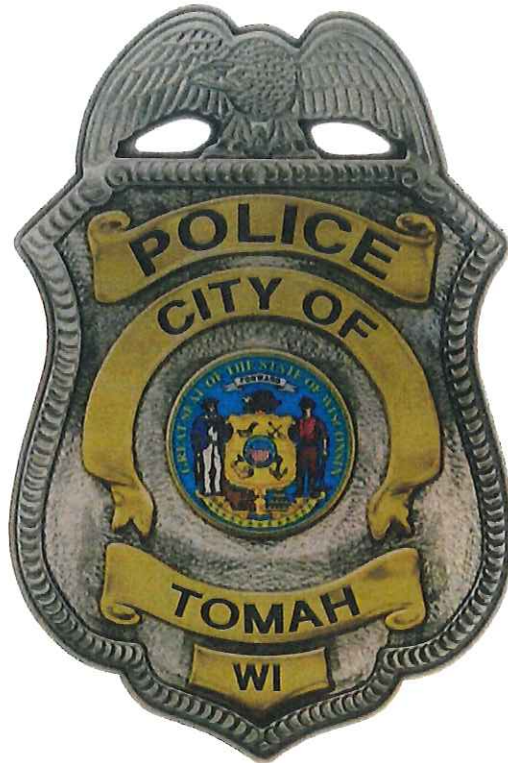

LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life.

I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice, or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession . . . law enforcement.

2016 DEPARTMENT ACHIEVEMENTS

COMMUNITY BASED POLICING - The Tomah Police Department's ability to deliver police services through community based policing is part of the on-going partnership we have developed with organizations and groups throughout our surrounding area. Some of those organizations and groups include the following: Tomah Boys and Girls Club, Our Town Tomah, Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee, Monroe County Safe Community Coalition, Tomah Financial Institution Security Officers Association, Tomah School District, Tomah Memorial Hospital, Monroe County Child Abuse Task Force, and the Monroe County Coordinated Services Team. Throughout 2016 we continued our active involvement and participation with our community partners to not only achieve our goals but to help them achieve theirs.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Our employees are our most valuable assets. Training resources and opportunities to learn are critical elements in maintaining a high level of service for the community. All employees, civilian and sworn, play a vital role in meeting our mission. Preparing future leaders by keeping staff up-to-date with changing technology, current trends, and forward thinking ideas prepares the department to move into the future. We must continue to invest in their ongoing development to ensure needs are met on the individual and department level. This investment provides a rewarding and healthy work environment which, in turn, drives our employees to seek excellence.

To that end training and education specifically related to Professional Development was a primary focus in 2016. Classes and training related to Professional Development which were attended in 2016 included Leadership in Police Organizations (LPO), Instructor Development, 1st Line Supervisor, Field Training Officer, Swat Team Leader, and Command College. Congratulations are in order to Lt. Scott Holum who, while working full- time, completed his Masters Degree in Organizational Development.

COMMUNICATIONS INFRASTRUCTURE - Due to the issues created by the FCC related to our radio system the City Council approved a radio system upgrade. The upgrade approved included a 2 phase project of which the first phase was approved for 2016 and the second phase is to take place in 2017. The first phase of that system was completed in 2016.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG DROP OFF PROGRAM – The Tomah Police Department began a Prescription Drug Drop Off Program in 2011. At the time it was the first program similar to this in the Coulee Region. The Department continues to offer a Medication Drop Off Container located in the lobby of the Department for use by citizens who wish to dispose of their unwanted medications. As of our last disposal we have collected and disposed of over 1000 pounds of medication through this program. Because of the success that the Tomah Police Department has had with this program most other communities in Wisconsin have now started and maintain a Prescription Drug Drop Off Program.

CITY OF TOMAH ACTION PLAN, "10 IN 10 LIST" – The Tomah Police Department recognized an area in the "10 in 10 List" action plan that directly relates to our Mission Statement that being #5, "Clean Tomah Initiative. "

Throughout 2016 we continued to work closely with the City Administrator, City Council Members, and the City Inspector to ensure our "Quality of Life" ordinances are being updated and enforced when needed. A majority of these ordinances directly relate to keeping the City of Tomah clean and orderly.

We have recognized the importance of this and have created a part-time position which will address the needs to have an employee focus on Quality of Life and nuisance related ordinances.

GRANTS/DONATIONS - The Tomah Police Department received \$58,398 in donations and grants in 2016:

- \$3,000 was received from the Andres Grant to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program as well as to support other crime prevention initiatives.
- \$1,500 was received from the Farmers and Merchants Bank to purchase new Air Respirators for the Combined Tactical Members to use.
- Three \$4,000 grants totaling \$12,000 were awarded from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for our involvement in the "Click It or Ticket" and the "Booze and Belts" programs. These grants allowed the department to purchase 2 mobile data computer, MDC armrests, 2 MDC printers, 2 PBT's and mouthpieces.
- \$12,000 was received from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to participate in a county wide Speedwave grant. The grant paid for approximately \$7,500 in overtime for the officers while they worked this detail and approximately \$5,000 in traffic related equipment to include 6 in-car cameras and emergency equipment for a squad.
- \$3,650 was donated to the police department by various businesses, organizations and individuals. These donations were used to facilitate the Bike Rodeo held during Monroe County National Night Out.
- \$1,500 was received from a Community Grant from the Wal-Mart Supercenter to fund one year's subscription to the Leads Online property recovery program.
- \$2,648 was received from the Wisconsin Dairyland Tractor Pull Association to provide Law Enforcement services during the 2016 Tractor Pull.
- \$20,000 was donated from a person who wished to remain anonymous to support and replace our K-9 program.
- \$100 was donated from retired Officer Tony Trunkel to be used for our K-9 program.
- \$2,000 was donated from a person who wished to remain anonymous to be used by the department during the Holiday Season. This money was used to support Shopping with a Hero during the holiday season.

MONROE COUNTY NATIONAL NIGHT OUT – The Tomah Police Department continues to be actively involved in organizing and participating in the Monroe County National Night Out event. The event this year marked its 14th anniversary and was once again held in Tomah at Winnebago Park. Although it was difficult to place a specific number on those that attended the event, organizers indicated that it may have been the most they have seen. The event allows citizens an opportunity to interact with different groups and organizations to address various safety-related issues and community concerns. Along with other activities scheduled at this event is our annual Bike Rodeo. Approximately 250 kids participated in the Bike Rodeo.

HOLIDAY GIVING TREE – In 2016 the Department once again partnered with Families First and Monroe County Human Services in sponsoring our annual "Giving Tree" during the holiday season. 2016 will mark our 15th year of this project and provided gifts to 80 children from our community.

