also discovered that the 22 year old male wanted to meet up with the 15 year old child for the purposes of having sex. The 22 year old male subject continued to text the 15 year old child after it was reported to law enforcement. With the consent of the 15 year old child and the parent, a Tomah Police Department Investigator continued to text message back and forth with the 22 year old male subject. The 22 year old male made arrangements to meet with the 15 year old child in January of 2011 in the Walmart parking lot. Obviously, the 22 year old male subject was unaware that he was actually going to meet with two Tomah Police

Department officers, and did travel from the Grand Marsh, Wisconsin area to Tomah to meet with the 15 year old child for the purposes of having sex with the child. The 22 year old male subject was arrested. The 22 year old male subject is scheduled to enter a felony plea in this case in February of 2012. The 22 year old male subject has also been charged in Sauk County with a similar and did sexually assault that child after meeting the child online.

TPD Case 11-0242 (Drugs-Marijuana)

In February of 2011, the Tomah Police Department worked a joint drug investigation with the West Central Drug Task Force from Eau Claire. Investigators received information that a male subject from Eau Claire made arrangements to meet with a drug source from Madison for the purposes of purchasing three pounds of high quality marijuana for \$15,000. The location where the drug transaction was to occur was determined to be the parking lot of a business in Tomah off Interstate 94. The officers from the West Central Drug Task Force conducted surveillance on the subject purchasing the marijuana when he traveled from Eau Claire to Tomah. Tomah Police Department officers conducted surveillance on the parking lot where the meeting and drug transaction was to occur. The subject from Eau Claire parked in the lot in Tomah and waited for a period of time. The subject from Madison arrived with the three pounds of marijuana and was ultimately arrested for delivering the marijuana.

TPD Case 11-0315 (Drugs-Cocaine)

In February of 2011, Tomah officers were at a local grocery store assisting an ambulance on a medical call at the store. One officer was in an unmarked vehicle in the parking lot while the ambulance and another officer were assisting a citizen with a medical issue. The officer in the unmarked vehicle in the parking lot observed what was believed to be a drug transaction between subjects from two different vehicles that met in the parking lot in the presence of the officer. After the vehicles left the parking lot the officer stopped one of the vehicles involved in the meeting in the parking lot. After investigating, the officers were able to determine that one subject from the vehicle that was stopped by police met with another subject in the parking lot for the purpose of selling a gram of cocaine to a person in the second vehicle. A male subject in the vehicle that was stopped was taken into custody and transported to the Tomah Police Department. While en route to the police department the male subject was able to conceal 19 grams of cocaine in the back seat of the squad he was in while handcuffed, which was located by the officers. The male subject was charged with Delivery of Cocaine and Possession with Intent to Deliver Cocaine. The male subject was also in possession of \$2,181 in cash that was seized in a forfeiture action brought against him by the Tomah Police Department. The criminal charges against the male subject are still pending at this time.

TPD Case 11-0593 (Drugs-Ecstasy and Methamphetamine)

In April of 2011, a Tomah Police officer stopped a vehicle for having no taillights. The officer observed several indicators of narcotics possession in the vehicle and the operator acted very nervous. The Tomah Police Department canine assisted with this traffic stop. After further investigation on this traffic stop, the

officers located a bag that contained 30 ecstasy pills, a bag that contained 23 ecstasy pills and a film canister that contained four ecstasy pills. The officers also located a bag that contained one gram of methamphetamine. The male driver of the vehicle was arrested for various felony charges related to this traffic stop and this case is still pending at this time. The driver of the vehicle had an extensive criminal history related to drugs, which included possession, distribution and manufacturing LSD in Louisiana, as well as manufacturing methamphetamine, possession of methamphetamine with intent to manufacture, and possession of methamphetamine precursors in Minnesota.

