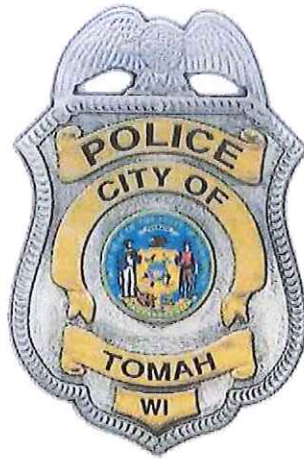

May 2016 Report

CHIEF'S ACTIVITIES

The following is a list of tasks/assignments/responsibilities carried out in the month of May 2016:

I attended bi-weekly meetings with other City of Tomah Department Supervisors.

I attended the monthly Committee of the Whole meeting.

I attended a Tomah Rotary meeting and presented information about the Police Department and City to those in attendance. We ended with a question/answer opportunity.

As a board member of the Tomah Area Boys and Girls Club I attended board meetings and subcommittee meetings related to this organization.

I attended Administrative Staff and Command Staff meetings with members of the Tomah Police Department.

On May 6th I assisted in the facilitation and coordination of the Down Town Tomah Clean up. Together with several city employees, members of the Tomah High School Roots and Shoots and veterans from the Veterans Affairs Foundation, we took the morning and cleaned up the alleys and sidewalks along Superior Avenue and Gillette Park. A big thank you to Rick Murray and Pizza Hut for supplying lunch after the morning of work.

The in-house audio and video recording system at the Tomah Police Department is currently not functioning. During the month of May I had several meetings, conversations, and webinars looking at and researching new camera systems. A request for funding was completed for the a new system from the Thomas Earle Grant.

I attended a Monroe County Safe Community Coalition meeting.

Lt. Waddell and I met with the Tomah Tractor Pull Association to discuss staffing for the upcoming tractor pull.

On May 11, in conjunction with Police Officer Memorial week, the Tomah Police held its Awards Ceremony. Along with several officers receiving Life Saving Awards, awards were given to Pam Steinmetz for her service as a Crossing Guard and to Gordon "Gordy" Stelter for the assistance he has provided to the City of Tomah as the Monroe County Sheriffs Reserve Commander.

I attended the Coulee Region Law Enforcement Executive Group (CRLEEG) meeting. This is a quarterly meeting which is attended by Chiefs,

Sheriffs, and Command Staff members of the State Patrol from around the Coulee Region.

I attended the Monroe County Safe Community Coalition quarterly traffic safety meeting.

I attended a Proclamation signing designating May as Mental Health Awareness month.

OPERATIONS LIEUTENANT ACTIVITIES

The following is a list of tasks/assignments/responsibilities carried out in the month of May 2016 by Lieutenant Ron Waddell:

All scheduling responsibilities (time off, overtime, special events, etc.)

Facilitated responsibilities as a Time Agency Co- Coordinator (TAC), scheduling on-line recertification and conducting expiration audits. Task is shared with Lt. Scott Holum.

Many of my shifts require a dual role, working as shift supervisor and completing administrative responsibilities.

Provide assistance as needed with incoming temporary evidence as needed. The evidence responsibilities may require return of evidence and limited destruction of evidence as time permitted. Evidence is provided to officers for follow-up and/or turn over to other police agencies.

Review of all "Use of Force Reports"

Received, processed, and scheduled "Ride Along Request" that were approved for civilians.

Multiple e-mail, phone call, and face-to-face meetings with Senator Ron Johnson staff members for a security detail that was provided during the May 31st hearings at the Cranberry Country Lodge. In total there was 10 officers (6 Tomah, 2 County, 2 State) on the security detail either in uniform or plain clothes.

My office was the point of contact for multiple Memorial Day motorcycle rides that requested traffic control assistance. These events were coordinated and assigned with instructions to assist with minimal traffic hazards and disruptions.

I attended a Tomah Police Department Administrative Staff meeting.

SUPPORT SERVICES LIEUTENANT ACTIVITIES

The following is a list of tasks/assignments/responsibilities carried out by Lieutenant Scott Holum in May of 2016:

I conducted Shift Supervisor responsibilities on some of my shifts.

I continue to work on a Master's Degree in Organizational Leadership. I anticipate the degree being completed at the end of September, 2016.

I have been accepted into the Wisconsin Command College. The Wisconsin Command College trains representatives around the state, preparing them for leadership roles. It is part of UW's nationally accredited Certified Public Manager Program, which equips managers in federal, state, and local government as well as in tribal and non-profit organizations for the demands of the public management profession. Training takes place in 6 one-week segments at the Wisconsin State Patrol Academy located at Fort McCoy. Classes start on September 12, 2016 and end on June 9, 2017.

I facilitated multiple grants through the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. The Tomah Police Department was recently awarded a total of three grants. Two of the grants resulted in acquiring \$8,000 in equipment for the patrol vehicles. That grant money will be used to purchase two mobile data computers, two portable breath tests, armrests, and printers for patrol vehicles. The third grant awarded to the department is a Speedwave grant that provides the department with \$7,500 in overtime reimbursement and \$5,000 in equipment. A new in-car camera system will be purchased with this grant. The total combined amount of these grants is \$20,500.

