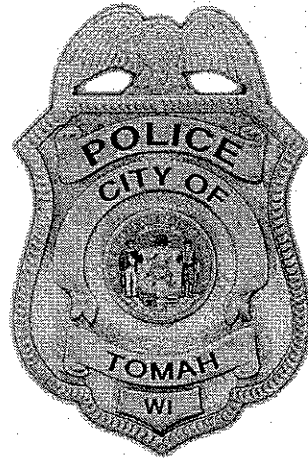

POLICE CHIEF WES REVELS

CHIEF'S ACTIVITIES:

The Monroe County National Night Out has held on August 4th. The event was well organized and we estimated that about 400 people attended.

I attended the weekly the Department Head staff meetings on August 4th and August 25th. I was not able to attend on August 11th and August 18th.

I attended the Western Technical College Advisory Committee meeting. The attendees were provided with an update on Western Technical College activities and plans for the future.

I met with Director Patterson and a representative of Olympic Builders for the purpose of discussing some final concerns regarding the building.

I met with Reporter Medinger and Director Protz. We discuss the vandalism and property damage in the park and on the walking trail.

I gave a short presentation to a group of athletes and their parents at the Tomah Senior High.

I attended the Committee As A Whole meeting.

I attended the Monroe County Safety Coalition. Investigator Walensky conducted a drug training session at the meeting.

I attended the Common Council meeting.

On Thursday, August 20, I and other members of the Department assisted Congressman Kind with a security detail at the Town Hall Meeting at was held at the Tomah Senior High.

I met with Chris Estebo, the Ho-Chunk Nation Law Enforcement Liaison for Monroe County and members of the Ho-Chunk Tribal Council. The purpose of the meeting was to enlist their help with a neighborhood problem.

I conducted an Administrative staff meeting.

EDWARD BYRNE MEMORIAL JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT

Listed below are items that were applied for as a part of the, "Recovery Act – Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant". This is a grant that we applied for and recently received notification that we did, in fact, receive the grant award. I will review the specific items with you in greater detail at the October Common Council meeting.

The following items will be purchased with the \$19,151.00 from the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant:

Mutual Aid Radio Communications (MARC) Radio Update

Primary Purpose area – Improve communications interoperability through improved/new radio technology.

Currently the Tomah Police Department has MARC channels located in its squad cars. Along with the MARC channels the Police Department has equipped all of its patrol cars with the required IFERN / IFERN 2 channels to communicate with other Emergency Services during a disaster or other time of need. The Tomah Police Department is the back up Public Answering Safety Point (PSAP) for the Monroe County Communications Center. However, at the present time the Tomah Police Department does not have any MARC communications system implemented in-house that can be used when it may be needed as the backup PSAP. The Tomah Police Department is requesting \$3,590.00 to be used towards purchasing MARC 1 and MARC 2 base station radios. These radios will allow the Monroe County Communications Center MARC 1 and MARC 2 communications when the need would arise to use our facility as the PSAP. The cost associated with this project is State of Wisconsin contracted prices for this equipment.

Although the money used to purchase these radios will not be preserving or creating jobs within the Tomah Police Department, the money is being spent locally thus stimulating the economy. The vendor for this program, Communication Services, is a company located in Wisconsin. Communication Services is contracted to work on the radio systems for the Tomah Police Department. The money provided to Communications Services for their labor will be preserving work for their company. A portion of the monies spent will be used to pay for their services, as well as the purchase of the base radios. The money spent for the radios will ultimately be paid to the manufacture thus stimulating the economy in the manufacturing industry.

Microsoft Office 2007 Standard Edition

Primary Purpose area – Improve the current computer technology software.

The Tomah Police Department is currently using several different Microsoft Office software systems throughout the Police Department. Several of these office systems date back to 2000 and have not been updated. At times, because of the differences in software, the computer systems are not compatible. Recently the Tomah Police Department installed a Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) phone system. To take full advantage of this system an updated version of Outlook (which is part of MS 2007 Standard package) is needed. The Tomah Police Department will be purchasing Microsoft Office 2007 Standard Edition for 30 computers. This includes the computers located in the police station as well as the Mobile Data Computers (MDC's) located in the police vehicles. The total cost of this project will be \$6,970.00. The cost associated with this project is State of Wisconsin contracted prices for this equipment.

Although the money used to purchase this software will not be preserving or creating jobs with in the Tomah Police Department a portion of the money is being spent locally thus stimulating the economy. When the software is received, a local Information Technology Specialist will be loading the software on our systems. The IT Specialist is a contracted employee with the City of Tomah. The money paid to him will be stimulating and preserving his employment and his local Computer Technology business. The software will be purchased from CDW-G. CDW-G is a leading provider of technology products and services for business, government and education. The corporate offices of CDW-G are located in Illinois. However, CDW-G has regional

representatives, shipping/receiving warehouses, and offices located through the United States. The money used to purchase the software will both stimulate CDW-G's business and the Microsoft Company.