2017 DEPARTMENT GOALS

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES - A police department's Policy and Procedures Manual is the foundation for all of the department's operations. When properly developed and implemented, a Policy and Procedure Manual provides staff with the information to act decisively, consistently and legally. The department currently has a comprehensive policy manual which allows this to be done. During 2017 the Police Department will conduct a thorough review of our policies and procedures. This review will ensure our policies and procedures are in compliance with current management, operational and legal standards.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT - Our employees are our most valuable assets. Training resources and opportunities to learn are critical elements in maintaining a high level of service for the community. All employees, civilian and sworn, play a vital role in meeting our mission. Preparing future leaders by keeping staff up to date with changing technology, current trends, and forward thinking ideas prepares the department to move into the future. We must continue to invest in their ongoing development to ensure needs are met on the individual and department level. In 2017 we will continue to be actively involved in these groups and organizations.

COMMUNICATIONS INFRASTRUCTURE - Phase two of the radio system upgrade, which will complete an upgrade to a 3 site simulcast system, was approved by the City Council in the 2017 budget process. Phase two will be scheduled to be completed in 2017.

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE TASER AXON OFFICER SAFETY PROGRAM AND POLICY- The Taser Axon Officer Safety Program was approved by the City Council for 2017. The program will include new body worn cameras for uniformed officers, new in-car cameras for the police vehicles used for patrol purposes, and new electronic control devices (tasers) for uniformed officers. The program allows for unlimited cloud storage

for the data related to these devices. Over the next five years this will include new body worn cameras and in-car cameras at 2.5 years and new electronic control devices at 5 years. The technology associated with this new equipment will allow the department to expand its current policy on the use of body worn cameras.

POLICE DEPARTMENT K9 PROGRAM - In 2016 Officer Hintz and K9 Jager resigned from the Tomah Police Department. A \$20,000 anonymous donation was received to replace and support our K9 program. Officer Adam Perkins has been chosen to be our K9 Officer. In 2017 the department will be purchasing a new K9 and providing for the training related to this.

2016 FIELD TRAINING AND EVALUATION

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is a sixteen-week process that is designed to train a new employee, or Probationary Officer, to become a fully competent police officer. During this period, the Probationary Officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer and is evaluated on his or her performance each day. The Field Training Officer also provides the Probationary Officer with instruction, direction, guidance and assistance each day they are working together. The common goal is for the Probationary Officer to successfully complete the program, which would allow him or her to function on his or her own, or “solo patrol.”

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is broken down into five steps, with each step lasting four weeks. During Step I, the Probationary Officer is assigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer. The Probationary Officer is then assigned to other Field Training Officers for Steps II and III. The Probationary Officer is then reassigned to his or her Primary Field Training Officer for Step IV. Once the Probationary Officer successfully completes Step IV, he or she is elevated into Step V. Step V is “solo patrol” and lasts for the duration of the officer’s Probationary Period, which is twelve months. After the twelve-month period, the Probationary Officer will be granted tenure with the department if he or she has displayed an ability to function as a competent police officer. The Field Training and Evaluation Program is designed for success. Structured training and evaluation of the Probationary Officer is designed to produce a desired result, which is a police officer that is an asset to the Tomah Police Department and for the citizens of Tomah.

The Field Training and Evaluation Program is commanded by Lieutenant Scott Holum and supervised by Sergeant Eric Pedersen. Field Training Officers are Officer Brittney Westpfahl, Officer Adam Perkins, Officer Jarrod Furlano and Officer Wilbert Steinborn.

Officer Rylan Corcoran and Officer Brandon Kuhn were both hired in October of 2015. Both have successfully completed the Field Training Program and were granted tenure in October 2016.

Officer Brennon Scallon was hired on October 30, 2016 and is currently in Step III of the Field Training and Evaluation Program.

2016 INVESTIGATOR'S ANNUAL REPORT

Tomah Police Department Case 16-0078 (Child Crimes)

The Tomah Police Department investigated a case involving a male Tomah resident communicating with and sending sexually explicit narrations to a 17 year old female via the social networking website MeetMe.com. At the time the messages were transmitted by the adult male to the underage female he was on bond through Monroe County Circuit Court that prohibited him from having contact with females under the age of 18 years for previous conduct. The sexually explicit messages sent to the underage female using MeetMe.com were obtained and outlines sexual requests of the underage female involving bondage, dominance and submission, sadomasochism. The male adult admitted his involvement in this case and was referred for charges to the Monroe County District Attorney's Office.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-0093 (Drug Investigation-Marijuana)

As part of a joint drug investigation with the West Central Drug Task Force out of Eau Claire, the FBI and the West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group out of Lacrosse, a 25 year-old Tomah resident was arrested in Tomah on a felony drug warrant from Lacrosse County. The subject was being actively sought by law enforcement in a larger scale marijuana investigation from the State of Washington to the Chippewa Valley area, with marijuana then being distributed from the Chippewa Valley area to the Lacrosse and Tomah area, among other locations. The 25 year-old male subject was stopped in a vehicle after leaving a relatives residence in Tomah with a female. The male was arrested on the felony warrant and the female was also charged with various offenses. Located in the vehicle was drug paraphernalia, marijuana 'wax' weighing 38.9 grams, a vacuum sealed bag with marijuana weighing 44.6 grams, a zip-lock bag with marijuana weighing 5.3 grams, a zip-lock bag with marijuana weighing 2.7 grams, wax paper with marijuana 'wax' weighing 0.5 grams and \$8364.00 in cash. The 25 year-old male from Tomah was later convicted of felony drug related crimes in Monroe County Circuit Court and the \$8,364.00 in cash seized was forfeited under a civil action filed in Monroe County Circuit Court.

As it relates to other subjects involved in this investigation the following information was released to Eau Claire area media:

"Eau Claire police expect to charge more people as a result of a drug investigation in Eau Claire.

News reported Wednesday Blake Handrick, Jason Weller, Steven Falstad and Chad Peterson of Eau Claire and Joseph Cicione, formerly of Eau Claire were charged in federal court for their alleged part in operating a drug ring from 2013 to December 2015. Authorities said Handrick and Cicione worked together to start and operate a

legal marijuana growing facility in the State of Washington and illegally transported the drug to the Chippewa Valley. Falstad, Weller and Peterson were involved in distributing it.

Friday, Eau Claire police said those five people represent a small number of people involved in the drug network and expect several more individuals will be also be charged.

Eau Claire police said besides the marijuana distribution, those involved in the case had also been distributing cocaine and methamphetamine. Authorities have opened up several other investigations into those activities.

