# LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life.

I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

#### TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT

#### VISION

The Tomah Police Department exists to serve the community by protecting life and property, by preventing crime, enforcing the laws, and by maintaining order for the citizens.

- \* We are capable people who care about the citizens of the City of Tomah. We believe that pride in ourselves, in others, in our work and in the Department is a key factor in obtaining excellence.

#### 2015 ACHIEVEMENTS

**PRESCRIPTION DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM** – The Tomah Police Department continues to maintain a Prescription Drug Drop Off Program. Along with the ability to drop off medications throughout the year, the Department participated in two nationwide Take Back Days sponsored by the Drug Enforcement Agency. By participating in the DEA sponsored events we were afforded the opportunity to dispose of our unwanted medication at no cost. The Department continues to offer a Medication Drop Off Container located in the lobby of the Department for use by citizens who wish to dispose of their unwanted medications. As of our last disposal we have collected and disposed of over 650 pounds of medication through this program.

CITY OF TOMAH ACTION PLAN, "10 IN 10 LIST" – The Tomah Police Department recognized two key areas in the "10 in 10 List" that directly relate to our Mission Statement.

Those areas include #5, "Clean Tomah Initiative" and #8, "Become the Safest Small Town in Wisconsin."

Throughout 2015 we continued to work closely with the City Administrator, City Council Members, and the City Inspector to ensure our "Quality of Life" ordinances are being updated and enforced when needed. A majority of these ordinances directly relate to keeping the City of Tomah clean and orderly.

Although there is no single action plan to "Become the Safest Small Town in Wisconsin" we recognize that it is an ongoing effort that requires collaboration between law enforcement, schools, social service agencies, civic organizations, businesses, and residents. Our officers are actively involved in activities and organizations, both personally and professionally, to assist in accomplishing this.

**GRANTS/DONATIONS** - The Tomah Police Department received \$56,279.18 in donations and grants in 2015:

\$26,309.91 was received from the Department of Justice to cover the training expenses for Crisis Intervention Training. The Tomah Police Department sponsored this training. The training was attended by law enforcement officers from throughout the Coulee Region.

\$3,500 was received from the Andres Grant to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program as well as to support other crime prevention initiatives.

\$500 was donated to the Police Department from Kwik Trip. This money was used to purchase a Pole Camera to be used by our Combined Tactical Unit.

Two \$4,000 grants totaling \$8,000 were awarded from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for our involvement in the "Click It or Ticket" and the "Booze and Belts" programs. These grants allowed the department to purchase 10 body cameras, 1 Mobile Data Computer, and 2 in-car printers.

\$11,594.27 was received from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to participate in a county wide Speedwave grant. This grant paid for the overtime for the officers while they worked this detail.

\$4,875 was donated to the police department by various businesses, organizations and individuals. These donations were used to facilitate the Bike and Blading Safety Expo held during Monroe County National Night Out.

\$1,500 was received from a Community Grant from the Wal-Mart Supercenter to fund one year's subscription to the Leads Online property recovery program.

MONROE COUNTY NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – The Tomah Police Department continues to be actively involved in organizing and participating in the Monroe County National Night Out event. This event was once again held in Tomah at Winnebago Park. It was a very well attended event where citizens had an opportunity to interact with different groups and organizations to address various safety-related issues and community concerns. Along with other activities scheduled at this event is our annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo. Approximately 250 kids participated in this event.

**DEPARTMENT WEBSITE/FACEBOOK** – The Department website continues to expand and provide more information and useful links to our community. This website is designed to provide information to the public, as well as housing some forms for the use by the public. The website address is www.tomahpolice.com. The Department utilizes Facebook to provide the community with information and the ability to contact us in a more informal manner related to concerns they may have. December 28, 2015 will mark our 3rd year anniversary of having our Facebook page. Currently there are 5,063 "friends" that follow us on Facebook.

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER, G.R.E.A.T PROGRAM** – The Department continues to partner with the Tomah School District to facilitate the School Resource Officer position and the G.R.E.A.T Program. The SRO continues to work closely with school administration, employees and students on a daily basis.

**WISCONSIN DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION "CLICK-IT OR TICKET" AND "BOOZE AND BELTS" COMPLIANCE CHECKS** – In 2015 the Department participated in the Wisconsin Department of Transportation "Click-It or Ticket" program focusing on seatbelt compliance as well as the "Booze and Belts" program which focuses on impaired driving and seatbelt compliance in our community. For participating in these programs the department was randomly chosen to receive two \$4,000.00 grants.