TPD Case 11-0648 (Drugs-Marijuana, Heroin and Psilocybin)

In April of 2011, the Tomah Police Department was involved in a drug investigation in Tomah. Arrangements were made through a cooperating individual to purchase a ¼ pound of marijuana through a male subject in Tomah. The male that was delivering the 1/4 pound of marijuana had a drug source that lived in Tomah that officers were aware of prior to the transaction. Surveillance was established on the cooperating individual, the cooperating individual's male marijuana source and the residence of the person that was known to be the male individual's source. An anticipatory search warrant was obtained for the residence of the male subject's marijuana source. The cooperating individual met with the male source and provided money for a ¼ pound of marijuana to the male marijuana source. Officers then conducted surveillance of the male marijuana source to a residence in Tomah where he went to purchase the ¼ pound of marijuana for the cooperating individual. The male source then returned and met with the cooperating individual and delivered the marijuana to the cooperating individual. The male marijuana source was arrested at that time for delivering the marijuana and was also in possession of heroin. After the marijuana delivery, officers executed a search warrant at the residence where the male marijuana source went to obtain the ¼ pound of marijuana that was delivered. Inside the residence officers arrested a second male. A search of the residence was done and officers recovered approximately 5 pounds of marijuana, an active psilocybin mushroom growing operation, numerous items used in the growing of marijuana and psilocybin, drug paraphernalia and \$3,481 in cash. The male subject that delivered the marijuana to the cooperating individual has plead to felony charges and is currently in prison. The male subject from the residence that provided the marijuana to the male marijuana source is scheduled to enter a plea in this case. The money that was seized is also the subject of a forfeiture action by the Tomah Police Department.

TPD Case 11-0718 and TPD Case 11-0720 (Drive by Shooting and Officer Involved Shooting)

On April 22, 2011, officers responded to a report of gun shots being fired into a residence on East Clifton Street near the airport. The investigation determined that an unknown subject(s) fired bullets into the side of a house. Some of the bullets passed through the exterior wall and into the living area of the residence, including into a television that was being watched by a female and children. Several hours later, officers on duty began receiving information about a red truck that had stopped at a couple of local businesses as the driver was attempting to have a window repaired that was broken. Officers located the red truck parked near the Crow Bar and conducted surveillance on the truck. A male subject subsequently left in the truck and officers attempted to stop the truck. After the truck fled from officers, the truck stopped on East Saratoga Street and the driver, later identified as Seth McCloskey, exited the truck and began firing a handgun at officers. Officers returned fire. Seth McCloskey was killed by officers as a result of his actions during the exchange of gun fire with the police. Officer Josh Kenworthy was shot in the foot and injured by Seth McCloskey during the incident. The investigation into the officer involved shooting was handled by the Wisconsin Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation. The case involving the shooting of the residence near the airport has not been closed as of this time pending the receipt of some additional ballistic information, but is believed to be related to the actions of Seth McCloskey as well.

TPD Case 11-1200 (Drugs-Crack Cocaine)

In June of 2011, the Tomah Police Department began an investigation into the selling of crack cocaine by a subject from Milwaukee who would come to Tomah frequently on the bus or train and sell crack cocaine. The subject would be in Tomah for short periods of time to sell crack cocaine and would then return to Milwaukee. This type of activity had been occurring for quite some time according to information provided. The Tomah Police Department made two controlled buys of crack cocaine from a female that the subject from Milwaukee was sending to deliver his crack cocaine for him. The controlled buys consisted of 6 bags of crack cocaine and 8 bags of crack cocaine

respectively. The Tomah Police Department executed a search warrant at a Cleveland Street residence where the subject from Milwaukee and the female he had deliver the crack cocaine were located. Evidence of marijuana use and unlawful prescription medication use was located. Based on surveillance, it was known that some of the money used by the police to purchase the crack cocaine through the cooperating individual should have been within the residence. Officers were not able to locate any of the money used to purchase the crack cocaine. With the assistance of a local plumber, the toilet at the residence was disassembled and money was recovered from the toilet drain system that matched the money spent by police for the crack cocaine previously. It was determined that when the police executed the search warrant the male subject ran to the bathroom and flushed the money down the toilet. The male was arrested on various felony charges and his case is still pending. The female was also charged in this case for her involvement in the distribution of crack cocaine.

