LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life.

I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

2012 ACHIEVEMENTS

DOWNTOWN TOMAH – Continued our ongoing involvement with this group to assist in their goals to revitalize the downtown area.

ANDRES DONATION – G.R.E.A.T. \$2,500.00 – The Department received a \$5,000.00 grant for the G.R.E.A.T. Program, as well as other crime prevention initiatives from the Andres Foundation. These monies will be used to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program at Tomah Middle School and a summer program in cooperation with the Tomah Boys and Girls Club. These monies will also be used to support other crime prevention initiatives.

ANDRES GRANT – EMERGENCY SIREN \$5,930.00 – The Department received a \$5,930.00 grant for use in purchasing the necessary equipment to update and replace an emergency siren to be located at Recreations Park.

WALMART FOUNDATION - \$1,500.00 – The Department received a \$1,500.00 grant for use in subscribing to the LEEDS Program. This database program is used to query all participating regional pawn shop inventories for the purposes of recovering stolen property.

WISCOM GRANT - \$30,000.00 – The Department received a \$30,000.00 grant for use in obtaining and downloading required programming for the Wisconsin Interoperability Communications capabilities used in patrol vehicles and handheld radios.

COULEECAP GRANT – \$650.00. The Department received a \$650.00 grant from CouleeCap to reimburse the department for expenditures related to Alcohol Compliance checks.

FOCUS ON DRUG ENFORCEMENT – We will continue placing a high priority on the development of cases related to the sale and distribution of narcotics to include pharmaceuticals. Those that chose to profit from the sale and distribution of illegal substances need to be held accountable.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – National Night Out was once again held in August in Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens could participate in the Bike/Blading Rodeo, as well as view demonstrations from many different groups addressing various safety-related issues and community concerns.

DEPARTMENT WEBSITE – The Department website continues to expand and provide more information and useful links to our community. This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is www.tomahpolice.com.

DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM – This year the Department participated in a two programs sponsored by the Drug Enforcement Agency which facilitated a community-wide event. By participating in this program we were afforded the opportunity to dispose of all of our unwanted medication at no cost. The Department continues to offer a Medication Drop Off Container located in the lobby of the Department for use by citizens who wish to dispose of their unwanted medications. To-date we have collected and disposed of over 400 pounds of medication.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM – The Department continues to successfully work with the school district to facilitate this Program within the district and expand upon its functions.

“CLICK-IT OR TICKET” COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department successfully participated in the “Click-It or Ticket” Compliance checks focusing on seatbelt compliance in the community.

“BOOZE & BELTS” COMPLIANCE CHECKS – The Department successfully participated in the “Booze & Belts” Compliance checks focusing on impaired driving and seatbelt compliance in the community.

G.R.E.A.T. PROGRAM – The Department has successfully worked with the school district to introduce and launch the G.R.E.A.T. Program at the Middle School, as well as conducting a Summer G. R. E.A.T. Program in cooperation with the Boys and Girls Club. The summer programming was possible due to a grant received from the Remembering Jesse Foundation.

GIVING TREE – The Department successfully hosted the Giving Tree which provided Christmas gifts to 30 children from our community.

2013 GOALS

PRESCRIPTION DRUG TASK FORCE ARRESTS – In 2013 the Department will continue its focus on the enforcement of prescription drug-related violations and arrests.

ALDERS AND CONSTITUENTS – Continue to work with any interested Alders in providing information, training and services specific to their districts and constituents.

LICENSE HOLDERS - Continue our efforts in working with the License holders to address any concerns through our bi-annual meetings and bar checks conducted by officers while on duty.

TEAM BUILDING – Continue to focus on increasing the cooperation with other Department Heads.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Continue with the professional development of Department Members.

MUNICIPAL COURT – Continue to work with other members of the Criminal Justice System to explore ways to increase the number of cases handled in Municipal Court and reduce the number of cases referred to Circuit Court.

2012 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION REPORT

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and for the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Ronald Waddell and supervised by Sergeant Scott Holum. The Field Training Officers are Officer Paul Sloan, Officer Brittnay Westpfahl and Officer Josh Kenworthy.