**HOLIDAY GIVING TREE** – In 2015 the Department once again partnered with Families First to sponsor our annual "Giving Tree" during the holiday season. This year will mark our 12th year of this project. The Giving Tree provides approximately 40 needy children from our community with Christmas gifts.

**DEPARTMENT STAFFING** - In 2015 the Tomah Police Department hired two officers to replace officers that had left our department. We also transitioned a Part-Time Clerk into the Full-Time Clerk position which was created when a retirement occurred. An additional Part-Time Clerk was hired to fill the vacancy created with the above transition. As we enter 2016 we are currently at full staff.

**ALCOHOL RELATED ORDINANCES, DEMERIT POINT PROCESS** - The Tomah Police Department worked closely with the Ad Hoc Alcohol Review Committee to update and revise our alcohol ordinances and create a demerit point process for alcohol licenses. The

ordinance changes and demerit point process was approved by the City Council and are slated to take effect in 2016. The Police Department will continue to work with the City Council, license holders, and the Ad Hoc Alcohol Review Committee to review and reorganize the alcohol related ordinances. The Department will continue to hold meetings with the license holders to address any concerns as they arise. The Department will continue to conduct periodic alcohol compliance checks at the licensed establishments.

**MONTHLY COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE/CITY COUNCIL REPORT** – In 2015 the Tomah Police Department developed and began providing the Committee of the Whole/City Council a newly formatted Monthly Report. The revised format contains data which is more relevant to the information which they are desiring.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES - A police department's Policy and Procedures Manual is the foundation for all of the department's operations. When properly developed and implemented, a Policy and Procedure Manual provides staff with the information to act decisively, consistently and legally. The department currently has a comprehensive policy manual which allows this to be done. During 2015 the Police Department organized a Policy Review Committee. This Committee began the ongoing review of our policies and procedures. This review will ensure our policies and procedures are in compliance with current management, operational and legal standards.

#### **2016 GOALS**

**COMMUNITY BASED POLICING** - The Tomah Police Department's ability to deliver police services through community based policing is part of the on-going partnership we have developed with organizations and groups throughout our surrounding area. Some of those organizations and groups include the following: Our Town Tomah, Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee, Monroe County Safe Community Coalition, Tomah Financial Institution Security Officers Association, Tomah School District, Tomah Memorial Hospital, Monroe County Child Abuse Task Force, and the Monroe County Coordinated Services Team. In 2016 we will continue to be actively involved in these groups and organizations.

ALCOHOL RELATED ORDINANCES, DEMERIT POINT PROCESS - The Police Department will continue to work with the City Council, license holders, and the Alcohol Review Committee to review alcohol related ordinances and Alcohol/Operators Licenses. The Department will continue to hold meetings with the license holders to address any concerns as they arise. The Department will continue to conduct periodic alcohol compliance checks at the licensed establishments.

**PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT** - Our employees are our most valuable assets. Training resources and opportunities to learn are critical elements in maintaining a high level of service for the community. All employees, civilian and sworn, play a vital role in meeting our mission. Preparing future leaders by keeping staff up to date with changing technology, current trends, and forward thinking ideas prepares the department to move into the future. We must continue to invest in their ongoing development. This investment provides a rewarding and healthy work environment which, in turn, drives our employees to seek excellence.

COMMUNICATIONS INFRASTRUCTURE - In 2011 the FCC mandated that all Public Safety radio systems migrate to narrowband technology by January 1, 2013. Because of the preplanning, equipment purchases (radios), and the work that was conducted prior to the required date, the Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Communication Center met the requirements as set for by the FCC. In April 2012 the Public Safety Radio systems throughout Monroe County, to include the Tomah Police Department, were switched to a narrowband system. Immediately upon switching to the narrowband system officers and dispatchers detected a noticeable degradation in the radio system. Locations within the City of Tomah, to include outside and inside buildings, which had excellent radio coverage prior to switching to narrowband, were now marginal. Other locations which were marginal prior to switching to narrowband now have little to no radio reception, resulting in dead spots throughout the City of Tomah. The Tomah Police Department has began the process of upgrading its Communications Infrastructure to improve the radio system. This process will include a 2 phase project. Funding for Phase 1 of project, approximately \$130,000, has been approved by the City Council and will take place in 2016. Phase 2 of the project will be included in the 2017 budget.

# 2015 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or "solo patrol."

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is "solo patrol" and lasts for the duration of the officer's Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and the City of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Scott Holum and supervised by Sergeant Eric Pedersen. The Field Training Officers are Officer Aaron Hintz, Officer Adam Perkins, Officer Wilbert Steinborn and Officer Brittnay Westpfahl.