TPD Case 11-1565 (Drugs-Cocaine, Ecstasy and Marijuana)

In August of 2011, information was received regarding a male subject from Michigan that was in the Tomah area for a period of time that was selling marijuana and cocaine. Arrangements were made through a cooperating individual to purchase marijuana, cocaine and ecstasy from the subject. The cooperating individual picked up the male subject and drove around Tomah for a short time when the money was exchanged for the marijuana, cocaine and ecstasy. A traffic stop was conducted once the drug transaction was completed and the male subject was arrested. The marijuana, cocaine and ecstasy were recovered, along with the money used to purchase the illegal drugs. The male subject was arrested for several felony charges and is scheduled to plead in February of 2012.

TPD Case 11-1652 (Burglary)

In October of 2011, the Tomah Police Department responded to a residence for a report of a burglary. A female reported that someone entered her residence without her consent and stole prescription medications that were Schedule IV drugs. The investigation into this burglary determined that the adult sister of the victim was the person that unlawfully entered the residence and stole the prescription medications from the residence. The female suspect indicated that she threw the pills out of the vehicle. When confronted with the location where she said she threw the pills being near a school, the female then stated that she gave the pills to someone else to hold. The female suspect refused to tell police who she gave the pills to. The female was arrested and recently plead to a felony burglary charge.

TPD Case 11-2133 (Negligent Handling of Burning Materials)

In November of 2011, the Tomah Police Department and Tomah Fire Department responded to a fire in Winnebago Park. The fire was in the mostly wooden playground area on the west side of the park. The investigation determined that some juveniles were in the area. One of the juveniles had a lighter and lit a pinecone on fire that was kicked in an attempt to put it out. The fire apparently spread to the wooden playground structure and caused significant damage. The juvenile responsible for the fire was contacted and admitted to lighting a pinecone on fire and another juvenile kicked the pinecone in an apparent attempt to put the small fire out. The damage to the playground equipment was determined to be significant, resulting in a total loss of the playground equipment, with damage estimates in excess of \$127,000.00.

2011 School Resource Officer Report

2011 was the fourth year that Officer Marshall served as the School Resource Officer for the Tomah School District. Officer Marshall has an office at the Tomah High School but also serves the other schools in the City of Tomah.

Officer Marshall handles a wide variety of calls within the school district. Truancy, disorderly conduct, battery and drug violations are just a small amount of the different types of calls that the School Resource Officer handles.

Officer Marshall also works closely with Monroe County Human Services in regards to abuse investigations involving students or monitoring students that are on supervision through Monroe County Human Services with the ISP program.

Officer Marshall is directly involved in many different activities within the school district such as: Child Development Day, Reality Check, Prom, Homecoming, Tomah High School Career Fair, and other special events. Officer Marshall has also been a guest in some of the high school health and teen parenting classes and she has worked at numerous sporting events. She has also read during special reading events to four year old kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall serves as a resource for both the staff and students. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall to discuss concerns or questions they may have. She is also available for the staff to use as a resource.

Officer Marshall taught G.R.E.A.T. to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and St. Mary's School. She also provided tours of the Police Department to kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall works closely with the High School Administration in regards to the safety and security of the high school students and building. One of the newest concerns with high school students is the use of synthetic marijuana which is becoming more popular with students. Investigator Walensky has assisted Officer Marshall with some of these investigations at Tomah High School.

2011 K-9 UNIT ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police K-9 Unit consists of Officer Aaron Hintz and his partner, K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz has worked for the Department since September 2005 and was selected as the K-9 Handler in 2009.

In June of 2009, Officer Hintz traveled to Sanford North Carolina and visited Tarheel Canine Training Inc. Officer Hintz was able to look at several dogs and ultimately selected K-9 Jager. K-9 Jager is a male sable German Shepherd Dog that came from the Czech Republic. Officer Hintz traveled back to Tarheel Canine in September of 2009 for 4 weeks of training with K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager successfully completed training together in a variety of different areas.

Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager work together on 2nd shift, but are also on-call to assist members of the department with situations where K-9 Jager could be of assistance. K-9 Jager is a dual-purpose patrol dog. The term “dual-purpose” suggests two jobs. This is somewhat deceiving. First, K-9 Jager is trained as a patrol dog, providing handler protection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches and area searches. Secondly, K-9 Jager is trained as a drug detector dog. He is trained to detect and alert to the odor associated with marijuana, cocaine/crack, methamphetamine and heroin. In addition to these trained jobs, K-9 Jager serves as a community relations tool for the department. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager train together on a regular basis in order to stay proficient in the different tasks K-9 Jager is trained to perform.

Interesting Cases for 2011

3-20-11 Reference Case #11-0510

Commercial Burglary: K-9 Jager and I responded to a burglar alarm at the Medicine Shoppe Pharmacy at about 0300 hours along with Officer Jones, Officer Keller and Sergeant Preuss. Officer Jones took the rear and K-9 Jager and I took the front of the business. I observed the front window was broken and Officer Jones advised he could see a suspect inside the business. Officer Jones advised the back door was propped open. Once Officer Keller and Sergeant Preuss had the front covered, Officer Jones and I gave commands/warnings to the suspect from the back door. When we did not get a response, and the suspect did not come out to us as instructed, I believed he may have been hiding inside. I sent K-9 Jager into the building to apprehend the suspect. As I released K-9 Jager I heard the officers in front yelling. I recalled K-9 Jager to run to the front of the business in case the suspect had fled or was trying to flee out the front. The suspect had not escaped the building and K-9 Jager and I provided cover to the other officers while they took the suspect into custody.

3-26-11

Craig Birkholz Funeral: K-9 Jager, Officer Jones, Officer Helgerson, Officer Schneider, Sergeant Pedersen and I traveled to Kenosha for Fond du Lac Police Department Officer Craig Birkholz's funeral. We were able to be a part of the activities by taking part in a K-9 / Handler line up at the entrance to the cemetery. The wounded K-9 Handler, Ryan Williams and Officer Birkholz's passed by the K-9 line up as the procession ended and they entered the cemetery. There were approximately thirty K-9 units in this line and while sadly unfortunate, our very small involvement will not be forgotten.

4-3-11 Reference Case #11-0593

Drug Sniff – Vehicle: I was off duty and called in to conduct a K-9 sniff on a vehicle out of Minnesota that Officer Jones had stopped at Highway 12 & 21. I conducted the K-9 sniff with K-9 Jager and he positively alerted on the vehicle. K-9 Jager also alerted on the interior of the vehicle alerting to the narcotics and cash that had been thrown under the driver's seat. We recovered methamphetamine and approximately 53 Ecstasy pills from under the driver's seat.

6-9-11 Reference Case #11-1012

Drug Sniff – Bus Interdiction: K-9 Jager and I conducted K-9 sniffs on several buses throughout the day. The luggage on the first bus was checked with no interest or alerts. We then moved to the second bus and K-9 Jager alerted on a particular bag. K-9 Jager literally pulled the bag off of the shelf it was on. The bag was seized and the owner of the bag was located and questioned. The owner of the bag advised there were narcotics in the bag. A small amount of marijuana and several items of paraphernalia and related contraband were located in the bag as well. The owner of the bag admitted to traveling from Chicago to Minneapolis for the weekend to sell marijuana on the University of Minnesota campus.

6-18-11

Stolen Vehicle / Burglary Suspect Pursuit: K-9 Jager and I were requested to respond to a pursuit that Jackson County was involved in. The pursuit was coming from the northern part of Jackson County and was headed eastbound on I-94 towards Tomah. I started westbound on I-94 to meet up with the pursuit and join in to assist with K-9 Jager at the end of the pursuit. The suspect vehicle passed me at the 134MM crossover as I was waiting for them. The vehicle had been spiked and was driving on three wheels with the only the hub on the spiked wheel. I joined the pursuit and moved to the front where I took over the second squad position. At about the 141MM the vehicle slowed and pulled over. The driver/suspect did not exit the vehicle and was not complying with our commands to exit the vehicle. After a short stand off the driver exited the vehicle and immediately laid down on the interstate in the right hand lane. We gathered a team to approach and moved up on the suspect after he would not come back to us. K-9 Jager provided a strong deterrence to the suspect to run or aggressively advance back on us. I brought K-9 Jager up on the approach and was going to release him should the suspect have made any moves whatsoever. The suspect was taken into custody without incident.