Officer Adam Perkins successfully completed training and was granted tenure as a patrol officer in December of 2012. Officer Wilbert Steinborn was hired by the Tomah Police Department in October of 2012. Officer Steinborn is currently in the Field Training Program and is expected to go on solo patrol in early 2013.

2012 INVESTIGATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

DEATH INVESTIGATION

On February 3, 2012 the Tomah Police Department responded to a Tomah motel for a report of a deceased subject. Located in the motel room was a severely decomposed body that had obviously been in that location for quite some time. The subject was identified as a 51 year old male that had been reported missing in March of 2011. An autopsy was conducted and investigation of the motel room was conducted. Interviews were conducted of the family of the deceased, the motel staff and management, and other individuals that had stayed at the motel since the deceased subject had been reported missing. It was determined that no foul play was involved in the death of the male. The deceased remained in this motel room for several months after his death without being discovered.

BURGLARY, STOLEN VEHICLES AND SHOOTING

During approximately the first three months of 2012, the Tomah Police Department was involved in the investigation of several residential burglaries and stolen motor vehicles. One of the burglaries involved the theft of three guns. Other burglaries involved the theft of money, electronic items and other property. In March of 2012 there was a report of a 21-year old male being shot on the walking trail near the Lake Tomah dam. Investigation of the shooting incident and the burglaries identified three primary suspects in the burglaries in Tomah. After several months of investigation, three primary subjects were charged with the burglaries. It was also determined that the same subjects, along with a couple other individuals, had also been responsible for burglaries that occurred in Sparta and in Monroe County outside of the City of Tomah. The 21-year old male that was shot on the walking trail was one of the people charged with numerous burglaries, stolen vehicles, thefts and other criminal violations. It was also determined that the 21-year old male also shot himself on the walking trail with one of the stolen guns from the burglaries in an attempt to obtain drugs from the hospital.

SEXUAL ASSAULT OF A CHILD

In March of 2012 the Tomah Police Department investigated a sexual assault complaint that involved the adult male owner of a driving school in Tomah and 17-year old student. The female student reported inappropriate sexual contact with the adult male driving school owner. Numerous other driving students and other witnesses were interviewed in this case. The adult male driving instructor was arrested and charged in this case. The case is currently being prosecuted by the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

DRUG INVESTIGATION

In April of 2012 the Tomah Police Department conducted an investigation into the delivery of crack cocaine by a subject from Madison. The cocaine source was identified and it was learned that the cocaine source was at a Tomah motel. The Tomah Police Department conducted surveillance on the motel and arranged for a controlled purchase of crack cocaine from the subject. As the 25-year old male subject from Madison arrived at a Tomah residence to deliver the crack cocaine, Tomah Police Department Officers and West Central Metropolitan Drug Enforcement Group members arrested the cocaine source. The cocaine source was in possession of 24 grams of crack cocaine, a semi-automatic handgun, and a small amount of marijuana. This subject recently plead guilty to felony charges in this case and is awaiting sentencing. There is also an action pending to seize the vehicle used to deliver the drugs and approximately \$850.00 in cash seized from the subject.

PROSTITUTION

In April of 2012 the Tomah Police Department was involved in the investigation of prostitution that was reported at a Tomah motel. The prostitution was occurring at the time of the investigation and involved several people that were outside of the motel, in the motel and a vehicle that left the scene during the response to the motel by officers. A 27-year old female was arrested and charged with prostitution and also had several warrants for her arrest. A 60-year old Tomah man was arrested for soliciting prostitutes. A 28-year old male acquaintance of the prostitute in this case was also arrested on drug related charges for cocaine and marijuana, obstructing an officer and a warrant. A 36-year old male acquaintance of the prostitute in this case was arrested on drug related charges for cocaine and marijuana, a probation violation and a warrant.