Officer Tyler Franks successfully completed training and was granted tenure as a patrol officer in June of 2015. Officer Rylan Corcoran and Officer Brandon Kuhn were both hired by the Tomah Police Department in October 2015 and are currently in the Field Training process.

#### 2015 INVESTIGATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

#### TOMAH POLIC DEPARTMENT CASE 15-0153, 15-0154 AND 15-0155

These cases involve the investigation of heroin by the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force. In each case, a subject arranged to meet with a heroin supplier to obtain heroin. The three subjects were arrested when they arrived at a location to pick up heroin from a heroin source. This led to the search of a Tomah motel room where heroin and illegal prescription medication was seized. There were children living in the motel room with one of the subjects arrested. Heroin was being used and heroin users were coming to this motel room with the children being present and exposed to needles, heroin and other illegal drugs. The investigation then led investigators to a Sparta residence where a search warrant was executed after it was learned that heroin was being distributed from this residence to various subjects and some of the heroin was being brought to Tomah. A male subject at the Sparta residence from Chicago was arrested and was in possession of a significant amount of heroin, cocaine and marijuana. The subject from Chicago was charged with multiple felonies related to the Distribution and Possession with the Intent to Distribute Heroin and Cocaine. This subject was convicted in a jury trial in 2015 and was sentenced to a total of 12 years, with the first 7 years to be served in prison followed by 5 years of extended supervision. This same subject was sentenced to 4 years in prison and 3 years of extended supervision from a previous drug investigation conducted by the Tomah Police Department in 2009.

#### **TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT CASE 15-0356**

This case involves an investigation conducted by the Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force of a homicide that occurred at Econo Lodge in Tomah on March 11, 2015. The victim was a 44 year old male Tomah resident. Early in the investigation possible suspects were identified. Both suspects were from Boise, Idaho. Investigators were sent to Boise, Idaho to conduct the investigation. This led to other locations where the suspects had gone after stealing a vehicle in Boise, Idaho, which included locations in Montana, North Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin. After identifying the suspects in this case and conducting the initial investigation, the suspects were arrested in Millersville, Tennessee. Investigators were sent to Millersville, Tennessee to conduct follow up investigation with the two suspects in this case, as well as interview witnesses and process the stolen vehicle the suspects had traveled across the country in while committing various crimes, including the homicide in Tomah. The suspects confessed to their involvement in the Tomah homicide, as well as the theft of the

vehicle from Boise, Idaho, fleeing from the police in a high speed pursuit in North Dakota, stealing and pawning various items as they traveled across the country, and various other crimes. The stolen vehicle was transported back to Wisconsin and processed at the State Crime Laboratory in Madison. The suspects were extradited back to Wisconsin and remain in custody pending trials scheduled in 2016 for charges from the Tomah homicide.

# **TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT CASE 15-0840**

This case involves an investigation conducted by the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force of an intoxicated felon in possession of multiple firearms on Butts Avenue in Tomah. The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit also assisted in this incident. A male resident of the Butts Avenue residence went into the bedroom of another resident intoxicated and displayed a firearm. The police were alerted to this activity after notification to a third party of the situation by one of the occupants of the Butts Avenue residence that observed this behavior. The intoxicated subject with the firearm was determined to be a convicted felon, prohibited from possessing firearms. The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit established a perimeter on the residence and the subject eventually complied with police and was taken into custody. A search warrant served at the residence was done and several firearms and evidence of alcohol consumption by the subject who had armed himself in the residence was located in the residence. This subject was taken to the Monroe County Jail and has also been charged in this case.

#### **TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT CASE 15-0853**

This case involves the delivery of crack cocaine to an undercover law enforcement officer in an investigation conducted by the Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force on Mclean Avenue in Tomah on June 18, 2015. The suspect in this case had been released from the Monroe County Jail on June 17, 2015 for unrelated charges. The suspect and undercover officer in this case made arrangements to meet on Mclean Avenue near East Clifton Street for the purpose of conducting a drug transaction. The suspect wanted to meet with the undercover officer at that location and agreed to deliver crack cocaine at that location. The suspect met with the undercover officer who was in a vehicle and exchanged crack cocaine for money. As the suspect walked away from the vehicle he was taken into custody by other officers that had been conducting surveillance during the controlled purchase of crack cocaine. The subject was arrested and transported to the jail. A search warrant was obtained for a residence in Tomah later on the same day as a result of information obtained during this investigation. Additional evidence of illegal drugs was located in the residence pursuant to the search warrant.