According to the Office of U.S. Attorney John Vaudreuil, five people, all from Eau Claire, are charged in federal court with conspiracy to distribute marijuana and possessing marijuana with the intent to distribute it.

According to the indictment, Blake Handrick, Joseph Cicione, Jason Weller, Steven Falstad and Chad Peterson operated a drug ring from 2013 to December 2015. The indictment seeks a forfeiture of \$658,900, which is alleged to be the amount the suspects received from the drug ring. Court records allege Handrick and Cicione had 100 kilograms or more of marijuana attributed to them, while Weller, Falstad and Peterson each had 50 kilograms attributed to them.

In addition to the conspiracy charge, the indictment includes the following charges:

- Handrick and Cicione are charged with four counts of possessing marijuana with intent to distribute, and with three counts of distributing marijuana;*
- Weller is charged with one count of possessing marijuana with intent to distribute;*
- Falstad is charged with one count of possessing marijuana with intent to distribute;*
- Peterson is charged with one count of distributing marijuana and one count of possessing marijuana with intent to distribute.*

If convicted of the conspiracy charge, Handrick and Cicione face a mandatory minimum penalty of five years to a maximum of life in federal prison. Weller, Falstad and Peterson face a maximum penalty of 20 years. Each charge of possession with the intent to distribute and distribution of marijuana has a maximum penalty of five years in federal prison."

Handrick, Falstad and Peterson were charged in Eau Claire County Circuit Court last January for drug-related charges.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-0166 (Drug Investigation-Methamphetamine)
The Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force were

involved in an investigation involving the distribution of methamphetamine in the Tomah/Monroe County area by a 35 year-old Tomah resident. Several controlled buys were conducted from the subject at a residence in Tomah and at a Tomah business over a period of approximately three months from November of 2015 to February of 2016. The male subject was arrested in February of 2016 and was charged with 13 felony counts and 1 misdemeanor count. This subject has since gone through the court process in Monroe County Circuit Court and is due to be sentenced in February of 2017.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-0836 (Missing Person)

In early June of 2016 a 28 year-old Tomah man was reported missing by his family. This investigation is ongoing and the man has not been found. This has been a lengthy and very time consuming investigation to try and locate this man. The last known location of this man was in Wisconsin Dells in the end of May of 2016. Hundreds of hours of investigation, interviews, research, watching video, surveillance and other investigative means have been invested trying to locate this missing person and provide answers to the family of the missing man. This is an ongoing investigation and will continue to be investigated.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-0992 (Armed Robbery)

This case involves an armed robbery that occurred at the Verizon BeMobile Store in Tomah. A vehicle with several subjects arrived at the parking lot of the Verizon store and parked. Two subjects entered the Verizon store and appeared to be looking at phones and soliciting help from the employee at the store. One of the suspects eventually reaches into his pocket and pulls out of gun and points it at the employee. The second subject also pulls out a gun and both of them escort the employee to a back room where multiple electronic devices were stolen and the surveillance system was damaged. There is also a third subject involved in this robbery. The employee was physically unharmed, but was significantly shaken up by this robbery. The subjects stole the electronic devices and money from the cash register and fled the store. The subjects left in the same vehicle they arrived in. The vehicle was later found abandoned in the Oakdale area. Evidence was recovered at the scene in Oakdale and from a subsequent search of the van. Multiple agencies were investigating similar armed robberies of cell phone stores from Chicago, Illinois to Rochester, Minnesota. Through the course of the investigation it was identified that a robbery crew from Rockford, Illinois was involved in many of the cell phone store robberies that occurred. One subject from the Tomah robbery has been identified and is currently incarcerated in Illinois for his involvement in other robberies in Illinois. The other two subjects have not been identified. Charges have not been filed in the Tomah Verizon store robbery at this time and this investigation is still ongoing. It is anticipated that charges will be filed in the Tomah Verizon store robbery at some point on the one subject that has been identified. Efforts are still being made to identify the other two subjects involved in the robbery in Tomah. Identification of these subjects has been difficult as they are not from the area and the robbery crew has multiple combinations of various individuals that are involved in the different robberies at cell phone stores.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-1226 (Drug Investigation-Heroin)

In July and August of 2016 the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force was involved in an investigation of heroin being distributed in Tomah and Juneau County from a 27 year-old male Tomah resident and a 23 year-old female Tomah resident. Controlled buys of heroin were conducted in Tomah that were arranged through the female. The delivery of the heroin was done by the male subject. The male subject was arrested after one of the controlled buys that occurred at the Tomah Mini Mart. The male subject was charged in Monroe County Circuit Court with four felony charges related to Delivery of Heroin and the female was later charged with two felony charges related to the Delivery of Heroin. Both of these court cases are still pending in Monroe County Circuit Court.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-1846 (Drug Investigation-Methamphetamine)

In November of 2016 the Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force was involved in an investigation related to the distribution of methamphetamine in the Tomah and Sparta area. The subject of the investigation was a 27 year-old female Sparta resident. Controlled buys of larger quantities of methamphetamine were done from the female subject in Sparta, as this was her primary residence. The female was distributing methamphetamine to Tomah as well. Eventually, a controlled buy was arranged and the female was going to the Lacrosse area to pick up a large quantity of methamphetamine to bring back to the area to deliver to others. Surveillance was conducted and the 27 year-old female was monitored into Lacrosse County. With the assistance of the West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group officers the surveillance continued into Onalaska. The female subject went to the Menards parking lot in Onalaska and waited. Officers observed a meeting between the female subject and another female in a vehicle with Texas registration. After the meeting, the 27 year old female subject was followed back to the Sparta area and arrested. The female was in possession of a large quantity of methamphetamine. The second female in the vehicle with Texas registration was also stopped in Onalaska and was the source of the methamphetamine for the 27 year-old Sparta female. The 33 year-old female in the vehicle with Texas registration was also arrested and in possession of a large quantity of methamphetamine. The female with the Texas registration was the subject of a larger methamphetamine investigation being conducted by the West Central Metropolitan Enforcement Group. Both females in this investigation have been charged in Monroe County Circuit Court and Lacrosse County Circuit Court.

Tomah Police Department Case 16-1875 (Death Investigation)

The Tomah Police Department was involved in a death investigation of a 54 year-old female at the Tomah Veterans Assistance Foundation on the premises of the Tomah VA Medical Center. The Tomah Police Department worked with the VA Police Department and the Office of the Inspector General Office on this investigation. Interviews were conducted, evidence was collected, the autopsy was attended and other investigative

measures were done in this investigation. The decedent's cause of death is attributed to a combined toxicologic process involving a multiplicity of drugs. An alternative lethal process is not identified. This case has been closed by the Tomah Police Department and the Monroe County Medical Examiner's Office.