7-4-11

Drug Sniff – Search Warrant: We served a search warrant on a trailer and I brought K-9 Jager into the trailer to search for narcotics. K-9 Jager located a used marijuana pipe and a box of drug paraphernalia on the night stand in the suspect's bedroom. K-9 Jager also located and alerted on a zip-lock baggie box. Officer Jones inspected this box and advised there were trace amounts of cocaine and cocaine residue on the baggies that were inside the box.

9-14-11 Reference Case # 11-1656

Home Invasion – Unwanted Party: We were dispatched to an unknown person in a residence at about 0520 hrs. The home owners were in the basement and advised the suspect was in a bedroom upstairs. Officer Walters took the rear of the residence and Sergeant Weaver and I entered the front of the residence to locate the suspect. I deployed K-9 Jager and brought him into the residence with us should the suspect attempt to flee or fight with us. We located the suspect in the bedroom. Sergeant Weaver made contact with the suspect while I provided cover with K-9 Jager in the doorway to the room. K-9 Jager keyed up on the suspect immediately. The suspect was taken into custody without incident.

10-22-11 Reference Case #11-1948

Agency Assist-Suspect Track and Apprehension: K-9 Jager and I responded to Mauston to assist with the track and apprehension of a suspect who crashed his car during a high speed pursuit with the Wisconsin State Patrol. The suspect then fled on foot but the Trooper severely injured his knee early in the foot chase. We checked a few areas and then the suspect re-surfaced in the area of a hotel parking lot. We were able to contain

him in the perimeter and he ran back into the semis parked at the truck stop/hotels. The suspect was located hiding up in the rear axle area of a semi tractor. K-9 Jager covered the suspect as he was ordered out from under the tractor and taken into custody.

2011 Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit Report

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Department. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit responded to four tactical situations in 2011. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

January 9 – Idell Avenue, Rural Sparta – Barricaded Subject: CTU responded at the request to the Monroe County Sheriff's Department to an address on Idell Avenue where deputies had responded to arrest a subject for serious domestic violence offenses. While the deputies were at the location the suspect would not communicate with the deputies and the deputies then heard one or two gunshots from within the house. The suspect also lit a fire inside the residence. CTU responded and established inner perimeter positions and also requested a mutual aid response from La Crosse County Sheriff's Department BEARCAT armored rescue vehicle. Upon arrival of the BEARCAT the garage door was breached and the garage was cleared with no one located inside. Eventually three CTU personnel from the Tomah Police Department donned Sparta Rural Fire Department self-contained breathing apparatus and entered the residence with back up by other CTU personnel and fire department personnel. CTU members located the subject deceased by a self-inflicted gunshot wound in the residence.

June 13 – Jay Street, Oakdale – Barricaded Subject: Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Department personnel were investigating a possibly suicidal subject who was also a felon in possession of a firearm. The subject was located at a residence in Oakdale and CTU was requested to apprehend the subject. Prior to CTU arrival the subject left the residence in a vehicle and was stopped and arrested.

August 2 – Econo Lodge / North Superior Avenue and Holland Street, Tomah- Barricaded Subject / High Risk Arrest: the Tomah Police Department received information that a prison escapee had checked into a room at the Econo Lodge. CTU personnel were on-duty for the National Night Out event and responded to the motel. A perimeter was established around the subject's room and through video surveillance we were able to confirm that the subject was not in the room. CTU personnel cleared from the area and initiated a plan to contact the subject when he returned. A Monroe County Sheriff's Department Detective observed the subject behind the Ho-Chunk Cinema and engaged the subject in a foot pursuit. The subject was then contained in the marsh area between Wittig Road and Holland Street and North Superior Avenue and I-94. A lengthy search for the subject with several K-9 units and a U.S. Army Blackhawk helicopter was unsuccessful. The subject was arrested on Foley Avenue just south of the perimeter later in the morning.