ROBBERY AND A STOLEN VEHICLE

In July of 2012 the Tomah Police Department investigated a robbery and stolen vehicle in the 800 block of Superior Avenue. The Tomah Police Department received a call from a subject who indicated that his truck had been stolen and he had been dragged with the truck for about a block in an attempt to remove the suspect from the vehicle. The 60 year old victim reported that he had gone into a store and when he returned to his truck about ten minutes later, he observed a male in the driver's seat. The victim attempted to remove the suspect from the vehicle. The suspect started the vehicle as the victim was holding onto the suspect and the suspect began to drive away. The victim was dragged with the vehicle and was thrown to the ground as a result of the suspect's erratic driving. The vehicle was located in the parking lot of the Masonic Lodge and no one was around the vehicle. There was no damage to the vehicle. Approximately twenty minutes later the 29-year old male suspect was observed and a short foot pursuit ensued. The suspect was taken into custody. The victim was transported to the hospital by the Tomah Area Ambulance Service. He was later released with non-life threatening injuries.

DEATH INVESTIGATION

In October of 2012 the Tomah Police Department was contacted regarding two deceased subjects in a residence. The deceased subjects were identified as a 25-year old female and a 35-year old male, both Tomah residents. Also present in the residence at the time were two small children who were not harmed. Investigation at the residence was conducted. Autopsies were also conducted on the two deceased subjects. It was determined that both died as a result of heroin toxicity. This case is still under investigation.

DRUG INVESTIGATION

In October of 2012 the Tomah Police Department investigated a reported methamphetamine lab in a vehicle that was located at a residence in Tomah. A clandestine lab trained officer from LaCrosse assisted the Tomah Police Department. The female driver of the vehicle claimed that her husband put the methamphetamine lab in the vehicle when she was moving out of a LaCrosse residence after an argument with her husband. Several items were located in the vehicle that are used to manufacture methamphetamine. Charges in this case have been sent to the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

DEATH INVESTIGATION

In December of 2012 the Tomah Police Department investigated the death of a 31-year old male at a Tomah apartment. The deceased male had been involved in a motor vehicle accident the previous day. The apartment was occupied by known drug users and the cause of death was not immediately known. Investigation at the apartment indicated that drugs were used and possessed at the apartment. An autopsy was conducted and it was determined that the subject died as a result of a chest injury believed to be related to the motor vehicle accident. Charges related to drugs at the apartment are being referred to the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

2012 SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER REPORT

Officer Marshall continues to serve as the School Resource Officer for the Tomah School District. Officer Marshall has an office at the Tomah High School but also serves the other schools in the City of Tomah.

Officer Marshall handles a wide variety of calls within the school district. Truancy, disorderly conduct, battery, and drug violations are just a small amount of the different types of calls that the School Resource Officer handles.

Officer Marshall also works closely with Monroe County Human Services in regards to abuse investigations involving students or monitoring students that are on supervision through human services with the ISP (Intensive Sanctions Program).

Officer Marshall is directly involved in many different activities within the school district such as: Child Development Day, Prom, Homecoming, Tomah High School Career Fair, and other special events. Officer Marshall has also been a guest in some of the high school health, teen parenting classes, and she has worked at numerous sporting events.

Officer Marshall serves as a resource for both the staff and students. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regards to any concerns or questions they may have. She has also been available for the staff to use as a resource.

Officer Marshall taught G.R.E.A.T to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and St. Mary's school. She also provided tours of the police department to kindergarten students.

Officer Marshall works closely with the High School Administration in regards to the safety and security of the high school students and building.

A new concern to every school district is the security and safety of school buildings. Officer Marshall continues to work with school administrators in regards to these issues.

2012 K-9 UNIT ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police K-9 Unit consists of Officer Aaron Hintz and his partner, K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz has worked for the Department since September 2005 and was selected as the K-9 Handler in 2009.

In June of 2009, Officer Hintz traveled to Sanford North Carolina and visited Tarheel Canine Training Inc. Officer Hintz was able to look at several dogs and ultimately selected K-9 Jager. K-9 Jager is a male sable German Shepherd Dog that came from the Czech Republic. Officer Hintz traveled back to Tarheel Canine in September of 2009 for 4 weeks of training with K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager successfully completed training together in a variety of different areas.

Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager work together on 2nd shift, but are also on-call to assist members of the Department with situations where K-9 Jager could be of assistance. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager are also members of the Monroe County Combine Tactical Unit (CTU). K-9 Jager is a dual-purpose patrol dog. The term “dual-purpose” suggest two jobs, this is somewhat deceiving. First, K-9 Jager is trained as a patrol dog, providing handler protection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches and area searches. Secondly, K-9 Jager is also trained as a drug detector dog. He is trained to detect and alert to the odor associated with marijuana, cocaine/crack, methamphetamine and heroin. In addition to these trained jobs, K-9 Jager serves as a community relations tool for the Department. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager train together on a regular basis in order to stay proficient in these different tasks K-9 Jager is trained to perform.

INTERESTING 2012 K-CASES:

Case #12-016, Patrol Cover – Barricaded Gunman:

K-9 Jager and I responded to a CTU Callout at the Super 8 Hotel to assist as team members of the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit. During the second half of the standoff with the suspect in his hotel room, K-9 Jager and I moved into position on the east side of the hotel where the suspect's first floor room window was located. I covered the window and had K-9 Jager present should the suspect have tried to flee out the window. Once we breached the window and deployed gas into the room the team in the hallway advised they had contact with the suspect in the hallway. I dropped the break and rake tool I had used on the window and deployed K-9 Jager and we responded to the inner hallway to provide cover to the other teams members.

Suspect Apprehension /Building Search /Cover:

K-9 Jager and I assisted Officer Sloan with a domestic abuse incident. We obtained consent from the victim to enter the residence if need be to take the suspect into custody. We went to the residence and attempted contact for quite some time before breaching the back door. Once the back door was breached I gave multiple warnings and called for the suspect to come out to us. The suspect did not comply and I had K-9 Jager search the kitchen and a short distance into the living room. The suspect had made comments in the past about stabbing the first person that came through the door during other calls for service at this residence. Once K-9 Jager confirmed the immediate area was clear I downed him in the kitchen between us and the doorway to the living room /bedroom area. After a short time the suspect appeared out of the bedroom and into the living room. K-9 Jager keyed up on him and I directed him at gun point to walk towards me with his hands in the air. Once the suspect arrived in the kitchen we ordered him to the ground and he eventually got on his stomach. I had K-9 Jager held back but covering the suspect as he looked like he may have been positioning himself to retreat back into the living room. Once we had him coming towards us I backed K-9 Jager out of the house and we provided cover from just off the back deck. K-9 Jager's presence provided us several different options during this incident. The main advantage was the added safety it provided the other officers.

Case #12-0630 Patrol/Cover – High Risk Take Down Homicide Subject:

We received information that the Black River Falls Police Department was looking for a suspect wanted for attempted homicide. This was new information and shortly after we received it we

were advised someone was at the Walmart Supercenter and believed the wanted suspect was there. The suspect vehicle had a unique license plate. We all responded to Walmart and located the suspect vehicle as the male suspect exited Walmart and got into the vehicle. We conducted the best high risk traffic stop we could, given the location and how things transpired. I immediately deployed K-9 Jager as Officer Furlano, Officer Jones, Officer Sloan had cover on the driver and suspect passenger. We ordered the suspect out of the vehicle and had him crawl away from the vehicle. Officer Sloan secured the suspect in handcuffs and brought him back to behind our squad cars. We then ordered the female driver out of the vehicle and she was taken into custody. K-9 Jager was a huge asset on this call. K-9 Jager was very keyed up on the suspect and provided a great deterrent to the suspect to do anything foolish. K-9 Jager was barking and growling at the suspect and then the driver throughout the contact. K-9 Jager provided additional options should the suspect have made other choices.

Patrol/Cover – CTU Callout:

The Monroe County Combine Tactical Unit conducted two search warrants on houses in Sparta. At the execution the search warrants Sergeant Weaver, Officer Nelson, K-9 Jager and I snuck up on the first target house while Deputy Spencer and Deputy Brose drew the suspect out of the house by pretending to be Sparta Street Department workers. Once the suspect was pulled out near the side walk we moved in behind him. A flash bang was deployed directly behind the suspect without him knowing it. The flash bang went off completely surprising him and actually scaring him. Sergeant Weaver deployed lethal cover, Officer Nelson deployed the less lethal shotgun and I had K-9 Jager. The suspect was taken into custody without incident. The suspect from the second search warrant from across the street was taken into custody as he came out to see what was happening.