# **TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT CASE 15-1167**

On September 23, 2007 a then 19 year old female reported being sexually assaulted by a male subject that was staying and working temporarily in the Tomah area. The female victim was acquainted with the male subject who was from Michigan and in the United States on some type of work permit from Iraq training military personnel for warfare in the Middle East. After the sexual assault occurred, the father of the victim confronted the male subject and he immediately left the Tomah area. Based on the evidence that was present in 2007, prosecution of the matter was declined at that time. DNA evidence had been obtained from the investigation in 2007. In 2015, additional information was obtained that assisted with charging the 2007 sexual assault in Tomah. The suspect in the 2007 Tomah sexual assault was arrested and charged in Wayne County, Michigan with a sexual assault that occurred in 2009 in Detroit, Michigan. There was a case to case DNA match with the same suspect previously, but the 2009 case was not thoroughly investigated by the Detroit Police Department and that caused some delay in prosecution of the matter in Michigan. The Wayne County District Attorney's Office in Michigan picked up the investigation of the 2009 Michigan sexual assault case in 2015 and has since arrested the suspect in the Michigan sexual assault. The sexual assault was very similar to the one that occurred in 2007 in Tomah, Wisconsin. DNA and other evidence from the 2007 Tomah sexual assault matched the evidence in the 2009 Michigan case. After examining this case further, the suspect in the 2007 Tomah sexual assault has been charged and there is currently a warrant for the suspect who is in custody in Michigan to be brought back to Wisconsin to face charges in this case. The 2007 victim was contacted again in 2015 and was very grateful that the suspect was finally being held accountable for his actions involving her in 2007.

#### **METHAMPHETAMINE**

In 2015, the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force combined with multiple law enforcement agencies in Lacrosse County, Monroe County, Jackson County and Trempealeau County to investigate large amounts of methamphetamine that was being brought into this area and surrounding area. This investigation involved many officers and agencies that are part of the West Central Metropolitan Drug Enforcement Group, of which we are a member agency. Over the course of approximately a year, law enforcement officers from all the agencies were able to conduct interviews, make controlled buys, serve search warrants and obtain evidence of hundreds of pounds of methamphetamine being distributed from Mexico to the Twin Cities in Minnesota and into Lacrosse, Wisconsin. Much of the methamphetamine would then be distributed from Lacrosse to the surrounding communities, including Tomah. Through the course of this investigation 17 suspects have been charged with Conspiracy to Distribute Methamphetamine. Methamphetamine, paraphernalia, firearms, cash and

other evidence was seized by the various law enforcement agencies involved in this investigation. The prosecution of this matter is being handled by the Lacrosse County District Attorney's Office and all of these cases are still pending additional court proceedings. These arrests had a significant impact on the methamphetamine in this area.

Methamphetamine activity appears to have increased dramatically based on the ongoing investigations being conducted, information from informants, and contacts made during the normal course of business in Tomah and the surrounding areas. Many of the other law enforcement jurisdictions in the area are also seeing a similar trend with methamphetamine.

#### 2015 SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT

Officer Marshall serves as the School Resource Officer for the Tomah Police Department and Tomah School District.

Officer Marshall provides law enforcement and police services to the schools in the city and enforces state and local laws as needed. Truancy, Disorderly Conduct and drug violations are just a small list of the different types of calls that Officer Marshall handles.

Officer Marshall maintains a close partnership with school administrators in order to provide a safe school environment. Officer Marshall assists administrators by being present during school searches, which may involve weapons, controlled dangerous substances or in situations that involve risk to the administrator. Officer Marshall works closely with the School District in regards to the safety and security of the schools and students in the district. Officer Marshall also assists in emergency crisis planning and building security matters.

Officer Marshall is visible within the school community by attending and participating in various events such as Student Orientation, Child Development Day, Prom, and Homecoming activities. Officer Marshall speaks in high school Health and Teen Parenting classes, and is available to speak in other classes as requested.

Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. throughout the school year to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and St. Mary's School. She also provides tours of the police department to elementary students.

Officer Marshall serves as a resource for both the staff and students and continues to build relationships with both groups. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regard to any concerns or questions they may have. Staff members share information with Officer Marshall in regard to concerns they may have about students. Officer Marshall meets with the principals and guidance counselors at the high school on a regular basis for information sharing and concerns. This is necessary in order to assist students and provide services to students involved in situations where referrals to service agencies are necessary. School Principals, Officer Marshall and workers from Monroe County Human Services also meet monthly to discuss concerns with students who may need additional services.