2011 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT

The following enhancements or upgrades were made in the area of Information Technology or electronic communications:

Seven (7) new desktop computers were purchased and installed in the Tomah Police Department. In addition to other items the new computers are loaded with the Windows 7 operating software and the departments Records Management Software.

During 2011 a software platform enhancement was completed for our Records Management System, Information Technology Incorporated. The update consisted of a new software platform, data conversion, and training department members to use the updated software.

In accordance with the Statewide Interoperability Initiative all radios used by law enforcement agencies must be narrowband compliant. Within the last few years the Tomah Police Department has been purchasing and replacing its radios with narrowband compliant radios. During 2011 the Tomah Police Department purchased five (5) narrowband compliant base stations. With this purchase all of the radios used by the Tomah Police Department are now narrowband compliant.

In 2010 the Tomah Police Department received a *Smaller Police Agency Initiative* Grant from the Wisconsin Office of Justice Assistance (OJA) to equip a vehicle to become a Nuisance Abatement Vehicle (NAV). This Grant was restricted to police agencies with 20 or fewer sworn employees. In 2011 the police department purchased the required equipment and completed the project. The vehicle used as the NAV was an unmarked Tahoe that was going to be traded in by the Tomah Police Department. The vehicle was painted and striped so that it looks like a marked squad car. A video system was installed in it to record the activities in the area that the NAV is parked. The intent of the NAV is to deter crime and to provide assurance to residents that the Tomah Police Department is attempting to improve their neighborhoods by eliminating nuisance type issues.

During 2011, the Tomah Police Department participated in several unfunded programs with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Bureau of Transportation Safety. These programs included Click It or Ticket, Booze and Belts, and Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over. Each agency that participates in these programs is offered an opportunity to attend an annual meeting. Those that attend the meeting may be awarded door prizes. This year the Tomah Police Department was awarded a \$2000.00 handheld laser radar unit. The laser can be used to measure the speed of vehicles or distances.

A new printer was purchased and installed in the evidence room.

One (1) Taser was purchased to replace a Taser that malfunctioned.

Two (2) in-car video systems were purchased to replace outdated units.

Six (6) body worn video systems were purchased. With this purchase each uniformed officer is equipped with a video camera.

In an attempt to improve fleet operations, decrease fuel costs, and improve patrol coverage within the City, the department purchased a Fleet GPS Tracking and Management System for the marked police vehicles. This program is a web based system which allows members of the department to track the location of the fleet manage stop and idle times and review patrol patterns.

2011 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department has twelve vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. The vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black and white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigations and Shift Supervisor are unmarked patrol vehicles.

All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with radar, Mobile Data Computers(MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators(AED), In-car audio/video recorders, digital cameras, Stinger spike systems and Preliminary Breath Tests(PBT). The newest equipment in the patrol and supervisor squads is a GPS system, which gives speeds and locations of the squads.

2011 Community Service Activities

In 2011 the members of the Police Department were again busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

National Night Out

Once again with the help of Tomah Memorial Hospital, WalMart SuperCenter and WalMart Distribution Center, we held our 9th annual Monroe County National Night Out. Organizations from around the area were invited to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public coming out to see what was offered. Donations are also collected the night of the event for the Neighbor For Neighbor Food Pantry.

The Police Department's Bike Rodeo was held in the park with approximately 200 kids attending. The Med Link Helicopter was able to make an appearance. Other demonstrations were conducted by the Monroe County Tactical Unit, Sparta Police Department K-9 the Town of Lincoln Fire Department and First Responders, Tomah Fire Department and Rescue Technicians, Tomah Area Ambulance Service and the Oakdale First Responders and Fire Department.