Tomah Police Department Case 17-0025 (Drug Investigation-Methamphetamine)

In December of 2016 the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force conducted an investigation into methamphetamine distribution by a 25 year-old male subject who lived in a residence that was adjacent to Fireman's Park in Tomah. Methamphetamine was being distributed from the residence. Several controlled buys were conducted and the 25 year-old male subject was arrested on December 31, 2016. A subsequent search of the residence was done and methamphetamine, marijuana and drug paraphernalia were located. Evidence was also found related to the controlled buys that had previously been conducted. Also charged in this case was the 25 year-old male subject's 23 year-old girlfriend that lived at the same residence. The 25 year-old male subject's methamphetamine source was also identified as a 25 year-old male from Lacrosse. The Lacrosse methamphetamine source was also arrested and charged in this investigation. Monroe County Human Services was also involved in this case as there was an infant child that was residing at the residence where the methamphetamine deliveries were occurring, as well as drug use inside of the residence.

- In 2016 Fraud and Identity Theft type cases seemed to be another area of concern. These cases are typically difficult to investigate.
- Drug investigations have seemed to transition from heroin in the previous few years to methamphetamine in 2016. Methamphetamine continues to be the most prevalent drug at this time and the focus of many of the drug investigations occurring with the Tomah Police Department and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force. There are still heroin and other opiate issues in the Tomah area as well. Marijuana seems to be relatively constant and is often present in investigations targeting other drugs as well. Prescription drugs are still prevalent in the Tomah area. The trends here seem to be consistent with other surrounding areas. The Rochester and Twin Cities in Minnesota seem to be a major source area for methamphetamine, with much of it coming through Lacrosse. Cocaine seems to be way down and much less sought after than several years ago in this area. Chicago and Rockford, Illinois, as well as Milwaukee and Madison in Wisconsin, seem to continue to be the primary source cities for heroin in the area.

2016 SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT

Officer Marshall continues to serve as the School Resource Officer for the Tomah School District.

Officer Marshall provides law enforcement and police services to the schools in the City and enforces state and local laws as needed. Truancy, disorderly conduct and drug violations are just a small list of the different types of calls that Officer Marshall handles.

Officer Marshall continues to maintain a close partnership with school administrators in order to provide a safe school environment. Officer Marshall assists administrators by being present during school searches, which may involve weapons or controlled dangerous substances, as well as situations that involve risk to the administrator. Officer Marshall works closely with the school district in regards to the safety and security of the schools and students in the district. Officer Marshall also assists in emergency crisis planning and building security matters.

Officer Marshall is visible within the school community by attending and participating in Student Orientation, Child Development Day, Prom, and Homecoming Week. These are just a small number of events that Officer Marshall participates in. Officer Marshall speaks in Tomah High School Health and Teen Parenting classes, and is available to other classes as requested.

Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. throughout the school year to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and Queen of the Apostle's School. She also provides tours of the police department to elementary students.

Officer Marshall serves as a resource for both the staff and students and continues to build relationships with both groups. Students are able to meet with Officer Marshall in regard to any concerns or questions they may have. Staff members share information with Officer Marshall in regard to concerns they may have about students. Officer Marshall meets with the principals and guidance counselors at Tomah High School on a regular basis for information sharing and concerns. This is necessary in order to assist and provide services to students involved in situations where referrals to service agencies are necessary. School Principals, Officer Marshall and workers from Monroe County Human Services also meet monthly to discuss concerns with students who may need additional services.

Officer Marshall assists other officers and agencies with coordinating interviews or services that involve students within the school district. Officer Marshall has regular contact with workers from Monroe County Human Services in regards to concerns that

involve students and families. Officer Marshall also assists ISP workers with the students that they monitor by providing updates on student activities and behaviors.

Officer Marshall maintains communication with other officers that have had interactions with students or staff and keeps abreast of any pending investigations involving students or staff from the school district. Officer Marshall also meets with other School Resource Officers from the area to share information and resources.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit (CTU) is a Multi-Jurisdictional SWAT Team staffed by members of the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Sparta Police Department, Tomah Police Department and Wisconsin State Patrol. The member agencies have entered into an agreement to staff the team in this manner to allow for the most efficient use of each department's resources.

Several personnel changes occurred within CTU during 2016. Tomah Police Department K-9 Officer Aaron Hintz left the Tomah Police Department and Tomah Police Officer Adam Perkins was assigned to CTU to fill the vacancy. Officer Perkins was also selected to serve as the Tomah Police Department's next K-9 handler and will be assuming that role in 2017. Sparta Police Officer Jake Edwards left the Sparta Police Department to return to the Wisconsin State Patrol where he had previously served. Wisconsin State Patrol management is currently reviewing assigning Trooper Edwards to CTU as a Wisconsin State Patrol employee and we hope to finalize Trooper Edwards' assignment to CTU in early 2017. Sparta Police Officer Corey Johnson was selected to serve as Sparta Police Department's second K-9 officer and continues to serve on CTU. Monroe County Sheriff's Department Detective Jeff Spencer was promoted to Lieutenant in December 2016 and will no longer be serving as a CTU tactical member. Monroe County Sheriff's Department Deputy Michael Zeidler has been selected to fill the vacancy created by Lieutenant Spencer's promotion. Sparta Area Ambulance Service has continued to support CTU and increased support in 2016 by adding Paramedic Mike Huber to our team. Paramedic Huber is a great asset and provides an EMS presence at callouts and training as well as conducting training in Tactical EMS to ensure all team members maintain these skills.

In 2016 the CTU Governing Board, comprised of the Monroe County Sheriff, Sparta Police Chief and Tomah Police Chief, modified the Memorandum of Understanding that created CTU to combine the crisis negotiators into CTU. Previously CTU tactical personnel and Crisis Negotiators were separate units that both reported to the Incident Commander. After some research and discussions between the CTU Governing Board and CTU Commander the decision was made to incorporate the Crisis Negotiators into CTU to create a more streamlined chain of command and to integrate tactical and negotiator personnel into the common goal of resolving tactical operations safely.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit responded to seven tactical situations in 2016. Officers assigned to the unit are also frequently used by their individual agencies when the entire unit is not required for a particular assignment.

March 24 – STH 27 Rural Cataract – Barricaded Suspect/Rural Manhunt.