I monitored the Prescription Drug Box in the front lobby of the police department. Collected medications were dropped off at a collection site on May 2, 2016.

I participated in a dignitary security detail for a Congressional Hearing at the Cranberry Country Lodge on May 31, 2016.

I scheduled events for the upcoming hiring process and will facilitate the Physical Agility testing on June 4, 2016.

I attended a Tomah Police Department Administrative Staff meeting.

I attended a Tomah Police Department Command Staff meeting.

Sergeant Preuss and I processed all incoming evidence and facilitated requests for evidence release/copies from the District Attorney's Office.

I continued to research cases and purge property in the evidence storage area.

I commanded the Field Training program that is supervised by Sergeant Pedersen. Officer Rylan Corcoran and Officer Brandon Kuhn are both currently in Step V (Solo patrol) and are performing well.

I provided oversight to Sergeant Huneck and Sergeant Jones concerning the Fleet Maintenance program with scheduled and unscheduled repairs.

I assisted Lt. Waddell in scheduling related matters.

I performed the duties as the department's Time Agency Coordinator (TAC).

COMBINED TACTICAL UNIT

COMBINED TACTICAL UNIT CALL OUT:

May 17 – Search Warrant / Barricade Suspect(s) – New Lisbon (Sparta Homicide Investigation). Upon arriving for training on May 17 we learned that there was a homicide in Sparta earlier in the morning and two suspects fled the location of the homicide taking a female with them, this female was possibly a hostage. Information was developed that led to a possible location of one of the suspects and the female in New Lisbon, Wisconsin. Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit responded as mutual aid to the Juneau County Sheriff's Department to assist with apprehension of the suspect and possible rescue of the female. Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit personnel, both tactical and crisis negotiator, responded to Volk Field to meet with Juneau County Sheriff's Department administrators and tactical personnel to plan for the operation. I requested that La Crosse County Sheriff's Department Emergency Response Team personnel respond for explosive breaching capability should we need that option for a hostage rescue. Eventually information was developed from the investigators that led to the issuance of a search warrant for an address in Baders Villa Estates trailer park. Juneau County Sheriff requested that Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit and La Crosse County Emergency Response Team handle the Baders Villa Estates location while Juneau County Sheriff's Department tactical personnel worked another operation to apprehend the suspect. Juneau County Sheriff's Department personnel conducted a traffic stop on the primary suspect's car, which was driven by his mother and reported that the suspect was at the location in New Lisbon, but was preparing to leave. Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit and La Crosse County Emergency Response Team personnel immediately responded to New Lisbon. Upon arrival the female was located outside and complied with verbal commands to walk back to the tactical personnel who were behind the MRAP (armored vehicle). However, a small child was in a vehicle in front of the location and wouldn't exit the vehicle. Tactical personnel learned that the primary suspect was hiding in the cab of a pickup truck parked next to the van containing the small child and quickly developed a plan to leave cover and remove the small child from danger. After the child was removed a crisis negotiator in the MRAP called out to the suspect using the PA system and the suspect immediately complied and was detained without incident. Two adults in the residence refused attempts at communication and OC (pepper spray) projectiles were fired into the residence. The occupants of the house exited a short time later and were detained without further incident. La Crosse County Emergency Response Team personnel used a tactical robot to check the residence prior to tactical personnel from the Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit entering the residence to confirm that there was no one else inside.

May 18 – Search Warrant – CTH A Tomah (Sparta Homicide Investigation). In the early morning of May 18 Sparta Police Department and Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Justice (DCJ) personnel obtained a search warrant for a residence on CTH A, rural Tomah, to search for the second suspect in the May 17 homicide

investigation. Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit personnel developed a plan and served the search warrant on CTH A. The primary suspect and a friend were located in the driveway upon approach and the suspect's father exited the residence and was very upset and yelling. The suspect's mother then exited the residence and systematically the four adults outside were detained. The suspect's brother was called out of the residence and detained. The suspect's wife and two small children were left in the residence and Combined Tactical Unit personnel approached the residence and engaged the suspect's wife in dialogue and allowed her to remain inside the house with the two small children due to the cold weather outside. After the residence was secured several out buildings were also searched by tactical personnel before the scene was turned over to the investigators.

May 19 – Search Warrant – South K Street Sparta (Sparta Homicide Investigation/Drugs). Sparta Police and Monroe County Joint Investigative Task Force obtained a search warrant for a residence in Sparta related to drug and firearms sales and possibly related to the May 17 homicide investigation. Monroe County Combined Tactical Unit served the search warrant in a breach and hold manner, removing exterior surveillance cameras on the residence and then breaching the front and back doors and calling the occupants out of the residence. A female resident was detained at the front door and a male who was reportedly sleeping was detained by the team at the rear door. Both subjects and the residence were turned over to the investigators.

TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT TACTICAL CALL OUT:

May 12 – Tomah Police Department received information from Town of Madison, Wisconsin Police that a suspect wanted in a homicide in Madison, Wisconsin area on May 11 was supposed to be traveling through Tomah on Greyhound Bus headed to Minneapolis / St. Paul. At the time the information was received a westbound bus was at McDonald's and a plain clothes tactical team member with a TPD investigator went to McDonald's to attempt to locate the suspect. The suspect was not located on this bus and plans were developed to check at 10:30 PM bus for the suspect. Two tactical team members in plain clothes and supported by on-duty personnel would contact the bus driver and check any passengers departing the bus before boarding the bus to check any possible suspects on the bus. The second bus was also checked and the suspect was not located.

TRAINING REVIEW:

Spoke with a student who was involved in a physical altercation the previous night. No concerns in regards to the students safety at school. Later spoke with the parent as well.

Spoke with Assistant Principal at Tomah Middle School in regards to student concerns. Some of the concerns are outside of school and family will not contact the police.

Tip of a student in possession of marijuana. Unable to locate.

INVESTIGATIONS

[16-663] Possession of Methamphetamine with Intent to Deliver, Heroin Possession, Carrying a Concealed Weapon, Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Obstructing an Officer, Warrant

A Tomah officer stopped a vehicle for an equipment violation. During this contact, a passenger in the vehicle provided false information regarding his name. This subject was taken into custody for Obstructing an Officer and a search of his person revealed he was

in possession of a couple glass pipes commonly used to smoke methamphetamine. A search of the car revealed a large amount of crystal meth, a pistol and heroin. All of this property was located within a bag belonging to the subject who lied to the Police. This subject had attempted to hide a bag inside the door of the vehicle. This bag was removed and the subject was positively identified and determined to be a felony offender. This subject was transported to the Monroe County Jail.

[16-0749] Battery to Law Enforcement, Disorderly Conduct, Resisting Arrest

Tomah officer responded to an address of Green Acres Avenue for a report of a subject attempting to kill himself. Officers began to respond and were informed the subject had fled out of the residence and into a thin wood line. Officers located the subject and removed an item he was using to strangle himself. The subject refused to comply with the officer's orders and began to physically fight. The subject ended up punching both officers in the face numerous times. An Electronic Control Weapon (ECW/TASER) was used but failed to work after the subject rendered the probe deployment ineffective. The officers were eventually able to control the subject and immediately took him to a waiting ambulance. The subject was medically cleared and then transported to the Monroe County Jail.

[16-0779] Possession of Methamphetamine, Bail Jumping, Possession of a Schedule IV Drug, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Obstructing an Officer, Possession of a Prescription Drug, Warrant

Tomah officers were dispatched to the BP Gas Station located on East Clifton Street for a report of a female subject who was acting strange. This female subject was reported to have knocked over a display inside the store. Several subjects were contacted and three were ultimately arrested for drug related charges. The officers located needles, straws, pills, methamphetamine and other items in the vehicle. The three subjects were taken to the Monroe County Jail.

[16-0780] Possession of Heroin with Intent to Deliver, Possess Prescription with Intent to Deliver, Possession of Paraphernalia, Felony Bail jumping, Conspiracy to Possess Heroin, Conspiracy to Possess Schedule IV Narcotic Drug

A Tomah officer received a complaint of a vehicle parked on East Monowau Street with an operator who appeared impaired. The officer located the vehicle and had contact with two male subjects. During the investigation, the officer determined there was a drug transaction taking place involving heroin, pills and methamphetamine. The officer located a straw, needles and other items of drug paraphernalia in the vehicle. Both subjects were taken to the Monroe County Jail.

[16-0798] Obstructing, Urinating in Public

Tomah officers were on foot in the downtown bar district and observed two subjects urinating. The officers attempted contact and both subjects fled on foot. After a lengthy foot pursuit, one of the subjects was detained. This subject admitted to urinating and commented that he ran because he was scared. The subject refused to provide the name of the person he was with.

[16-0808] Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia

A Tomah officer was traveling on East Monowau Street and observed two small children playing in a driveway. The officer turned around to stop at this address and give the children a couple of Junior Police Officer badges. As the officer was speaking with the children, the odor of burnt marijuana was detected and several people were contacted

who were in the garage at this address. One of the subject's was determined to be in possession of marijuana and a glass smoking device. This subject was cited municipally for both violations.

[16-0812 & 16-0813] Lewd and Lascivious Behavior, Disorderly Conduct, Urinating in Public

Tomah officers were dispatched to the alley behind Franny's Bar for a report of a male subject 'Humping' a pole. Prior to arrival, the caller indicated the male subject had taken his pants, underwear and shoes off and fled on foot. Officers eventually located the male subject as he sat in a vehicle parked in front of the bars. The subject was highly intoxicated (.29 PBT). The subject was cited and a cab was summoned for him. A bar patron paid for the subject's cab and officers ensured the car was secured and that he could leave it there overnight.

Several hours later, an officer observed the vehicle being operated on Hollister Avenue. The officer attempted to stop the vehicle for a speeding violation but it continued to the driveway of the subject we had summoned a cab for earlier. The subject indicated he had to get his mother's vehicle home and that was the reason he was driving. The subject submitted to field tests and the officer established probable cause to arrest him for 1st-offense Operating a Motor Vehicle While Intoxicated.