The WalMart Corporation was very generous in providing donations for the event. More importantly, some of their employees volunteered their time to help with National Night Out.

Bike Rodeo

The annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo was in August in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Members of the Tomah and Sparta Police Departments and employees from WalMart came together to help make the course run smoothly.

Participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members are used to purchase bicycles, safety helmets, roller blades, bike locks, games and other items which are given away to children who participate in the safety courses.

This event would not be possible without all of the miscellaneous donations from the community.

Tours

Throughout the year the Department provides tours of the Police Department building to the Kindergarten Classes in the school district. Members of the Fire Department and Ambulance Service also assist with the tours. During the tour the children are shown a video in regards to using the 911 system. They are then able to see a police car, ambulance and fire trucks up close, and are even invited to sit inside them. At the end of their tour they are provided with a “goodie” bag that includes stickers, coloring books, a pencil and other safety information.

The Department also provides tours to daycares, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and other groups who request a tour. On occasion, officers go to the facility to provide information on a particular topic. These special requests keep us busy throughout the year.

School District Events

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day held by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information in regards to child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to the children.

At the Middle School, Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. to sixth grade students in the school district, including the parochial schools.

High School students interested in a career in law enforcement are able to participate in a ride-along prearranged by the High School. Students are able to spend a few hours riding with an officer and observing the work day.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at the High School. Topics range from traffic enforcement, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

Car Seat Safety Inspections

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from the Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Tomah Memorial Hospital employees, provide free car seat safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is passed out and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost or in the case of financial need, they are provided to families free of charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a state grant in which they purchased car seats and provided them to families who received county support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week in regards to car seat safety and safety seat inspections, and without the financial support of numerous organizations we would not be able to provide car seats to the public.

Officer Marshall attends a specialized training session each year in order to maintain her certification as a certified car seat technician.

Child Fingerprinting

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an identification kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

Monroe County Safe Community Coalition

The Department participates in the county wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seatbelt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking, underage alcohol and drug issues.

Fort McCoy Morale, Wellness, and Recreation Days

For the past several years the Department has been represented at the Fort McCoy MWR event by our canine unit. The military and its members are an important part of Tomah. This event provides us with an opportunity to offer ourselves as a resource and build relationships with military personnel living in the Tomah area.

Tomah Business and Industry Committee

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach coordinates this committee. The Committee meets every four months and is made up of representatives from Tomah Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, work place safety and employee health are all discussed.

Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee

This consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders Office, Jail

Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

Tomah Memorial Hospital Events

Each year Tomah Memorial Hospital hosts a Senior Citizen and Women's Health and Safety Expo. Officer Marshall is able to attend these events and provide safety information or to be a listening ear to any that may have questions or concerns.

Medication Take Back Day

The Police Department partners with the Drug Enforcement Agency annually to participate in the nationwide Medication Take Back Day. This event allows citizens to turn in their unused prescription and over-the-counter medications at the Police Department to be disposed off. The Police Department also has a medication drop box in the lobby so unused medications are able to be dropped off whenever the main lobby is open.

Others

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, stranger danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the police department.

2011 Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.) Report

Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.) is a gang and violence prevention program built around school-based, law enforcement officer-instructed classroom curriculum. The program is intended as an immunization against delinquency, youth violence, and gang membership for children in the years immediately before the prime ages for introduction into gangs and delinquent behavior.

G.R.E.A.T. has developed partnerships with nationally recognized organizations, such as the Boys & Girls Clubs of America and the National Association of Police Athletic Leagues. These partnerships encourage positive relationships among the community, parents, schools, and law enforcement officers. G.R.E.A.T. lessons focus on providing life skills to students to help them avoid using delinquent behavior and violence to solve problems. The G.R.E.A.T. Program offers a continuum of components for students and their families.

Spring of 2011 was the first graduation of sixth grade G.R.E.A.T. students. Officer Marshall began teaching G.R.E.A.T. in the fall of 2010 with the graduation in May of 2011. Approximately 250 sixth graders from Tomah Middle School and Saint Mary's School completed the program. As part of the G.R.E.A.T. requirements students needed to be involved in some sort of community service and present what they accomplished to the rest of their classmates. They were awarded with a G.R.E.A.T. certificate and tee shirt.