We then used K-9 Jager to clear the basement of the first residence and the upstairs of the second residence. Going up and down stairs is extremely dangerous when you do not know who may be waiting to ambush CTU members as they come up or down the stairs. Using K-9 Jager for this provided CTU members more safety as he could go up and down and clear the different floors without CTU members exposing themselves. K-9 Jager cleared both areas and came back to me which indicated there was not a great likelihood anyone was there. CTU members then cleared these areas to confirm.

Case #12-1091 Drug Sniff-Vehicle:

Sergeant Weaver, Officer Jones and I assisted Monroe County Sheriff's Department Detective Tester with a traffic stop. The stop was made and I conducted a K-9 sniff on the vehicle with K-9 Jager. K-9 Jager positively alerted on the vehicle and narcotics and contraband were located inside the vehicle. We recovered heroin, marijuana and different items of drug paraphernalia inside the vehicle during our search. The recovered items were turned over to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office for additional follow up on this case.

Cover-CTU Callout:

K-9 Jager and I were called in off duty to assist with a situation involving a pursuit with two escaped inmates from Jackson County. The suspects had driven off road and disappeared over the edge of a field that butted up against a large wooded area. It was known that these subjects had taken a hostage at gunpoint and transported her from Black River Falls to Sparta. We knew the suspects had a 12-gauge shotgun with them and the decision was made to initiate a CTU Callout and treat this call as a manhunt rather than try to pursue the suspect with a few officers. The concern was what type of situation we could have encountered if we walked down to where the vehicle may have been. Had the suspects decided to stay with the vehicle and use the shotgun against us we would have been at a severe disadvantage.

Once the CTU, BEARCAT and the Jackson County Sheriff's Department bloodhounds had gathered we loaded into the BEARCAT and made our way towards the location the truck should have been. I deployed K-9 Jager and the plan was to use him with the bloodhounds as we have trained in the past. We started a track with the bloodhounds and the team from the truck. I followed behind the team with K-9 Jager as cover should we have located the suspects. We pulled off the track and allowed another team to take over but the tracking of these suspects was not successful.

During this callout Deputy Brose and I located a property that had several large out buildings. This property was in line with the direction we believed the suspects to be traveling based on the track. A portion of our team joined us and we cleared each of the buildings using K-9 Jager in the process.

Sergeant Pedersen, K-9 Jager and I cleared a residence that had been left open and was in the area we were searching for the suspect. I deployed K-9 Jager and we moved through the house clearing room by room. K-9 Jager was clearing out in front of us and we could conduct a secondary search behind him. We secured the residence when we left.

Community Relations-National Night Out Demo:

K-9 Jager and I took part in National Night Out at Winnebago Park. I had the opportunity to allow citizens to meet K-9 Jager and asked questions about him and what he does. K-9 Jager and I then were part of the Monroe County Combine Tactical Unit Demo. We did a mock traffic stop where the driver exited the vehicle and started to fight with Officer Welker (Sparta Police Department K-9). Officer Welker used his door popper to deploy K-9 Nitro and apprehend the driver. A passenger then exited the vehicle and ran into the crowd. The passenger laid a track around the outer edge of the peninsula and hid in a small simulated strong hold which was made of pallets. The Monroe County Combine Tactical Unit arrived and I deployed K-9 Jager. We moved to the area the suspect passenger was last seen and K-9 Jager then tracked the suspect to the hiding location. We held up about 30-40 yards from the strong hold and gave commands. We then deployed two flash bangs and the suspect exited and started running away. I released K-9 Jager and he ran the suspect down and made the apprehension.