Officer Marshall assists other officers and agencies with coordinating interviews or services that involve students within the school district. Officer Marshall has regular contact with workers from Monroe County Human Services in regards to concerns that involve students and families. Officer Marshall also assists Intensive Sanctions Program workers with the students that they monitor by providing updates on student activities and behaviors.

Officer Marshall maintains communication with other officers that have had interactions with students or staff and keeps abreast of any pending investigations involving students or staff from the school district. Officer Marshall also meets with other School Resource Officers from the area to share information and resources.

#### 2015 K-9 UNIT ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police K-9 Unit consists of Officer Aaron Hintz and his partner, K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz has worked for the Department since September 2005 and was selected as the K-9 Handler in 2009.

In June of 2009, Officer Hintz traveled to Sanford North Carolina and visited Tarheel Canine Training Inc. Officer Hintz was able to look at several dogs and ultimately selected K-9 Jager. K-9 Jager is a male sable German Shepherd Dog that came from the Czech Republic. Officer Hintz traveled back to Tarheel Canine in September of 2009 for 4 weeks of training with K-9 Jager. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager successfully completed training together in a variety of different areas.

Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager work together on 1<sup>st</sup> shift, but are also on-call to assist members of the Department with situations where K-9 Jager could be of assistance. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager are also members of the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU). K-9 Jager is a dual-purpose patrol dog. The term "dual-purpose" suggests two jobs. First, K-9 Jager is trained as a patrol dog, providing handler protection, criminal apprehension, tracking, building searches and area searches. Secondly, K-9 Jager is also trained as a drug detector dog. He is trained to detect and alert to the odor associated with marijuana, cocaine/crack, methamphetamine and heroin. In addition to these trained jobs, K-9 Jager serves as a community relations tool for the Department.

Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager train together on a regular basis in order to stay proficient in the different tasks K-9 Jager is trained to perform. Most recently, in May of 2015, K-9 Jager and Officer Hintz were certified through N.A.P.W.D.A. in all the areas K-9 Jager is trained in.

#### 2015 CASE HIGHLIGHTS

**PUBLIC RELATIONS** - Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager attended the annual Mutt Strut event. Officer Hintz gave a presentation on K-9 Jager and the different areas he is trained in. Due to a recent injury K-9 Jager did not do any type of demo as in the past. Officer Hintz took several questions from the crowd and was able to help those in attendance understand different aspects of K-9 Jager's job and abilities. As in past years there was a lot of interest and it was a very positive interaction with K-9 Jager and the community members who attended.

SUSPECT TRACK/AREA SEARCH - Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager were called in off duty for a suspect track / area search from a residential burglary that had occurred sometime in the previous 24 hours. It had rained heavily since the burglary but officers on scene had located a spot where it looked like someone had spent the night at some point. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager responded and started at a point where some blankets had been laid down in the woods. The only time it seemed K-9 Jager was in odor was when he pulled from the blankets around to another big spruce tree in the yard closer to the house. Here officers located several stolen items from the house. There were several envelopes that were torn open and other small house hold items. K-9 Jager also located a receipt from Goodwill. Officer Marshall followed up on this receipt and was able to associate it to the suspect in the burglary. There are currently warrants out for the suspects arrest based on being able to identify him from the Goodwill video, as well as a contact Investigator Sloan had with the suspect a few days prior.

ALARM/BUILDING SEARCH/PATROL - Officers received a call of a residential burglary alarm and responded after the daughter of the home owner responded and called the police. Officers found the back screen door to be unlocked and the main entry door was wide open. Officer Hintz deployed K-9 Jager into the basement to search for suspects. K-9 Jager checked the basement then returned to Officer Hintz. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager then re-cleared the basement together while Sgt. Weaver held open the second door into the main floor of the house. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager moved upstairs and K-9 Jager cleared the main floor. K-9 Jager went to the top of the stairs and went into a down position watching the upstairs rooms while Sgt. Weaver and Officer Hintz re-cleared the main floor. Once the main floor was cleared Officer Hintz gave K-9 Jager the command to go check the second level. K-9 Jager did this and came back the top of the stairs. Officer Hintz and Sgt. Weaver moved up and re-cleared the second level. There was no one located and nothing seemed out of place.

**DRUG SNIFF-VEHICLE-** A Monroe County Sheriff's Deputy had conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle and requested an exterior K-9 sniff of the vehicle. Officer Hintz and K-9 Jager arrived and conducted the sniff. K-9 Jager positively alerted on the vehicle. K-9 Jager also alerted on the glove box on the interior sniff. Inside the glove box the Deputy located a canister that contained marijuana residue in it.

