TOMAH POLICE DEPARTMENT TACTICAL CALL OUT:

October 16 – Three on-duty Tomah Police Department CTU members and two on-duty Monroe County CTU members served a search warrant for a suspect who fled from officers on Dogwood Lane in Tomah. The suspect and the suspect location were well known to law enforcement and a sawed off shotgun was seized from the location approximately two months ago. Due to the on-duty personnel available, which were backed up by Tomah Police Department officers and Monroe County K-9 Unit, we felt comfortable conducting the operation without initiating a full call out. Several people exited the residence after contact via telephone but the suspect remained inside. After the others left the suspect locked the door to the residence. Upon breaching the door the suspect complied with verbal commands and was arrested at the doorway without further incident.

TRAINING REVIEW:

October 18 – Training was conducted in Sparta at a WTC and Monroe County Range. The morning training consisted of the annual physical agility test. This year instead of multiple physical agility standards, one for each agency, we streamlined the test to use the WI DOJ Training and Standards Recruit Academy exit standards. The afternoon firearms training consisted of several courses of fire that covered shooting on the move, pistol skills and shooting with gas masks on.

INVESTIGATIONS

[16-1551] Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia

Tomah Police were on foot patrol in the downtown bar district. The officers were at the rear (Beer Garden) area of The Bank Bar when they observed a male subject smoking marijuana out of a small smoking device. The male subject was contacted and he refused to cooperate with police. The subject was taken into custody and a search revealed marijuana and drug paraphernalia. The subject was issued municipal citations for the violations.

[16-1564] OWI Restricted Substance, Bail Jumping-Felony, Possession of Marijuana, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Department of Corrections warrant Tomah Officers were dispatched to Birch Lane after a citizen called in a suspicious vehicle that had been parked in front of a residence for an hour and was unoccupied. An officer drove to the area and located the vehicle as it was being driven to another address. The vehicle stopped and the operator immediately exited and began walking towards a residence. The officer told the subject to stop but he commented, "I have to pee" and continued into the residence before the officer could physically stop him. The subject is known to police from many past contacts. The subject is currently on parole for Possession with Intent to Deliver Cocaine and is also currently on bond conditions for possession of Marijuana-felony, Operating with a restricted controlled substance and Bail Jumping. The address the operator fled into is known to Tomah Police as we recently served a search warrant there and recovered methamphetamine and a short barreled shotgun. The owner of this residence is also know to Police and is known to carry knives and a pistol. Monroe County K-9 Kelton was brought in to conduct an open air sniff of the exterior of the vehicle. K-9 Kelton alerted to the presence of controlled substances and a probable cause search was conducted on the vehicle. Numerous baggies with marijuana residue and a pill were located. The vehicle reeked of recent marijuana usage. A search warrant was applied for and granted by a Monroe County Circuit Court Judge. The warrant was served at the residence and the operator of the vehicle was taken into custody. The operator of the vehicle claimed he was 'sleeping.' The operator was processed and transported to the Monroe County Jail.

[16-1597] Disorderly Conduct-Alcohol Related

A Tomah officer was stopped on West Juneau Street at Superior Avenue and could hear a male subject yelling profanities from the area in front of Dimensions Bar. The officer then observed the male who was yelling being pushed back and down the sidewalk, presumably by a person who was trying to prevent a physical altercation. The male was contacted by the officer and he continued to scream profanities and further create a disturbance. The male was taken into custody for Disorderly Conduct. The male subject had a .15 BAC at the time of the incident (PBT reading). The male subject was cited and released.

[16-1623] OWI-1st, Knowingly Fleeing an Officer, Operating After Suspension, OWI-BAC, Open Intoxicant in Motor Vehicle

A Tomah officer was on Sime Avenue and observed a vehicle fail to stop at a stop sign located at East Clifton Street. The officer tried stopping the vehicle but the operator

refused to stop. The pursuit reached speeds over 100 mph for a short period of time before the vehicle turned into a driveway just east of the City of Tomah. The operator was taken into custody and transported to the Tomah Police Department for processing. The operator was determined to be impaired due to alcohol and submitted to an evidentiary chemical test of his breath. The reported value was .17 Blood Alcohol Concentration. The operator was transported to the Monroe County Jail and booked for Knowingly Fleeing an Officer – Felony.