Prescription Drug Drop Off Program

Primary Purpose area – Prevention program, drug treatment and enforcement program

During the later part of 2008 the Tomah Police Department conducted an investigation involving the illegal distribution and use of prescription drugs. During the course of the investigation, investigators purchased Oxycontin, Vicodin, Morphine and Sudoxone along with small amounts of Cocaine, Heroin and Marijuana. On January 16, 2009 the investigation concluded with the issuance of thirty-three arrest warrants, six search warrants and orders for the seizure of six motor vehicles. The investigation involved a multi-jurisdictional enforcement effort comprised of officers from the Tomah Police Department, the Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigations, the Monroe County Sheriff's Department, the Sparta Police Department, the Sauk County Sheriff's Department, and the Wisconsin State Patrol. As a result of this investigation the community became aware of a growing problem across the United States involving prescription drugs. With a growing concern for the misuse of prescription medication, and the overflowing medicine cabinets in the community, the Tomah Police Department partnered with Tomah Memorial Hospital co-sponsoring an Unwanted Medicine/Drug Drop Off Day to be held in April 2009. The Tomah Police Department is currently working on becoming a permanent site for the disposal and drop off site of unwanted medications and prescriptions. Included in this program will be the need to have a secure drop off container, similar to a post office mailbox, located outside of the Police Department. The cost of this will be \$1500.00.

The Prescription Drug Drop Off Program will be used to preserve positions within the Tomah Police Department. Officers have been assigned to research, develop and implement this program. Specifically, the money for this program will be used to purchase the drop off container. The drugs taken in from this program will be transferred to the La Crosse County Hazardous Waste Disposal Center. The Tomah Police Department will be paying the disposal center to destroy the products that are dropped off. This in turn increases productivity and stimulates revenue to the disposal center.

Tomah Police Department Canine Program

Primary Purpose Areas – Law Enforcement program, Prevention and education program, Drug enforcement program.

The Tomah Police Departments current K9, Sierra, will be retiring in mid 2009. K9 Sierra is a multi-purpose K9 working to locate drugs, able to track suspects and provide safety to the officers when dealing with a combative subject. The Tomah Police Department will be replacing K9 Sierra with a similar dog. The estimated cost to replace K9 Sierra will be approximately \$12,000.00. The City of Tomah does not have the funds available for this. The Tomah Police Department is currently involved in several community events and fundraisers to raise money for this program. It is anticipated that when the fundraising is complete it will be \$2000.00 short of the needed money. This money will be used for the purchase of the K9 and expenses related to the training of the K9 and the new K9 Officer.

The ability to continue the K9 programs preserves the K9 Officers position on the Police Department. The new K9 Officer will be required to attend K9 Officers training which is approximately 6 weeks long. During this time the officer will be staying in a motel, eating in restaurants and traveling to training. All of these businesses will see a benefit because of this. Locally the K9 will need to be seen by a veterinarian. Dog food will be purchased from local stores.

Forensic Evidence Drying Cabinet

Primary Purpose Areas – Law Enforcement program, Prosecution, and Drug Enforcement

The ever-increasing demand for the use of DNA in Law Enforcement investigations presents a problem as it relates to the recovery of substances containing DNA. In order to properly process these substances they must be dry and kept in a sterile environment to prevent cross contamination with other pieces of evidence. To properly process the evidence the substances should be dried in a Forensic Evidence Drying Cabinet. The Tomah Police Department recently constructed a new building, which contains an evidence processing area. In anticipation of the need for a Forensic Evidence Drying Cabinet, the evidence processing room was developed with this in mind. However, current funding is not available to complete this project. A Forensic Evidence Drying Cabinet will cost \$5000.00.

The purchase of a Forensic Evidence Drying Cabinet will stimulate the economy and produce revenues related to several different jobs and businesses. Initially the purchase of the cabinet will promote business and revenue for the manufacture of the cabinet. Because the Tomah Police Department will be able to properly process DNA substances, this will increase the number of cases that will be sent to the Wisconsin State Crime Lab, thus increasing their case load as well as the case load of the Monroe County District Attorneys office.

Completed duties as necessary related to the acquisition and maintenance of Department equipment.

CRIME PREVENTION/COMMUNITY RELATIONS

I attended the weekly Rotary meetings.

On Tuesday, August 4, the Monroe County National Night Out was held in Winnebago Park. We received numerous positive comments about the event.

I met with Reporter Medinger. We discussed a recent survey that was published by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

On Saturday, August 22, I attended the Heeler/Grandview Neighborhood Watch Block Party. This year the party was held at Veterans Park.