**DRUG SNIFF - HOUSE -** Officers were called to a trailer where no one was currently living. However, the caller report that there were supposed to be multiple individuals and probable drug activity going on inside the residence at the time of the call. Officer Hintz was called in off duty to assist and brought K-9 Jager. Ultimately Officer Hintz deployed K-9 Jager for a sniff of the interior of the trailer. During the sniff K-9 Jager positively alerted on the end of the couch sitting then pawing in between the armrest and the cushion. Officer Hintz looked in the couch and observed two baggies of what appeared to be crystal meth. The substances were later tested and confirmed to be methamphetamine. Based on the location of these items, they likely would not have been located without K-9 Jager's alert to them.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Sparta Police Department, Tomah Police Department and Wisconsin State Patrol. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

During 2015 CTU had several significant personnel changes. Sergeant Eric Pedersen (8 years service) and Sparta Police Department Detective Jose Tovar (4 years) resigned from the team. Tomah Police Department Sergeant Jacob Jones, a previous CTU member was re-assigned to the team and Sparta Police Department Officer Jake Edwards and Officer Brian James & K-9 Larz were assigned to the team. Additionally, an agreement was established with the Wisconsin State Patrol to assign Trooper Mike Larson to the team.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit responded to five tactical situations in 2015. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

February 26 – Hamlet Avenue Rural Sparta – Search Warrant. Monroe County Sheriff's Department requested assistance with serving a search warrant for the Joint Investigative Task Force. In addition to suspected drug dealing at the location, additional information was developed that a suspect in a recent armed robbery was likely staying at the residence. A tactical plan was developed to serve the warrant as a breach and hold, where the front door to the residence would be breached and the occupants called outside, due to the potential for an armed suspect at the location. After the front door was breached three occupants immediately came outside and a fourth came out a short time later. The residence was searched for suspects and no one else was found inside. The scene was then turned over to the investigators.

June 15– 1500 Block Butts Avenue Tomah – Search Warrant. Tomah Police responded to a domestic violence incident involving a felon who had been drinking and was armed with a rifle. Two other people were in the residence at the time and were able to leave once police arrived. Due to the threat evaluation of the situation, to include prior contacts with the suspect, as well as an arrest for Possession of Firearm by Felon, and antipolice/anti-government statements a search warrant was obtained for the residence. A CTU call out was then initiated to serve the search warrant. CTU tactical personnel responded and covertly established a perimeter around the residence and evacuated several neighbors. A Crisis Negotiator then contacted the suspect via a family member's cellular telephone and the suspect immediately and without prompting by the negotiator exited the residence. CTU personnel on the perimeter quickly took the suspect into custody.

August 19 – STH 27 Rural Sparta – Barricaded Suspect. Monroe County Sheriff's Department requested CTU call out for a Barricaded Suspect on STH 27. The subject was likely suicidal and armed with a firearm. An Emergency Detention was approved on the subject and the CTU call out was initiated. Shortly after arrival of CTU personnel and equipment the suspect, who was speaking with a Crisis Negotiator, agreed to surrender and was detained without incident.

November 23 – Avon Road Sparta – Barricaded Suspect. Sparta Police attempted to arrest a subject with an outstanding arrest warrant and the suspect armed himself with a firearm while forcing the police officer to retreat from the residence. CTU call out was initiated and CTU Tactical and Crisis Negotiator personnel responded to the scene. CTU Tactical personnel in the MRAP armored vehicle were able to see the suspect moving around in the residence with firearms and numerous other firearms placed throughout the residence. After several hours of communications with the suspect a chemical agents deployment plan was developed and approved. However, due to the exterior environment tactical personnel were not able to get into a safe position to launch chemical agents. Mutual aid was requested from the La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team (ERT) and they responded with their BEARCAT armored vehicle. CTU personnel were able to use the BEARCAT to approach the structure and deploy the chemical agents while additional personnel deployed chemical agents from the MRAP. After receiving no response from inside tactical personnel in the BEARCAT breached windows and deployed a robot inside the residence. Ultimately the suspect was located deceased lying in bed with a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