Monroe County Sheriff's Department requested CTU call out for a suspect who was firing a pistol. The suspect was likely intoxicated, a convicted felon and possibly suicidal. Further complicating matters was information that the suspect exited a camper trailer upon arrival of sheriff's department personnel, fired approximately 10 shots and then ran behind and presumably into a residence, which was also occupied by the suspect's 90+ year old grandmother. CTU call out was approved. CTU personnel responded and upon arrival began establishing inner perimeter positions. CTU personnel located footprints in fresh snow leading from the residence. CTU personnel began to track the footprints while simultaneously contacting the elderly female and conducting a protective sweep of the residence. The suspect was not located in the residence. CTU personnel, supplemented by La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team personnel, with their BEARCAT armored vehicle, began a rural manhunt operation to locate the suspect. After approximately five hours of searching the suspect was located hiding in an SUV on a neighbor's property. The suspect was arrested and turned over to Monroe County Sheriff's Department personnel.

May 17 – Baders Villa Estates New Lisbon – High Risk Arrest/Search

Warrant. Upon arriving for training on May 17 CTU personnel learned that there was a homicide in Sparta earlier in the morning. Two suspects fled the location of the homicide taking a female with them. This female was possibly a hostage. Information was developed that led to a possible location of one of the suspects and the female in New Lisbon, Wisconsin. CTU responded as mutual aid to the Juneau County Sheriff's Department to assist with the apprehension of the suspect and possible rescue of the female. CTU tactical and crisis negotiator personnel responded to Volk Field to meet with Juneau County Sheriff's Department administrators and tactical personnel to plan for the operation. CTU requested La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team personnel respond for explosive breaching capability should we need that option for a hostage rescue. Eventually information was developed from the investigators that led to the issuance of a search warrant for an address in Baders Villa Estates trailer park. Juneau County Sheriff requested that CTU and La Crosse County Sheriff's Emergency Response Team handle the Baders Villa Estates location

while Juneau County Sheriff's Department tactical personnel worked another operation to apprehend the suspect. Juneau County Sheriff's Department personnel conducted a traffic stop on the primary suspect's car, which was driven by his mother, and reported that the suspect was at the location in New Lisbon, but was preparing to leave. CTU personnel responded to New Lisbon. Upon arrival the female was located outside, complied with verbal commands and was safeguarded. However, the female reported that there was small child in a van in the driveway and the suspect was hiding in the cab of a pickup truck next to the van. CTU left cover to retrieve the child and then turned their attention to the suspect. After verbal commands from the MRAP (armored vehicle) PA system the suspect surrender and was arrested without incident. Occupants of the residence refused to communicate with crisis negotiators and OC (pepper spray) was fired into the residence. Two adults exited the residence and were detained without further incident.

May 18 – CTH A Rural Tomah – Search Warrant. Sparta Police Department and Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) obtained a search warrant for a residence on CTH A, rural Tomah, to search for the second suspect in the May 17 homicide investigation. CTU personnel developed a plan and served the search warrant. The primary suspect and a friend were located in the driveway. Upon approach and the suspect's father exited the residence and was very upset and yelling. The suspect's mother then exited the residence and systematically the four adults were detained. The suspect's brother was called out of the residence and detained. The suspect's wife and two small children were left in the residence. CTU personnel approached the residence and engaged the suspect's wife in dialogue. Due to cold weather the suspect's wife was allowed to remain in the residence with the children. CTU personnel then searched the residence and several outbuildings before turning the location over to investigators.

May 19 – South "K" Street Sparta – Search Warrant. Sparta Police and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force obtained a search warrant for a residence in Sparta related to drug and firearms sales and connection to the May 17 homicide investigation. CTU served the search warrant in a breach and hold manner, removing exterior surveillance cameras on the residence and then breaching the front and back doors before calling the occupants out of the residence. A female resident was detained at the front door and a male, who was reportedly sleeping, was detained by the team at the rear door.

July 20 – Warrens – Rural Manhunt. Monroe County Sheriff's Department requested CTU call out for assistance in locating a wanted person who was threatening "suicide by cop" and believed to have access to firearms. Monroe County Sheriff's Department investigators obtained a possible location for the

suspect. CTU tactical personnel surrounded the location. A crisis negotiator was able to contact the suspect via cellular telephone and the suspect stated that he was not at the location. Insufficient information existed to obtain a search warrant for the location and CTU returned to the staging location. No further information on the suspect's location was available and the call out was cancelled. Shortly after returning to Tomah information was received from a confidential informant that the suspect was at The Bog, a restaurant in the Warrens area. Tomah Police CTU personnel and the Monroe County Sheriff's Department K-9 responded and established containment on the restaurant before entering and arresting the suspect.

August 28 – Grassman Street Tomah – Search Warrant. Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force requested CTU serve a search warrant on Grassman Street in Tomah related to methamphetamine dealing. MCJITF conducted a controlled buy of methamphetamine and then obtained a search warrant for an apartment where the drug buy occurred. The suspect was known to carry firearms, including a recent arrest where a short barrel shotgun was seized. CTU personnel assisted Tomah Police Department on-duty personnel with a traffic stop of a vehicle leaving the location and the primary target's girlfriend was arrested. CTU then served the search warrant by breaching the rear door while simultaneously conducting a break and rake (removal of the window covering) on the bedroom window where the drug sales were occurring. The apartment was occupied by a friend of the target and he was detained without incident. The apartment was searched and no one else was located inside.

November 26 – Austin Street Sparta – Barricaded Suspect. Sparta Police requested CTU call out in reference to a barricaded suspect after a domestic violence incident. Suspect reportedly pointed a firearm at his girlfriend when she returned to their residence after an argument. Suspect refused to communicate with police via telephone and had placed a vehicle in front of the main door and walk-in door to the garage. Additional information was that that suspect had previously owned a gun store and had made comments about engaging in a gunfight with police in the past. CTU personnel responded and established a perimeter around the residence while Sparta Police obtained a search warrant for the residence. CTU crisis negotiator personnel attempted telephone contact with the suspect but were not successful. A plan was developed to approach the residence with an armored vehicle (MRAP) and use the PA system to initiate communication. Upon approaching in the MRAP CTU personnel observed the suspect in the living room and a crisis negotiator was able to contact the suspect via cellular telephone. After several minutes of communication the suspect came to the entry door of the residence. After several more minutes of communication the suspect opened the garage door and then came into the garage. The suspect eventually exited the garage and was detained by CTU personnel.

The Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit continues to train for one eight hour day each month in addition to other training that individual members attend. Sniper team members continue to train with Fort McCoy Police SRT Snipers on a regular basis. Nine team members attended the Association of SWAT Personnel-Wisconsin Conference, which included incident debriefs from several critical incidents across the United States.