2012 MONROE COUNTY COMBINED TACTICAL UNIT REPORT

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Department. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit responded to four tactical situations in 2012. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

January 22 – Super 8 Motel, Tomah – Barricaded Subject. CTU responded at the request to the Tomah Police Department to the Super 8 motel where officers had responded to a report of an intoxicated and possibly suicidal man walking in the hallway with a pistol. Initial arriving personnel attempted to communicate with the suspect and he faked compliance and then ran into a room. The suspect refused to answer the phone or communicate with police. CTU personnel arrived and methodically evacuated the other guests from the wing of the hotel. Numerous attempts to contact the suspect via telephone were attempted and a Flash bang was deployed outside of the suspects room before more attempts to contact the suspect also proved unsuccessful. A search warrant was obtained for the room and chemical agents in the form of an OC vapor grenade were introduced into the room. Within seconds the suspect exited the room and was arrested without incident.

March 14 – 111 Morse Street, Sparta – Search Warrant. Sparta Police Department requested CTU assistance with serving a drug search warrant. CTU responded and completing an abbreviated planning session due to desire to serve the warrant prior to school dismissal for the day. CTU served the warrant and a subject at the residence was detained without incident.

May 4 – 600 / 605 Wolcott Street, Sparta – Search Warrants. Sparta Police Department requested CTU serve two search warrants on Wolcott Street at the conclusion of a lengthy multi-agency investigation related to drugs and stolen property including firearms. The primary suspect in the investigation was believed to have a large number of firearms in his residence and observed recently carrying a holstered pistol in the residence. Additionally, both residences were equipped with surveillance cameras. A tactical plan was developed that included targeting the residence of the armed suspect first. Additionally, Sparta Police Department School Resource Officer would confirm that children who lived at the residence were present in school before the plan commenced. Undercover CTU personnel used a ruse to draw the suspect out of the

residence where he was detained by a small team of tactical personnel. The remainder of CTU personnel then arrived at the location via La Crosse County Sheriff's Department BEARCAT armored rescue vehicle. Perimeter personnel, consisting of investigating officers, surrounded the second location. CTU served the search warrant on the primary location and then the secondary location. Two suspects were detained without incident.

July 18 – Holiday Road, Tomah – Manhunt. The Monroe County Sheriff's Department requested CTU assistance with a rural manhunt. Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Wisconsin State Patrol and Tomah Police Department personnel engaged in a vehicle pursuit with two armed and dangerous prison escapees. The suspects went off road in the area of Holiday Road and their stolen vehicle disappeared into a wooded area. CTU immediately requested assistance from the La Crosse County Sheriff's Department BEARCAT armored rescue vehicle due to the fact that the suspects were believed to be armed with long guns. CTU personnel traveled to the suspect's stolen pick-up in the BEARCAT and discovered the truck was abandoned. CTU personnel then conducted a rural manhunt operation with assistance of the Jackson County Sheriff's Department K-9 (bloodhound). After hours of searching in the 90+ degree weather the search was ended and determined to be unsuccessful. The following morning the suspects stole a vehicle from a nearby residence. The suspects were apprehended several days later in Florida.

Several personnel and operational changes occurred in the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit during 2012. The CTU governing board, comprised of the agency head from each host agency, appointed Tomah Police Department Sergeant Chris Weaver as the CTU Commander. The governing board also directed Sergeant Weaver to implement entry level and in-service performance standards for CTU team members. Physical fitness and firearms proficiency standards were developed and a practice test was conducted at the September monthly training. The physical fitness and firearms proficiency testing will be formalized in 2013 with team members required to attain a passing score to remain on the team. Sergeant Weaver named Tomah Police Department Sergeant Eric Pedersen and Sparta Police Department Officer Marc Nelson as Team Leaders. The Team Leaders will provide a second level of formal leadership within the team and will be responsible for supervising small teams of personnel performing specific tasks. Tomah Police Department Officer Dustin Walters resigned to take employment with the Eau Claire County Sheriff's Department and was replaced on CTU by Tomah Police Department Officer Jarrod Furlano.

2012 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT

The following enhancements or upgrades were made in the area of Information Technology or Electronic communications;

Six new desktop computers were purchased and installed in the Tomah Police Department. In addition to other items the new computers are loaded with the Windows 7 operating software and the departments Records Management Software.

A new copier/fax/printer was obtained for the department.

A new computer printer was purchased and installed in the data entry area.