In the spring of 2011 Sergeant Huneck also attended G.R.E.A.T. training and is also able to teach.

During the summer months the Police Department was able to work with the Boys and Girls Club to have G.R.E.A.T. week. Members of the Boys and Girls Club were able to participate in special activities during the week. Sergeant Huneck and Officer Marshall were also a part of the activities. Some of the activities were a game day at Winnebago Park, swimming at Three Bears Lodge, roller skating, the high school ropes course and a day of meeting at the police department and completing some community service activities followed by ice cream treats. These activities were all possible thanks to generous donations from the Jesse Parker Memorial Fund, Three Bears Lodge and Flying Wheels Roller Skating Rink.

Sergeant Huneck and Officer Marshall were also able to obtain 300 free tee shirts, backpacks and mini school supply kits through the G.R.E.A.T. program since Tomah was a new agency. This will be used as graduation gifts in the spring of 2012. Officer Marshall is currently teaching G.R.E.A.T. to sixth graders at Tomah Middle School with graduation planned in May of this year.

2011 GRANTS AWARDED TO THE TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT

During 2011 the Tomah Police Department applied for several grants. Throughout the year the police department was awarded \$23,100.00 worth of grants, equipment and donations. The following is a list of grants, the amount received from the grant, and how the money was used that was received:

2011 Over the Limit, Under Arrest – as part of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation’s “Over the Limit, Under Arrest” initiative, agencies across Wisconsin were asked to supply traffic stop data to the Department of Transportation. During this time frame officers were asked to focus their traffic enforcement efforts on alcohol and seatbelt enforcement. Agencies who took part in this initiative were not guaranteed any funds. However, of the agencies that chose to participate, four agencies were drawn out of hat to receive a \$4000.00 grant. The Tomah Police Department’s name was drawn. This grant was used to purchase the radar speed sign that is located on Superior Avenue near Saratoga Street.

2011 Law Enforcement 1033 Program - the National Defense Authorization Act allows the Department of Defense to transfer excess military property to state and local law enforcement agencies. The Tomah Police Department became involved in this program in 2010. During 2011 the Tomah Police Department received approximately \$3000 worth of excess military equipment. Since becoming involved in the program, the Tomah Police Department has received approximately \$11,000 in excess military equipment. This includes cold weather boots, cold weather overalls, a hand cart, watches, a rolling tool chest with tools, first aid bandages, a paper shredder, power tools, field packs, goggles and knives.

2011 Youth Alcohol Enforcement (CARD) Grant – as part of the Monroe County Alcohol School-Community Alliance Coalition, the Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$4000 grant from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. This grant was used to offset overtime expenses incurred to ensure that alcohol serving establishments in the City of Tomah were not providing alcohol to underage persons. Specifically, officers conducted compliance checks at taverns, liquor stores, hotels, grocery stores, and convenience stores during this process.

2011 Thomas Earle Grant – the Tomah Police Department applied for and received \$3700 from the Thomas Earle Grant. These monies were used to purchase five (5) base station radios which completed our department’s narrowband requirements for the Wisconsin Interoperability Initiative.

2011 Frank G. Andres Trust Grant - the Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$5000 grant from the Frank G. Andres Trust. The grant was used to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program and to purchase materials that the department provides during department tours and other community events.

Remembering Jesse Foundation – in 2011 the Tomah Police Department received a \$1500 donation from the Remembering Jesse Foundation. The money was earmarked and used to facilitate the summer G.R.E.A.T. Program at the Tomah Boys and Girls Club.

The Tomah Police Department participated in the Bullet Proof Vest Partnership Program which is funded by the Edward Byrnes Memorial Grant through the United States Department of Justice. The grant helps offset the purchase costs of bulletproof vests made by police departments for their officers. The Tomah Police Department received \$1908 during 2011 from this partnership.