December 5 – Goodman Street Sparta – Barricaded Suspect. Sparta Police Department requested CTU assistance with a Barricaded Suspect. Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Sparta Police Department were investigating a domestic violence incident and a theft of motor vehicle. Upon attempting contact with the suspect at his residence the suspect came to the door with a rifle. CTU call out was initiated and upon arrival the suspect had lit a fire of unknown origin in the residence. The suspect was communicating with tactical personnel, who were using the MRAP armored vehicle for cover, through a window. After approximately one hour the suspect came outside and tactical personnel fired less-lethal projectiles at the suspect

who was then able to push himself back inside. Mutual aid was requested from La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team (ERT) initially in the form of their BEARCAT armored vehicle to use as a chemical agents launching platform. Chemical agents were fired into the ground floor of the residence and an exterior clearing operation was initiated. Nearly all of the ground floor was cleared from the cover of armored vehicles with pole camera and robot and the suspect was not located. Chemical agents were fired into the stairway to the basement on the belief that the suspect was hiding in the basement. After receiving no response from the suspect a mutual aid for explosive breaching was initiated and more La Crosse County Sheriff ERT personnel responded and used explosives to open a hole into the basement of the residence through the exterior wall. An OC (pepper spray) grenade was deployed into the basement and there was no response so a pole camera was inserted into the basement. The suspect threw laundry soap at the camera to obscure the lens and later threw the empty OC grenade back outside. As plans were being developed to deliver additional chemical agents into the basement the suspect came upstairs and moved into the house, ignoring commands from tactical personnel. A La Crosse County Sheriff's Department ERT member was able to impact the suspect with a less-lethal projectile and the suspect surrendered a short time later. This call out lasted approximately 10 hours and required many different resources to resolve the incident.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit continues to train for one eight hour day each month in addition to other training that individual members attend. Sniper team members continue to train with Fort McCoy Police SRT Snipers on a regular basis. Nine team members attended the Association of SWAT Personnel-Wisconsin Conference, which included incident debriefs from several critical incidents across the United States. CTU conducted two joint training sessions, with La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team and La Crosse Police Department Emergency Response Team.

#### 2015 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT

The following enhancements or upgrades were made in the area of Information Technology or Electronic communications:

Ten (10) Taser Axon Body Cameras were purchased for use and wearing by officers to record contacts with subjects while on duty. These cameras were paid for by a Department of Transportation grant.

Two (2) work stations were purchased as replacements for existing stations. The Department strives to maintain a three (3) year rotation cycle of work stations in an effort to curtail computer problems which become more prevalent when systems are kept too long.

One (1) Mobile Data Computer system, docking station and two (2) in-car printers were purchased to replace outdated units. This equipment was paid for by a Department of Transportation grant.

One (1) in-car camera system was purchased to replace an outdated unit.

The Tomah Police Department has began the process of upgrading its Communications Infrastructure to improve the radio system. This process will include a 2 phase project. Funding for Phase 1 of the project, approximately \$130,000, has been approved by the City Council and will take place in 2016. Phase 2 of the project will be included in the 2017 budget.

#### 2015 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department has twelve vehicles in our fleet that are used by supervisory personnel, investigations and patrol officers. The vehicles in our fleet are as follows:

Squad cars operated by patrol personnel have traditional black and white paint. The vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Investigations and Shift Supervisors are unmarked patrol vehicles.

All of the vehicles in our fleet for patrol and supervisory personnel are equipped with Radar, Mobile Data Computers (MDC), M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators(AED), In-Car Audio/Video Recorders, Digital Cameras, Stinger Spike Systems and Preliminary Breath Tests(PBT).

#### 2015 COMMUNITY SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT

In 2015 the members of the Police Department were busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

#### NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The Police Department, with the help of Tomah Memorial Hospital, Wal-Mart Super Center and Wal-Mart Distribution Center participated in the 13th annual Monroe County National Night Out held at Winnebago Park. Organizations from around the area came to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public.

The Police Department's Bike and Blading Safety Expo was also held in the park during National Night Out. Demonstrations were conducted by the Monroe County Tactical Unit, the Town of Lincoln Fire Department and First Responders, Tomah Fire Department and Rescue Technicians, Tomah Area Ambulance Service and the Oakdale First Responders and Fire Department.

Members of the Tomah FFA chapter displayed an animal learning center and also kept children busy with games and activities.

This event would not be possible without the support and donations from the public.

#### BIKE AND BLADING SAFETY EXPO

The Police Department held its annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Volunteers from the Wal-Mart Corporation assisted to ensure the course ran smoothly.

During the Bike and Blading Safety Expo participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members, together with a grant from Wal-Mart, assist us in purchasing bikes and back packs for children who participated. Each back pack was filled with items needed for students to start out their school year. Over 250 children attended the event and received a back pack.

#### **TOURS**

Throughout the year tours of the Police Department are offered to different community groups such as the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Handishop, Boys & Girls Club, as well as other groups who may request the same.

# SCHOOL DISTRICT EVENTS

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day held by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information in regards to child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to the children.