2016 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ANNUAL REPORT

2016 was a busy year for the Tomah Police Department as it relates to technology, upgrades, services, social media, website or overall enhancements.

DEPARTMENT COMPUTERS / NETWORK

The Tomah Police Department transitioned to CR Solutions in June of 2016 for all computer and network related IT issues. CR Solutions is a provider of managed IT services and network support for the City of Tomah. The transition provides support either on site, by internet or by phone in a timely and professional manner. The transition from our previous provider was done efficiently. CR Solutions will continue to provide services in 2017.

In 2016, the Department purchased four new desktop computers and two new printers. These were purchased to replace outdated and non-working equipment. Many of the department computers were upgraded to Windows 10 during the free upgrade period. In total, 19 computers were upgraded for free. This free upgrade is a realized cost savings of approximately \$2,200.00.

In 2016 the following squad related computers and items were purchased. The computers come with an upgraded five (5) year warranty. These were purchased to upgrade outdated squad computers, docking stations and printer arm-rest. All the squad computers, printers and printer arm-rests are now the same brand and make. This makes it easier for Officers to learn and use one system and to switch from car to car if one is being serviced.

- Two semi-rugged laptop computers, two docking stations and two printers were purchased through DOT traffic grants.
- One semi-rugged laptop computer, one docking station and one arm-rest/printer cradle was purchased with money allocated in the 2016 budget.

POLICE RADIO UPGRADE

The first phase of the 2016 radio upgrade project was completed and went live in May of 2016. This included installing a new microwave antenna with simulcast capability at the Tomah Wastewater Treatment Plant on the east side of the City. It was projected that this phase would improve radio coverage and communications, making it safer for the officers. The second phase will start in 2017 and include upgrading the north tower located on top of the Water Tower. This second phase should resolve intermittent radio problems and have complete portable city-wide radio coverage. The installation is being conducted by our radio service provider, Communications Service-La Crosse/Portage, Wisconsin.

CELLULAR/DATA PROVIDER

In July 2016, a new network extender "mini tower" was installed at the Police Department free of charge by Verizon. The extender does not have a cost but uses an outlet and internet bandwidth. This acts as a tower for any Verizon user while at our Police Department. This has vastly improved Verizon cellular calls/data while at the Police Department.

TASER / EVIDENCE.COM

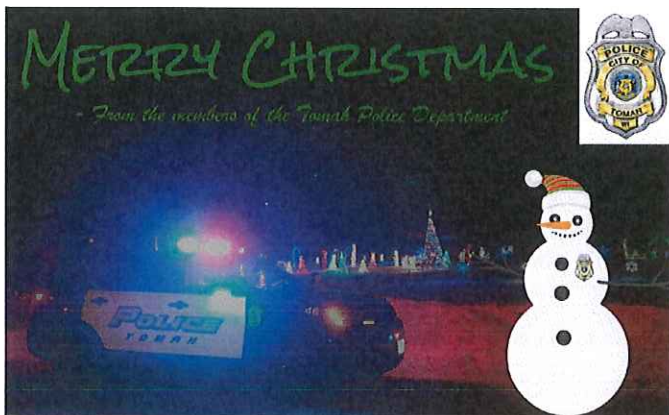
The Department received approval in the 2017 budget a new TASER and evidence.com Officer Safety Program. This will provide each officer a new TASER and new TASER body cam. Each officer will be required to wear and use their body cam as currently practiced. The new program will also equip our fleet of six vehicles each with two in car TASER video recording devices. The new program components work and talk with one another through Bluetooth technology. Eventually this will make it easier for the officer to save their captured video, effectively manage video evidence and have the ability to share the video with the Prosecuting Attorney. This is set to be implemented in January of 2017.

No new squad car camera systems were purchased in 2016, in anticipation of the evidence.com upgrade that was approved in the City budget for 2017. We will work with other City Agencies in re-purposing the current in car camera systems.

TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT FACEBOOK PAGE

The Tomah Police Department continues to operate a Facebook page in order to share information with our community and visitors. Administrators of the page include Chief Nicholson, Lieutenant Holum, Sergeant Pedersen and Sergeant Jones. The goal of the Department Facebook page is to provide timely information and resources to the Community. Other aspects of the page include trying to solve crimes through the use of suspect identification.

As of January 8, 2017, The Tomah PD Facebook page currently has 7,171 likes with 2,386 fans being from the Tomah area. In 2016, our post that reached the most viewers was one thanking a community member for providing the Police Department with a pre-purchased case of water with 121,806 people reached. This was during a time where across the Country there was outpouring support for Law Enforcement. Thank you for your continued support of the Tomah Police Department.

TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT METRO COUNT UNIT **METRO COUNT**

The metro count 5600 is a portable vehicle classifier system designed for data collection at specific locations on a road. Meaning that two rubber tubes across the roadway can transform data into historical vehicle speed, vehicle classes and dates/times. This provides a better responses to speeding complaints on certain roadways, volume of traffic for City studies and many other reasons. The program is starting back up and being operated by Sergeant Jones and overseen by Chief Nicholson. If you have an on-going speeding complaint on a roadway, please contact Sergeant Jones. If feasible, the unit will be placed and analyzed to better address the specific concerns. If your Agency within Monroe County would like to utilize the Metro Count unit, please contact Chief Nicholson.

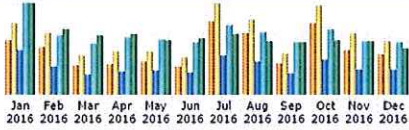

01-02-17: NEW ACCIDENT REPORTING INFORMATION FOR WISCONSIN

Wisconsin Department of Transportation has a new on-line form for reporting accidents that occur after January 1, 2017. If the Police respond to the accident scene and indicate that they will be completing an accident report for you, you do not need to complete the on-line form. Instances where this on-line form may be used is where the involved drivers exchange information in a reportable minor accident, a reportable single vehicle parking lot accident or a reportable accident that is reported after the fact.

When to Report a Crash
Per Wisconsin Statute 345.70(1), any crash within the State of Wisconsin must be reported when it results in:
- Injury of a person
- \$1,000 or more damage to any person's vehicle or property
- Damage of \$200 or more to state or other government-owned property other than a vehicle.

NOTE: If you received a letter from the Department of Transportation stating you were involved in a reportable crash and requesting you to complete a report, you must complete a crash report.

How to Report a Crash
Information you need before starting your crash report
- Driver license number
- Vehicle Identification Number (VIN)
- Social security number
- Vehicle insurance information
** If any motorist involved in a crash/accident is uninsured additional forms will need to be completed under the safety responsibility law.