A Taser was purchased to be used for patrol related functions.

One in-car video systems was purchased to replace an outdated unit.

One new Mobile Data computer was purchased to replace an outdated unit.

2012 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department has twelve vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. The vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

- 2009 Chevrolet Tahoe – K-9 Vehicle – Squad #75
- 2011 Chevrolet Tahoe – Shift Supervisor – Squad #78
- 2011 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel – Squad #77
- 2011 Ford Crown Victoria – Patrol Personnel – Squad #40

Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black and white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigations and Shift Supervisor are unmarked patrol vehicles. All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with radar, Mobile Data Computers (MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators(AED), In-car audio/video recorders, digital cameras, Stinger spike systems and Preliminary Breath Tests(PBT). Last year, we also installed in the patrol and supervisor squads a GPS system, which gives speeds and locations of the squads.

2012 COMMUNITY SERVICE ACTIVITIES REPORT

In 2012 the members of the Police Department were busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

Together with the assistance of Tomah Memorial Hospital, Walmart Super Center and Walmart Distribution Center, we held our 10th Annual Monroe County National Night Out. Organizations from around the area were invited to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public coming out to see what was offered. Donations were collected the night of the event for the Neighbor for Neighbor Food Pantry.

The Police Department's Bike Rodeo was held in the park with approximately 200 kids attending. The Med Link Helicopter was able to make an appearance. Other demonstrations were conducted by the Monroe County Tactical Unit, Tomah Police Department K-9, the Town of Lincoln Fire Department and First Responders, Tomah Fire Department and Rescue Technicians, Tomah Area Ambulance Service and the Oakdale First Responders and Fire Department.

Members of the Tomah FFA chapter also displayed an animal learning center and also kept children busy with games and activities.

The Walmart Corporation was very generous in providing donations for the event along with having numerous employees who volunteered their time to help with National Night Out.

BIKE/BLADING SAFETY EXPO

In August the Police Department held its annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo. It was held in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Members of the Tomah and Sparta Police Departments and employees from the Walmart businesses came together to help make the course run smoothly.

Participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members are used to purchase

bicycles, safety helmets, roller blades, bike locks, games and other items that are given away to children who participate in the safety courses.

This event would not be possible without all of the miscellaneous donations from the community businesses.

TOURS

Throughout the year the Department provides tours of the Police Department building to the Kindergarten Classes in the school district. During 2012 members of the Tomah Fire Department, Tomah Area Ambulance Service and Officer Marshall went directly to some of the schools with their safety presentations. By doing this we were able to meet with more kindergarten students in the district. After a short talk with the students they were able to tour fire trucks, the ambulance and a police car.

Other schools chose to visit the police department as in years past. During the tour the children are shown a video in regards to using 9-1-1. They are then able to see and tour the miscellaneous vehicles. At the end of their tour all students are provided with a “goodie” bag that includes stickers, coloring books, a pencil and other safety information.

The Department also provides tours to daycares, Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts and other groups who request a tour.

SCHOOL DISTRICT EVENTS

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day held by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information in regards to child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to the children.

At the middle school, Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. to sixth grade students in the school district, including St. Mary’s School.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at the high school. Topics range from traffic enforcement, child safety seats, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

CAR SEAT SAFETY INSPECTIONS

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from Monroe County Sheriff’s Department and Tomah Memorial Hospital, provide free car seat safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is passed out and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost or in the case of financial need, they are provided to families free of charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a state grant in which they purchased car seats and provided them to families who received county support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week in regards to car seat safety and safety seat inspections, and without the financial support of numerous organizations we would not be able to provide car seats to the public.

Officer Marshall attends a specialized training session each year in order to maintain her certification as a certified car seat technician.

CHILD FINGERPRINTING

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an identification kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

MONROE COUNTY SAFETY COALITION

The Department participates in the county-wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seat belt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking and underage alcohol.

FORT MCCOY MORALE, WELLNESS AND RECREATION DAYS

For the past several years the Department has been represented at the Fort McCoy MWR event by our K9 unit. The military and its members are an important part of Tomah. This event provides us with an opportunity to offer ourselves as a resource and build relationships with military personnel living in the Tomah area.