At the Middle School, Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. to sixth grade students in the school district, including St. Mary's School.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at the high school. Topics range from traffic enforcement, child safety seats, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

#### CAR SEAT SAFETY INSPECTIONS

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from the Monroe County Sheriff's Department and Tomah Memorial Hospital, provide free car sear safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is distributed and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost. In the case of financial need, they are provided to families for a minimal charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a state grant to purchase car seats and provided them to families who received county support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week in regards to car seat safety and safety seat inspections. Without the financial support of numerous organizations we would not be able to provide car seats to the public.

Officer Marshall attends a specialized training session each year in order to maintain her certification as a Certified Car Seat Technician.

#### **CHILD FINGERPRINTING**

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child

fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an Identification Kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

#### MONROE COUNTY SAFE COMMUNITY COALITION

The Department participates in the county-wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seat belt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking and underage alcohol.

#### TOMAH BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY COMMITTEE

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach coordinates this committee. The Committee meets on an on-call basis and is comprised of representatives from Tomah Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, workplace safety and employee health are all discussed.

#### MONROE COUNTY JUSTICE COORDINATING COUNCIL

This Council consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders Office, Jail Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

#### **COPS ON ROOF TOPS**

For the second year the Special Olympics "Cops on Roof Tops" event was held at Dunkin Donuts in Tomah. Officers from the City of Tomah and the Monroe County Sheriff's Department climbed the roof of Dunkin Donuts to raise money for Special Olympics. Some of the Special Olympians came out as well to help collect donations. The Tomah Store collected the most donations of all the stores around the State of Wisconsin.

# TOMAH MEMORIAL HOSPITAL EVENTS

Each year Tomah Memorial Hospital hosts various health/safety wellness events. In 2015 officers attended the Senior Citizen's Health Fair and Women's Health and Safety Expo. Officers attend these events and provide safety information to attendees.

# **OTHERS**

Over the last several years Gunderson Lutheran Clinic has hosted a Family Safety Night. Officer Marshall attended again in 2015 to pass out safety information to families.

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, stranger danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the police department.

# 2015 GANG RESISTANCE EDUCATION AND TRAINING (G.R.E.A.T.) ANNUAL REPORT

The spring of 2015 was the completion of the fifth year of teaching G.R.E.A.T. to 6<sup>th</sup> grade students at the Tomah Middle School and St. Mary's School. Approximately 220 sixth graders from Tomah Middle School and St. Mary's School completed the program. Besides completing their assigned lessons, students are required to complete 1 hour of some sort of community service. This is part of the G.R.E.A.T. graduation requirement. Students are also required to share what they did to benefit their community. Upon completion students were awarded with a G.R.E.A.T. certificate and a tee shirt.

The G.R.E.A.T. program is taught to all 6<sup>th</sup> graders at Tomah Middle School during their Health class. The program consists of G.R.E.A.T. lessons that cover various topics such as goal setting, decision making, active listening, conflict resolution, dealing with peers, anger management and being part of the community.

Sgt. Huneck assists Officer Marshall with the G.R.E.A.T. program by teaching classes when Officer Marshall is unavailable.

No classes were taught during the fall of 2015 due to a staffing shortages. The 13 weeks of G.R.E.A.T. classes are currently scheduled to begin in January 2016 and will run until the end of the school year.

In 2016 the Tomah Police Department will partner with the Tomah Boys & Girls Club to provide a summer G.R.E.A.T. program at the Club.

#### 2015 GRANTS AWARDED

**GRANTS/DONATIONS** - The Tomah Police Department received \$60,147.18 in donations and grants in 2015:

- \$26,309.91 was received from the Department of Justice to cover the training expenses for Crisis Intervention Training. The Tomah Police Department sponsored this training. The training was attended by law enforcement officers from throughout the Coulee Region.
- \$3,500 was received from the Andres Grant to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program as well as to support other crime prevention initiatives.
- \$500 was donated to the Police Department from Kwik Trip. This money was used to purchase a Pole Camera to be used by our Combined Tactical Unit.
- Two \$4,000 grants totaling \$8,000 were awarded from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for our involvement in the "Click It or Ticket" and the "Booze and Belts" programs. These grants allowed the department to purchase 10 body cameras, 1 Mobile Data Computer, and 2 in-car printers.
- \$11,594.27 was received from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to participate in a county wide Speedwave grant. The grant paid for the overtime for the officers while they worked this detail.
- \$4,875 was donated to the police department by various businesses, organizations and individuals. These donations were used to facilitate the Bike Rodeo held during Monroe County National Night Out.
- \$1,500 was received from a Community Grant from the Wal-Mart Supercenter to fund one year's subscription to the Leads Online property recovery program.