If applicable, you may upload a diagram of your crash by either scanning or taking a photo and uploading it using a camera or smartphone. This is the easiest method to upload your diagram. Please do not upload images of your vehicle as these may not be an official part of your crash report. For examples of appropriate diagrams, use the help menu on the diagram upload page.

If law enforcement is called to the crash, then law enforcement may complete the report. If law enforcement does not file the report and the crash occurred in 2017, you will need to complete the Wisconsin Driver Report of Crash DR4002.

If you need assistance, please use this FAQ and definition document. Please note, the crash form application will time out after 30 minutes of inactivity and you will lose your information. On average, a crash report will take no longer than 40 minutes to complete.

2016 FLEET MAINTENANCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Tomah Police Department has thirteen vehicles in our fleet that are used by Administrative, Supervisory, Investigators and Patrol Officers. Some of the specialty vehicles such as the Nuisance Abatement Vehicle (N.A.B.), are used on an "as needed" basis. The N.A.B. is used to provide a visual presence in areas where it is requested by City residents and businesses. The MRAP is a shared armored vehicle that is primarily used by the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit and for rescue operations. While kept in Tomah's fleet, costs are shared between the three Monroe County Law Enforcement Agencies (Tomah Police Department, Sparta Police Department and Monroe County Sheriff's Department).

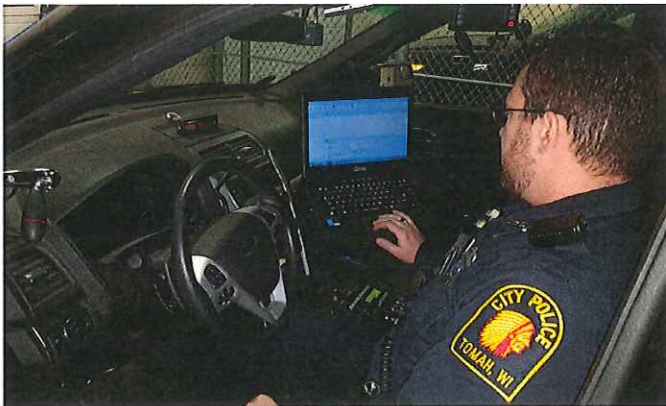
2016 Department Vehicle Trades:

In 2016, a 2008 Chevrolet Impala (Silver) was traded in on a new 2017 Dodge Ram 1500. This truck is manufactured as a Special Service Vehicle (SSV) specifically for law enforcement purposes. It will be utilized as a multi-purpose vehicle. The 4-wheel drive and cargo capability will assist the department during inclement weather and when a vehicle is needed to transfer or haul property and evidence.



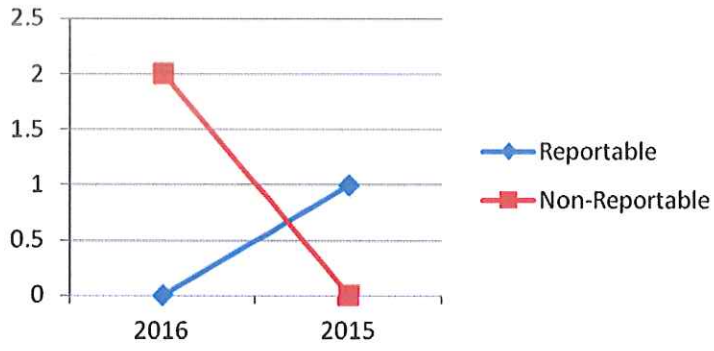
Patrol Officers drive marked Police vehicles with the traditional black and white pattern. Vehicles assigned to the Chief of Police, Supervisors and Investigators are unmarked Police vehicles.

All of our marked Patrol vehicles and the Shift Supervisor vehicle are equipped with specialized equipment. This includes a radar unit for speed enforcement, semi-rugged laptop computers for conducting in car records checks and for issuing citations, semi-automatic M4 rifles, 12-gauge shotguns which are dedicated to less-than-lethal munitions, Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs), first aid bags, in car audio/video recorders, Stinger Spike systems to safely deflate vehicle tires, fire extinguishers, traffic vests, road flares and Preliminary Breath Tests (PBTs). This equipment helps the Patrol Officer conduct their job in a safe manner and provides life-saving tools for the Community.

2016 COMMUNITY SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT

In 2016 the members of the Police Department were busy with a variety of community service activities that involved various organizations and people of different ages throughout the community.

National Night Out

The 14th Annual National Night out was held at Winnebago Park. The Police Department partnered with Tomah Memorial Hospital, Walmart Supercenter, and the Walmart Distribution Center in being primary facilitators of this event. Organizations from around the area came to showcase resources available to the community that make Monroe County a safer place to live, work and play.

The event was well attended by organizations and the public, with new organizations making a presence.

The Police Department's Bike Rodeo was also held in the park during National Night Out. Demonstrations were conducted by the Monroe County Tactical Unit, the Town of Lincoln Fire Department and First Responders, Tomah Fire Department and Rescue Technicians, Tomah Area Ambulance Service and the Oakdale First Responders and Fire Department.

Members of the Tomah FFA chapter displayed an animal learning center and also kept children busy with games and activities.

This event would not be possible without the support and donations from the public.

The 2016 Monroe County National Night Out was recognized by the National Association of Town Watch for community populations of 5,000 to 15000.

Bike and Blading Safety Expo

The Police Department held its annual Bike and Blading Safety Expo in conjunction with National Night Out at Winnebago Park. Volunteers from the Walmart Corporation came together to help make the course run smoothly.

During the Bike and Blading Safety Expo participants are invited to ride or blade through a variety of safety/obstacle courses. Free bike registration is also available on that evening.

Monetary donations from area businesses and community members, together with a grant

from Walmart, assist us in purchasing bikes and back packs for children who participated. Each back pack was filled with items needed for students to start out their school year. Over 240 children attended the event and received a back pack.

Tours

Throughout the year the Department provides tours of the Police Department to different community groups such as the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts.

The Department provides tours to groups who request a tour.

School District Events

Each year the Police Department participates in Child Development Day held by the Tomah School District. The Department provides information in regards to child safety issues, including car seat safety. Child fingerprinting is also provided to the children.

Officer Marshall teaches G.R.E.A.T. to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and Queen of Apostles School.

The Tomah High School holds a "Reality Check" event during the school year. This would be similar to a game of "Life" in which students are responsible for maintaining a budget to care for their "families" while also dealing with life-type situations.

Upon request, members of the Police Department provide information to the students and staff at Tomah High School. Topics range from traffic enforcement, child safety seats, drug identification, search and seizure and critical incident responses.