TOMAH BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY COMMITTEE

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach Department coordinates this Committee. The Committee meets every two months and is made up of representatives from Tomah Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, work place safety and employee health are all discussed.

MONROE COUNTY JUSTICE COORDINATING COMMITTEE

This Committee consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders

Office, Jail Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

TOMAH MEMORIAL HOSPITAL EVENTS

Each year Tomah Memorial Hospital hosts a Senior Citizen and Women's Health and Safety Expo. Officer Marshall is able to attend these events and provide safety information or to be a listening ear to any that may have questions or concerns.

Tomah Memorial Hospital and the Police Department continue to work together to take unused prescription medications during a Drop Off Day at the Police Department. The Police Department also has a medication drop box in the lobby so unused medications are able to be dropped off whenever the main lobby is open.

OTHERS

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, stranger danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the Police Department.

2012 GANG RESISTANCE EDUCATION AND TRAINING REPORT

The spring of 2012 was the completion of the second year of teaching G.R.E.A.T. to 6th grade students at Tomah Middle School. Approximately 200 sixth graders from Tomah Middle School and Saint Mary's School completed the program. As part of the G.R.E.A.T. graduation requirements students needed to be involved in some sort of community service project and share what they did to benefit their community. Upon completion students were awarded with a G.R.E.A.T. certificate and tee shirt.

Sgt. Huneck also assisted Officer Marshall during 2012 by teaching some of the classes when Officer Marshall was unavailable.

During the summer months the Police Department was able to work with the Boys and Girls Club to have G.R.E.A.T. week. Members of the Boys and Girls Club were able to participate in special activities during the week. Sgt. Huneck and Officer Marshall were also a part of the activities. Some of the activities were fishing and games at Winnebago Park, swimming at Three Bears Lodge, roller skating, the high school ropes course, Grandpa Nick's Petting Farm and an afternoon of cleaning up some of the city parks followed by ice cream treats. These activities were all possible thanks to generous donations from Three Bears Lodge and Flying Wheels roller skating rink, Tomah School District and Grandpa Nick's petting Farm. .

Officer Marshall and Sgt. Huneck are currently teaching G.R.E.A.T. to sixth graders at Tomah Middle School and St Mary's School, with graduation planned in May of this year.

2012 GRANTS AWARDED TO THE TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT

During 2012 the Tomah Police Department applied for several grants. Throughout the year the police department was awarded \$43,080.00 worth of grants, equipment, and donations. The following is a list of grants, the amount received from the grant, and how the money was received was used.

2012 Youth Alcohol Enforcement Grant – As part of the Monroe County Alcohol School-Community Alliance Coalition, the Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$2500.00 grant. This grant was used to offset overtime expenses incurred to ensure that alcohol serving establishments in the City of Tomah were not providing alcohol to underage persons. Specifically officers conducted compliance checks at taverns, liquor stores, hotels, grocery stores, and convenience stores during this process.

2012 CouleeCap Alcohol Compliance Grant – The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$650.00 Grant from CouleeCap. The grant was used to offset overtime expenses incurred to facilitate a second round of alcohol compliance checks in the City of Tomah.

2012 Frank G. Andres Grant - The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$2500.00 grant from the Frank G. Andres Grant. The grant was used to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program and to purchase materials that the department provides during department tours.

2012 Frank .G Andres Grant – The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a \$5930.00 grant from the Frank G. Andres Grant. The grant was used to purchase and install a new emergency siren in the City of Tomah.

2012 Walmart Foundation Grant - The Tomah Police Department applied for and received a grant from the Walmart Foundation. The \$1,500.00 grant was used to purchase a subscription to Leads Online. Leads Online is the nation's largest online investigation system for law enforcement, providing rapid electronic access to transactions from thousands of reporting businesses including scrap metal processors, secondhand stores, Internet drop-off stores, and pawn shops across the country, as well as information from eBay listings for criminal investigations.

2012 Wiscom Grant - The Tomah Police Department received \$30,000 for the purchase of radio programming and installation of said programming to provide our agency with state-wide interoperability communication.