I appeared on the Mix 96 morning radio program.

INVESTIGATIONS

[09-1618] Underage Alcohol Consumption, Theft

Tomah Police received information of a suspicious subject trying to enter vehicles near Tomah Memorial Hospital. Police arrived very shortly after the call and began to canvass the area on foot. Tomah Officers observed a subject trying to get into a vehicle on Pearl St. Tomah Officers followed this subject and relayed the direction of travel to other police personnel. Tomah Police was able to locate this subject who initially denied trying to enter vehicles. The subject was underage and had been consuming alcohol. The subject emptied his pockets and Police located a handful of coins. The subject admitted to stealing the money from a vehicle located on Emerson Rd. The subject admitted to entering and/or trying to enter at least 20 vehicles. The subject was cited by Tomah Police for Underage Alcohol Consumption and was cited for Theft by a Monroe County Deputy.

[09-1623] Criminal Damage to Property

Tomah Police were dispatched to McDonalds for a report of a subject who had smashed a window and the subject was still at the business. Police arrived and met with a male subject who admitted to kicking the lower half of a glass door shattering the glass. The subject stated he was angry that McDonald's wasn't serving dinner menu items and didn't want breakfast. The subject admitted to getting angry and took his anger out on the glass door. The subject was cited and released with McDonald's requesting restitution for the damaged property.

[09-1628] Burglary

Tomah Police responded to the Tomah Co-op for a report of a burglary. Police arrived and began to process the scene for evidence. Tomah Police located an area where it appeared a subject had tried squeezing through a narrow walkway and had scratched themselves with nails that were on the wall. An employee at the Co-op found a wallet belonging to a male subject near the area that was burglarized. Tomah Police had contact with this subject and observed injuries consistent with the evidence obtained from the scene. This subject admitted to being in the area and was subsequently taken into custody.

[09-1649] 2nd-Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety, Substantial Battery-Intend Bodily Harm, Disorderly Conduct

Tomah Officers were in the 1100 block of Superior Ave. investigating a disturbance at Brahma's Bar when they were made aware of a fight inside Dimension's Bar. Police received information that a male subject had struck another in the face with a beer bottle. This suspect fled the area and was pursued by Tomah Officers. The suspect was located, still holding a broken beer bottle, and taken into custody. The victim had a tooth knocked out and another broke in half. The victim also had two separate lacerations to the area around the mouth that required several stitches. The suspect was taken to the Monroe County Jail and the victim received medical attention at Tomah Memorial Hospital.

[09-1661] Battery to Law Enforcement Officer, Attempted Battery to Law Enforcement Officer, Resisting Arrest, Obstructing an Officer

Tomah Police received a request for assistance from La Crosse County in locating a suspect involved in a domestic violence related incident. Officers located the subject at an address in Tomah and began speaking with the subject. Tomah Officers attempted to take the suspect into custody but the suspect began to actively resist Officer's attempt to do so. The suspect elbowed one officer and then attempted to punch both Officers. The Officers used an Electronic Control Device (ECD/TASER) to try and control the suspect but both attempts had zero effect. The suspect was eventually taken into custody and transported to Monroe County Jail.

[09-1779,09-1780,09-1781] Operating After Revocation-OWI related, Littering, Disorderly Conduct

Tomah Police received a report of a vehicle theft in the downtown bar district. Officers arrived on scene and met with the owner of the vehicle who had located it on the 100 block of W. Juneau St. This subject told Officers that he had driven the vehicle downtown and he believed someone had moved it. The subject was highly intoxicated and was cited for Operating After Revocation. The subject had an opened can of beer in his vehicle and Officers dumped the beer out and had the subject discard the can. The male subject left and threw the can in the middle of Superior Ave. The subject was contacted again and cited for littering. The male subject was urged to go home, which was one-half block away, and he continued to yell profanities and create a disturbance. The subject was given several warning but refused to stop the disorderly behavior. The subject was cited for Disorderly Conduct and released.

[09-1783] Arson, Criminal Damage to Property

Officers from the Tomah Police Department responded 602 Williams St. for a reported vehicle fire. Upon arrival Officers located a white truck parked in the alley that was engulfed in flames. Officers began to canvass the area and located evidence that led them to an address 2-3 blocks from the suspected arson scene. Officers contacted a 17-year-old male subject who subsequently confessed to intentionally starting the vehicle on fire. The suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Monroe County Jail on charges of Arson and Criminal Damage to Property.

COMMENDATIONS

My thanks go out the area businesses that donated money, bicycles and other items for the Bike and Blading Safety Expo. The Expo has become a large part of the National Night Out. I also express my appreciation to the many volunteers that help with the event.