Car Seat Safety Inspections

Officer Marshall, along with trained officers from the Monroe County Sheriff's Department and staff from Tomah Memorial Hospital, provide free car seat safety information and safety inspections throughout the county. Information is passed out and parents are instructed on the proper and safe way to travel with their children. Car seats are also available to purchase at cost, or in the case of financial need, they are provided to families for a minimal charge.

The Monroe County Health Department received a state grant to purchase car seats and provide them to families who receive county support services. Officer Marshall assisted with the distribution and installation of some of the seats.

Officer Marshall receives requests from parents every week in regards to car seat safety

and safety seat inspections, and without the financial support of numerous organizations we would not be able to provide car seats to the public.

Officer Marshall attends specialized training session each year in order to maintain her certification as a certified car seat technician.

Child Fingerprinting

With the help of the Tomah Lionesses, the Police Department provides child fingerprinting free of charge. Throughout the year parents are able to have their child's fingerprints placed in an identification kit that they can complete with photographs, dental records and a hair sample. Fingerprinting was provided at various events throughout Monroe County during the year.

Monroe County Safe Community Coalition

The Department participates in the county wide effort to promote safety related to driving while under the influence, speeding, seat belt usage, bicycling and skateboarding. The Coalition also works towards reducing youth smoking and underage alcohol.

Tomah Business and Industry Committee

The Tomah Memorial Hospital Community Outreach coordinates this committee. The Committee is made up of representatives from Tomah Businesses and Manufacturers. Issues such as employee wellness, workers compensation, and workplace safety and employee health are all discussed.

Boys and Girls Club

Over the summer Officer Marshall and Sgt. Huneck organized a G.R.E.A.T. week with the Boys and Girls Club. Over the course of a week the Police Department hosted a Junior Police Academy with games and events. One of the events included fishing at Winnebago Park in which other officers came to help with setting kids up with poles, bait and fish removal for those who caught fish.

Monroe County Justice Coordinating Committee

This consists of representatives of the various segments of the Criminal Justice System: Probation and Parole, Victim/Witness, Judiciary, Law Enforcement, Public Defenders

Office, Jail Administration, Human Services and others. The committee discusses issues related to family court, day reporting center, jail ministry, jail program coordination, mental health services, 911 central dispatch, courthouse facility planning and other areas.

Cops of Roof Tops

For the third year the Special Olympics Cops on Roof Tops event was held at Dunkin Donuts in Tomah. Officers from the City of Tomah, Monroe County Sheriff's Department, Monroe County Communications Center, Wisconsin State Patrol and the Veterans Administration Police Department climbed the roof of Dunkin Donuts to raise money for Special Olympics. Some of the Special Olympians came out as well to help collect donations. The Tomah Store once again collected the most donations of all the stores in the State of Wisconsin.

As a result of being the top donation raising store in the State of Wisconsin, Tomah Dunkin Donuts was selected as the host site for the check presentation from the Dunkin Donuts Corporation to Special Olympics Wisconsin.

Tomah Memorial Hospital Events

Each year Tomah Memorial Hospital hosts various health/safety wellness events. In 2016 officers attended the Senior Citizen and Men's Health and Safety Expo. Officers attend these events and provide safety information to attendees.

Drug Drop Off Program

The Police Department continues our participation in the Drug Drop Off Program. The Drug Drop Off box is located in the lobby of the Police Department. Unwanted over-the-counter and prescription medications can be placed in this box Monday-Friday 8 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. excluding holidays. Inhalers and needles are not accepted. To-date over 2000 pounds of unwanted medications have safely been disposed of through this program.

Others

Over the last several years the Gunderson Lutheran Clinic hosts a Family Safety Night. Officer Marshall attended in 2016 to pass out safety information to families.

The Police Department receives a variety of requests in regards to community education topics. There are requests for information about identity theft, internet safety, Stranger Danger and numerous other topics. The Department works hard to accommodate the requests to the best of their abilities. Anyone with a special request is welcome to contact the police department.

2016 GANG RESISTANCE EDUCATION AND TRAINING (G.R.E.A.T.) ANNUAL REPORT

In May of 2016 certificates were given to sixth grade students at Tomah Middle School and Queen of the Apostle's School who completed the G.R.E.A.T. program. Approximately 220 sixth graders from Tomah Middle School and Queen of the Apostle's School completed the program. In addition to completing their assigned lessons, students are required to complete 1 hour of some sort of community service. This is part of the G.R.E.A.T. graduation requirements. Students are also required to share what they did to benefit their community. Upon completion students were awarded with a G.R.E.A.T. certificate and a tee shirt.

The G.R.E.A.T. program is taught to all 6th graders at Tomah Middle School during their Health class. The program consists of G.R.E.A.T. lessons that cover various topics such as goal setting, decision making, active listening, conflict resolution, dealing with peers, anger management and being part of the community.

Sgt. Huneck assists Officer Marshall with the G.R.E.A.T. program by teaching classes when Officer Marshall is unable to do so.

2016 GRANTS AWARDED

- \$3,000 was received from the Andres Grant to facilitate the G.R.E.A.T. Program as well as to support other crime prevention initiatives.
- \$1,500 was received from the Farmers and Merchants Bank to purchase new Air Respirators for the Combined Tactical Members to use.
- Three \$4,000 grants totaling \$12,000 were awarded from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation for our involvement in the "Click It or Ticket" and the "Booze and Belts" programs. These grants allowed the department to purchase 2 mobile data computer, MDC armrests, 2 MDC printers, 2 PBT's and mouthpieces.
- \$12,000 was received from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to participate in a county wide Speedwave grant. The grant paid for approximately \$7,500 in overtime for the officers while they worked this detail and approximately \$5,000 in traffic related equipment to include 6 in-car cameras and emergency equipment for a squad.
- \$3,650 was donated to the police department by various businesses, organizations and individuals. These donations were used to facilitate the Bike Rodeo held during Monroe County National Night Out.
- \$1,500 was received from a Community Grant from the Walmart Supercenter to fund one year's subscription to the Leads Online property recovery program.
- \$2,648 was received from the Wisconsin Dairyland Tractor Pull Association to provide Law Enforcement services during the 2016 Tractor Pull.
- \$20,000 was donated from a person who wished to remain anonymous to support and replace our K-9 program.
- \$100 was donated from retired Officer Tony Trunkel to be used for our K-9 program.
- \$2,000 was donated from a person who wished to remain anonymous to be used by the department during the Holiday Season. This money was used to support Shopping with a Hero during the holiday season.
